## Fighter Archie Moore to visit Divided City

Coming to Berlin Tuesday is a shrewd, quick, sophisticated, astute, nimble-minded, funny, fearless actor, author, raconteur, philosopher and fighter. He goes by the name of Archie Moore.

Archie is perhaps one of the most colorful and talented fighters of our day. Growing up in St. Louis, Archie experienced several "hard knocks" before coming into his own as a fighter. He was everything from a juvenile delinquent to a volunteer member of the Civilian Conservation Corps.

Archie's first pro fight was in 1934 when he weighed a mere 147 pounds. Later, through the 1930s and 1940s he wandered from city to city and continent to continent engaging in any and all fights of opportunity he could.

### Strong strategist

He was a strong, quick and smart strategist — often taking advantage of an opponent's weakness by barraging him with a multitude of punches Archie called a "succession of successes."

In December of 1952 Archie won a 15-round decision over Joey Maxim to become the light-heavyweight champion of the world — his earnings for the victory being not even one dollar! Arch actually came out in the loss column, for he owed \$10,000 in training expenses!

Soon, Arch embarked on an extensive publicity campaign (\$45,000 worth) to promote a bout with heavyweight Rocky Marciano. Unfortunately, in the 9th round, Rocky succeeded in positioning Arch parallel to the ground.

Many thought Archie's fighting career had finally ended — everybody but Archie.

Like a phoenix, Arch rose once again, claiming a fighter could sustain two types of beatings — physical and/or psychological. The latter he felt he had never experienced.

### New boxing record

A subsequent loss to Floyd Patterson was followed by the most prominent bout of Archie's career. In a televised and much publicized bout during the winter of 1959, Archie, after being knocked down four times, thrilled both his ringside and national audiences by recording the 127th KO (a new boxing record) of his long boxing career.

The time was 49 seconds of the 11th round. The recipient was French Canadian Yvon Durelle. The new fighter of the year — 42-year-old Archie Moore.

The final stage of Archie's fighting career saw him pitted against the man who could "move like a butterfly and sting like a bee." The fight contract of this widely publicized bout even contained the provision in "section III, page 17, lines 13-15," as Archie remembers, that the loser would have to maintain a 30-day silence.

### Lip buttoner

For once, two charmers/politicians would be in the ring together. Mr. Moore utilized his secret weapon and special punch, the "lip buttoner." Howard Cosell's buddy, the then Cassius Clay, utilized his specially developed weapon, the "old-age pension punch." Unfortunately Ali's pension punch found its mark in the fourth round, and the much older fell to the canvass.

Since then Archie Moore has engaged in another campaign called "Anybody Can." It's an organization on the West Coast aimed at providing assistance to underprivileged youth.

Archie's visit to Berlin is being sponsored the Equal Opportunity Guest Speaker Program. His lecture and tour schedule will include: July 18, 1 p.m. — Tour TCA; 3-4 p.m. — lecture for 2/6 and Special Troops at Coliseum Theater. July 19, 9-10 a.m. — lecture for Lodger Units; 1 p.m. — Tour AYA; 3-4 p.m. — lecture for 3/6, 4/6.

### Boxing smoker

The highlight of Archie's visit will be the Boxing Smoker to be held at Berlin Brigade Sports Center at 7 p.m. on July 19. Archie will referee three bouts.

Don't miss Mr. Archie Moore — a professional who for more than 25 years not only displayed the attributes of a winner, but also showed us all that success is derived from hard work and unending enthusiasm.

## Army drops 'Q' allotments

Class Q pay allotments, formerly mandatory for married servicemen in pay grades E-1 through E-4 with under four years of service, have been discontinued.

A recent act of Congress authorized the payment of Basic Allowance for Quarters (BAQ) to enlisted personnel in grades E-1 through E-4 in the same manner as currently authorized for BAQ payment to other service members.

In other words, E-1s through E-4s can now decide for themselves how to provide for their dependents' support. The individual can have a

Class E allotment sent to his wife, or he can collect his BAQ with his regular monthly pay, just as E-5s and above have been doing.

All Class Q allotments will automatically be changed to Class T (temporary) allotments. Dependents will continue to receive their regular monthly checks until the individual serviceman decides how he wishes to change his pay options.

