Service Club Man of Year of McNair is Joe Trawick

During the month of January, the All American Service Club, McNair Barracks, in conjunction with Shoftours of Frankfurt, sponsored a Service Club Man of the Year Contest. The hard working efforts of club director Jane Kenney, program director Patricia Parrott and recreation director Margaret Irvin, brought about the successful completion of the contest on January 31. The contest was open to men from McNair Barracks and 40th Armor with the winner receiving a free round trip flight to the United States compliments of Shoftours. The winner was determined by the individual who earned the highest number of points through participation in 35 different activities.

Joe Trawick of Combat Support Company, 4th Battalion, 6th Infantry, captured the first place honors and plans to return to the world "as soon as possible." Stan Paddock of Combat Support Company, 2nd Battalion, 6th Infantry earned second place and received a \$20 cash prize. Charles Gregory of Headquarters Company, 6th Infantry took third and he received a musical beer stein for his efforts.

Trawick is a bachelor from Stokesdale, North Carolina and a graduate of the University of Florida. He currently serves as company clerk of CSC-4/6. Paddock is also single and heads the commo section of CSC-2/6 while Gregory hails from Ebensburg, Pennsylvania, and is with the medical platoon of the 4th Battalion, 6th Infantry.

Large Contest

The 35 different activities within the contest included card games, table games, photo and talent contests, intellectual quizzes, pool, fustball, and ping pong, among others. Individual participants earned four points for placing first in a given event, three points for second place and one point was given to each individual who participated in the event.

Trawick garnered eight first place finishes, relying on his card shark abilities, to achieve top honors. His 66 total points led the field, while Paddock and Gregory earned 44 and 31 points, respectively.

The contest attracted 204 participants and was conducted throughout the entire month of January with one or more events held each day, except Tuesdays when the service club is closed.

NCO Education System

Heidelberg — The Army's NCO Education System (NCOES) is in full swing and USAREUR is looking for soldiers to attend the basic-level courses.

In order to attend, a soldier must be nominated by his unit commander. Interested individuals should inform their commanders of their desire.

The basic NCOES courses are designed to prepare E4s and E5s to assume increasing levels of responsibility within each career management field. There are over 80 different courses, each aimed at a particular MOS or group of closely related MOS.

Since all the courses are conducted by service schools located within the continental United States, soldiers stationed in USAREUR can only attend at the end of their tour here. However, a soldier may have up to one-twelfth of his tour — two, three or four months — dropped in order to attend a course.

Graduates of NCOES basic-level courses receive 42 administrative points towards promotion — more points than any other training course offers. In addition, an E4 who graduates at the top of his class may be promoted to E5 regardless of quota allocations.

Besides the basic level, NCOES includes advanced and senior-level courses for E6s to E9s. Individuals to attend these courses are selected by DA.

Aviation Detachment choppers fly British, French troops

French Exercise

Helicopters from the Army Aviation Detachment at Tempelhof Airport provided transportation for Tuesday's troops lift exercises with units from the British and French forces in Berlin.

A two-hour exercise Monday morning involved two choppers and 60 men from Company B, First Duke of Edinburgh's Royal Regiment. The choppers were piloted by CW3 Douglas McFarland and CW3 Allen G. Warner. Co-pilots were CPT Peter Worsley and MAJ Billy J. Campbell, detachment commander.

The two big Hueys picked up the British troops in the British sector of the Grunewald, then whisked them to various points within the sector. The British practiced various troop tactics, such as landing and assaulting moving vehicles on highways, and attacking buildings.

The weather for troop lifts was poor during the morning hours. In the afternoon, however, the weather became bad enough to abort the French troop lift just after it began.

The exercises with the French involved 60 men from the Second Company, 46th Infantry Regiment, and two Aviation Detachment helicopters. The two choppers landed in the Cete Pasteur, a field next to Tegel Airport in the French Sector. Before the exercise began, the French troops were briefed on safety precautions in the helicopter, with CPT Peter T. Worsley, co-pilot of one of the choppers, acting as interpreter.

The two birds were to have made three separate runs to move the Frenchmen to another point in the Sector. But the first run returned only a few minutes after take-off — the cold and drizzly weather had deteriorated to the point that it was no longer safe to conduct the exercise.

Piloting the two choppers for the afternoon "non-mission" were CW3 Warner and 1LT Samuel S. Thompson III. Co-pilots were CPT Worsley and CPT Louis B. Travathan. Crew chiefs for both missions were PFC Lon Kai Mortenson and SP5 Philip Buchanan.

Kids gum up for dental health

The opportunity to emphasize the social relevance the military organization offers its community, was evidenced during National Children's Dental Health Week in Berlin, February 4-10, 1973. The Hospital Dental Activities Department Organized a program with hopes of establishing an increased dental awareness and concern of the entire public.