The service member has three options open to him:

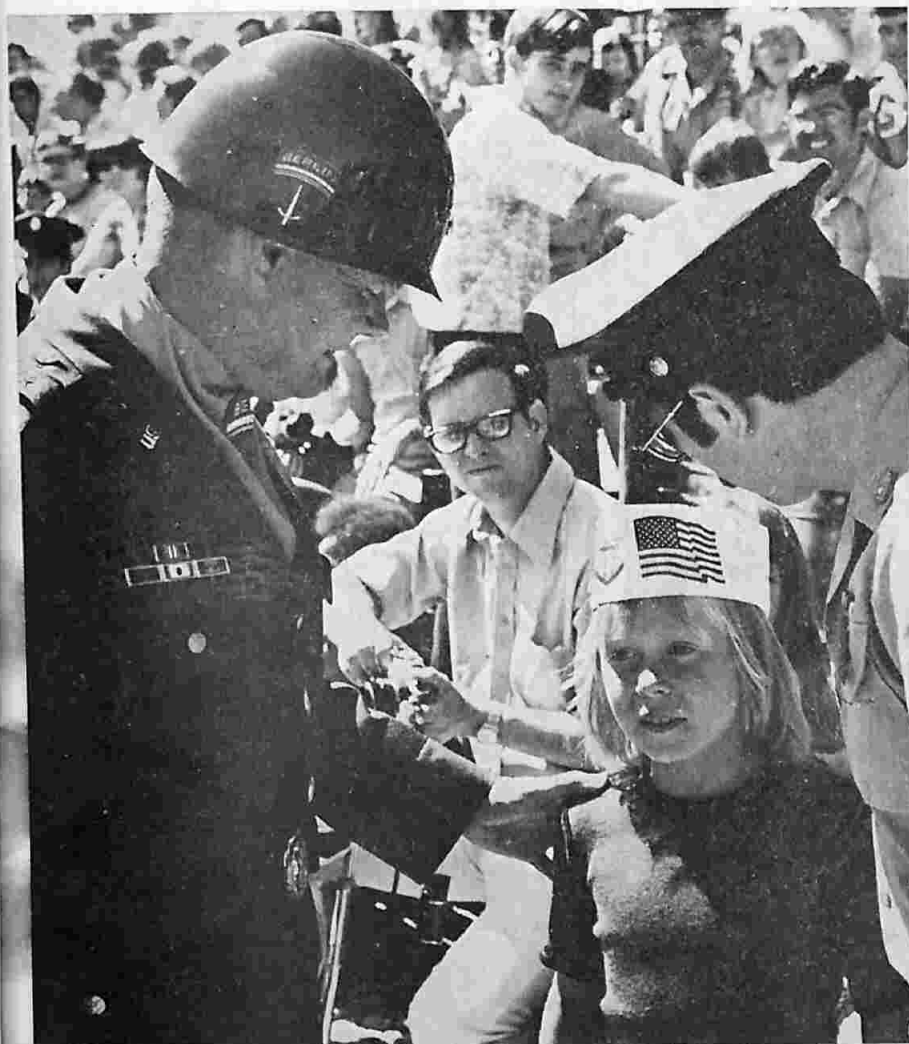
- He may continue an allotment in the same amount by stopping the

Class T allotment and starting a Class E allotment.

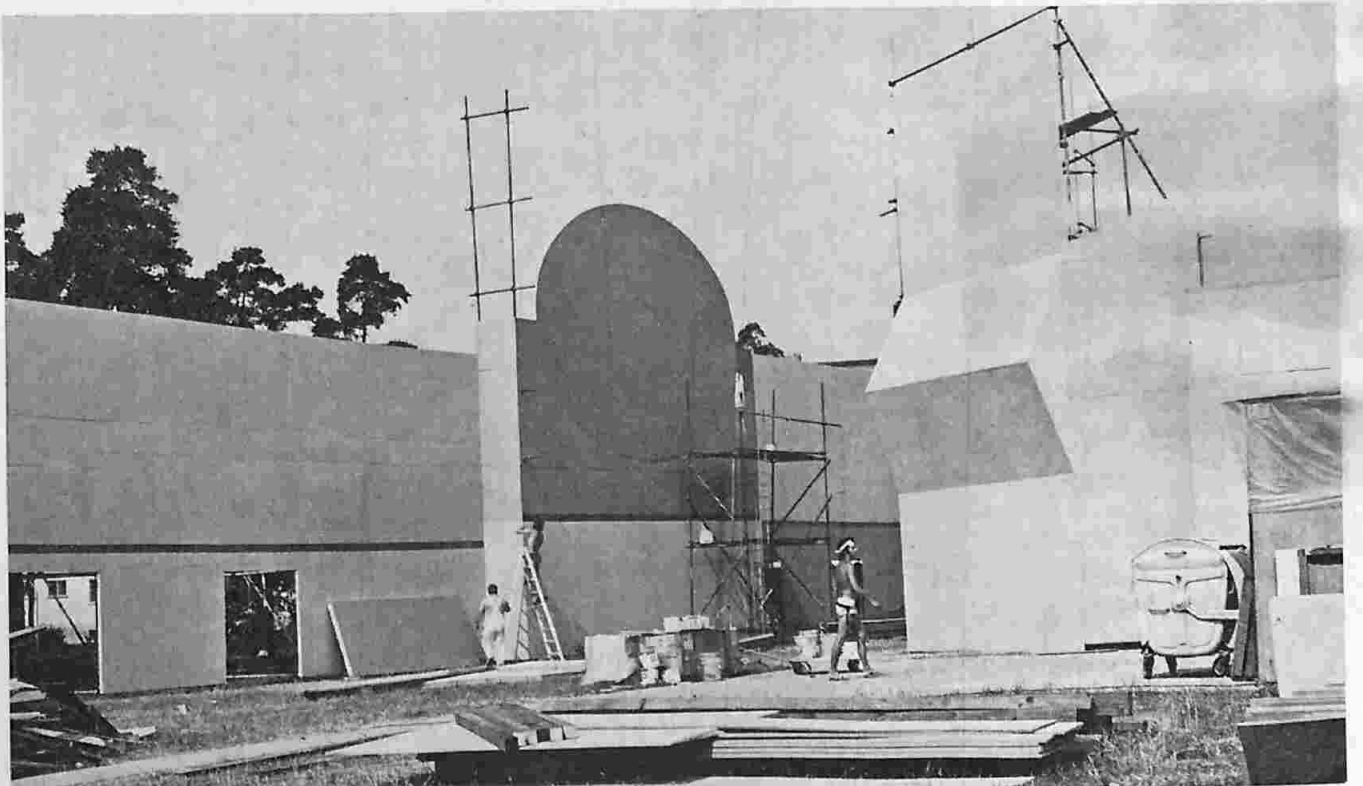
- He may increase or decrease the allotment by stopping the Class A allotment and starting a Class E allotment.

- He may terminate the allotment by stopping the Class T and executing a statement saying, "I have been counseled regarding my responsibilities to support my dependents and do not desire an allotment for their support."

This statement will be placed in the individual's 201 File.

## Swimmers beware!

Not everyone knows about the dangers of hyperventilation, but knowing could help save a person's life.

On a hot summer day, many a youngster will go to the pool to cool off. The water will be blue and inviting, and a friend will propose that they swim the length of the pool underwater. Minutes later, one may be pulled out, waxen-faced, unconscious and not breathing. He may require artificial respiration before he can breathe spontaneously again.

This can happen to anyone who attempts to stay underwater too long. To increase the length of time before another breath is required, the swimmer may take repeated deep breaths. This drains carbon dioxide from the body, reducing the automatic stimulus to take another breath. Then, if the swimmer attempts to swim underwater for distance, a considerable length of time may elapse before the carbon dioxide level, reduced by the over-breathing, provides a strong stimulus to breathe.

The danger is that the oxygen level may drop to the point where the swimmer "blacks out" before he feels the urge to take a breath. Unless help is at hand to get him to the surface, the swimmer will drown.

Parents are urged, not only to warn their children about hyperventilation, but also to learn all aspects of water safety. —Safety Branch

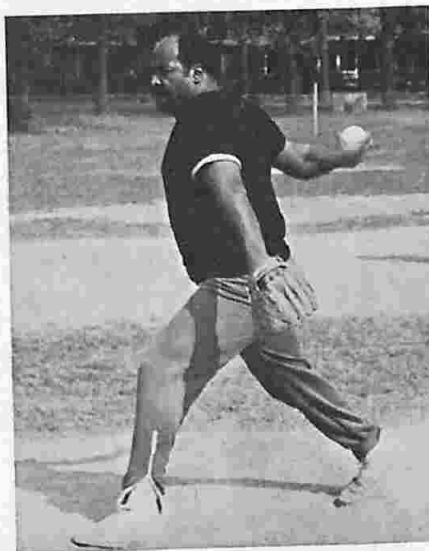

# U. S. entries place first in 6 events at track meet

Throughout the past year, a small group of men have been quietly maintaining Berlin Brigade's athletic image in an area of athletics which is not greatly emphasized in the American Community. Several times throughout each year Berlin Brigade is invited to participate in German, British or French track, field or cross-country events. It seems that each time the same people respond to the often belated notice put out by the Sports Office. Rios, Greene, Gentry, Leonard, Torres, Cooley, Huddleston, Wilson, Dunn, Olson and Radoe are a few of the more frequent names appearing on Berlin Brigade's track rosters.

Last Thursday several of those old-timers, as well as a few newcomers did an outstanding job representing the Brigade, in the British Forces annual summer track meet. With only one week's notice to prepare, the squad came through with six first place finishes out of 16 events in this triangular contest.

The British Forces and German Police Group South both have active track programs. This fact makes the U. S. teams performance even more impressive.

Prior to the meet, it was thought by team organizer Tom Jandris and most participants that the U.S. Forces had a good shot at capturing the title in this the first year we had been invited to the meet. The team was disappointed, however, when they discovered, after their arrival, that the British were not scoring this meet using the usual 5-3-1 point system for first, second and third places respectively, but had designed a scoring system

that awarded points to all finishers in each track event and to the first six finishers in the field events. The result was that frequent first place finishes could not stand up against the depth exhibited by the German and British teams.

The final score was British Forces 111, German Police South 95½, and Berlin Brigade 93½. Something not reflected in the scores of any contest, however, are athletic by-products like sportsmanship, friendship, understanding and hospitality. Each of these were experienced by all who attended this well-run meet sponsored by the British. Especially worth mentioning was the warmth of the British hospitality, which was evident in the attitudes of everyone from the head starter and meet organizers all the way down to the ladies staffing the refreshment tent. Our thanks to Captain Sayers and Marshal for their consideration, and sportsmanship.

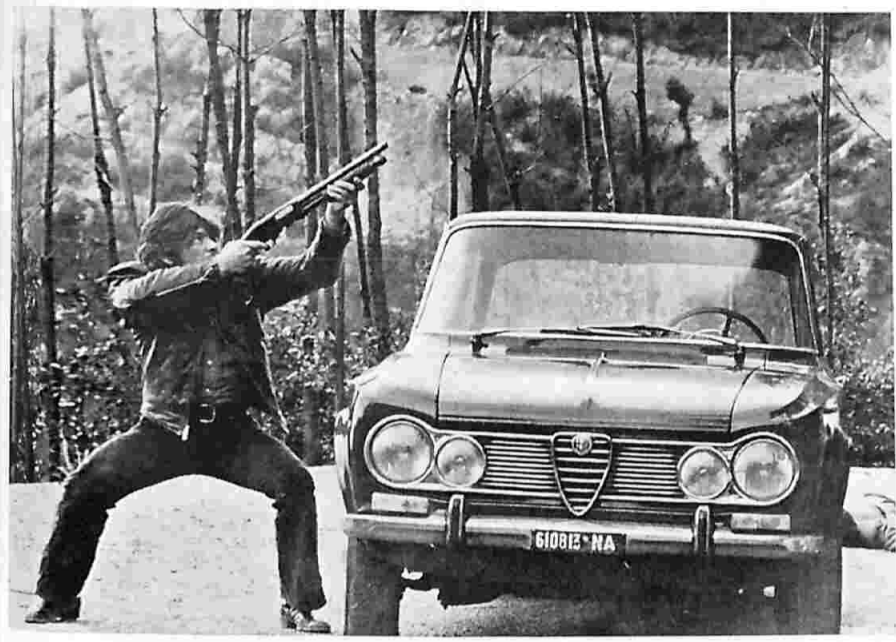

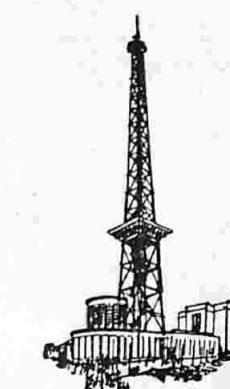

# TAT presents three one-act plays to tickle your funny bone

The dates July 19, 20, 21 and 22 may be very important to your funny bone. If you like to laugh, mark those dates down on your social calendar, because those are the performance dates of the current production by the Tempelhof American Theatre, three one-act comedies varying from farce to satire. The performance will be at 8 p.m. in the D-2 Conference Room at the Skyriders Recreation Center, TCA, and admission is free. Though no reservations are necessary, past experience with TAT productions has shown that an early arrival is the best way to insure that all the good seats are not taken.

## A Marriage Proposal

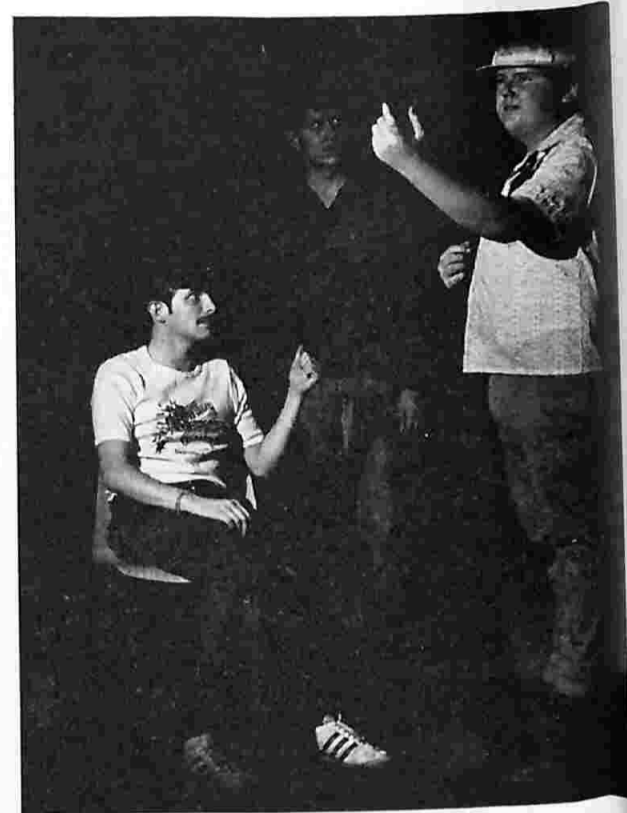
The first play on the bill will be Anton Chekhov's **A Marriage Proposal**, a farce revolving around a man's mistaken intentions. When Ivan Vasilyevich Lomov (Richard Kramer), a country land-owner, calls upon his neighbor, Stepan Stepanovich Tschubakov (Hank Fontenot), he intends to propose marriage to Tschubakov's daughter, Natalia Stepanovna (Rebekah Presson). Tschubakov, however, neglects to inform Natalia of Lomov's intentions, and she starts an argument with him over a disputed piece of property both families claim. Lomov, a chronic hypochondriac, becomes progressively weaker and weaker, until he staggers out of the house complaining of "palpitation of the heart." Only then does Natalia learn Lomov's true purpose for coming, and she directs her father to fetch Lomov back.

Upon his return, Natalia and Lomov again get into an argument over whose dog is the better, and Lomov passes out on the couch. Thinking him dead, the two Tschubakov's become concerned, and when they discover that he has only fainted, the marriage contract is concluded to the joy of all. Directress Doris Ison has chosen to play the farce in the broadest vein, and there is much slapstick included in the action. This, of all the plays being presented, is the only one without philosophical overtones, and is truly a hilarious situation comedy.

## The Feast

Following the Chekhovian farce is a play which won for its relatively unknown author a Yale School of Drama Award: **The Feast** by Dan Wright. A clever bit of balloon-bursting, **The Feast** deals in the making and un-making of fantasy and illusion. The two central characters are an Old Man (Scott Hughes) and an angry Young Man (Bill Vandergrift) who meet in a storage lot during a factory lunch hour. The Old Man, content with his lot in life, has conjured up his daily feast, and asks the skeptical Young Man to join him.

It takes the Old Man some time to convince the Young Man that the feast can exist if he would only believe that it does, but the Young Man finally joins in just as the factory whistle beckons them back to work. The effect of the experience is vastly different on the two men as you will see. There is a bit more involved in **The Feast** than stated here, but to know too much would ruin the effect. Suffice it to say, the laughs directed into it by Dave Hickey and Lou Bash are many, and the performances are superb. Be especially watchful of a strange character called Bluejeans, portrayed by Marc Betz.