If we are to accept the premise that to influence the children, we must first influence adults, then perhaps one should consider renaming National Children's Dental Health Week. By integrating dental health into the classroom activities and also stressing its importance to parents, we hope to make a significant long-range positive effect on the children and the community.

Most dental health problems can be either prevented or rectified if early education and treatment are sought. A series of educational and awareness type programs were instituted towards this end.

If the children are to be made aware of their own dental health, it must be reinforced by their teachers and parents. Most of our programs this year centered around the administrators, teaching staff, school nurse, and children at Thomas A. Roberts Berlin-American School. All of these educators received a dental reference booklet, health kits for each child, stone dental casts, and large x-ray pictures as well as an explanation seminar to help them plan their own individualized dental health lessons. Hopefully these educators will expand their dental health programs into an integrated health series.

During National Children's Dental Health Week, while the T. A. R. staff was discussing dental health within the classrooms, the hospital Dental Activities Department was treating those children previously screened during the October Brush-In, who had severe dental problems. These children received emergency and interceptive care to stabilize their oral health.

To further increase the awareness of the children, a smile contest and a poster contest for children from kindergarten through third grade was initiated with classroom winners picked by the children, and the grade winners chosen by the Dental Activities. A poster contest including fourth, fifth, and sixth grade children was arranged also.

The children's posters, including the classroom winners, totaling 60 posters, were hung in frequently visited areas. Both the smile contest grand winners were interviewed on AFTV's "What's Going On"

while AFN mentioned their names frequently in recognition of their achievements. AFN also aired Health educational material and a summarized interview of Berlin's 1973 National Children's Dental Health Program. Therefore, as prizes these the physicians at the Berlin Army children not only received personalized dental medallions and ADA certificates while on television, but were rewarded with public recognition.

A series of short informative articles were published in the "Berlin Daily Bulletin" with relevant eye catching cartoons. A different topic was presented each day hoping to answer those dental questions most frequently asked by parents.

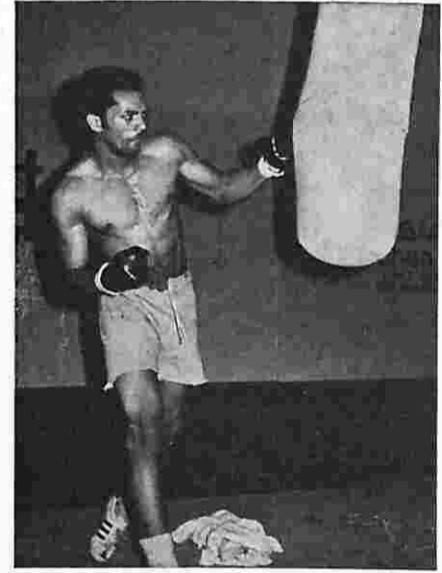
A slide lecture followed question and answer period covering the more severe dental problems seen in children was presented at the Hospital. Later that week, a seminar was organized for the Regional Nurse's Club of Berlin. The purpose of these programs was to emphasize the importance dental health plays in the overall medical welfare of the child.

By instituting an intensive, widespread, motivating dental health program, the attempt is to stress not only the social interrelations military organization offers communities, but also the need for education and awareness of the first steps towards defining effective dental health care.

Smoking boxers box at boxing smoker

To three men of 2nd Bn. 6th Inf. the upcoming smoker bouts of Feb. 16 against German opponents will mark a debut for one and a return for two.

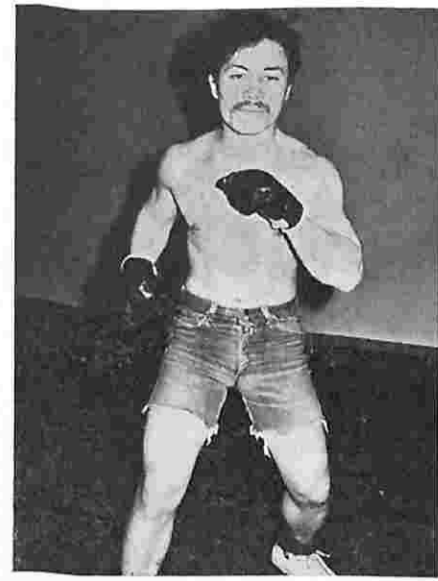
The man with the most experience is PFC Leonard Bermudez, Co. C 2/6 who will return to the ring with 6 years of amateur and pro boxing behind him. Bermudez who hails from the Virgin Islands (first choice on his dream-sheet too) has an impressive 11-0 record with 9 knockouts. He hopes to make this sport his profession upon return to civilian life and cites Muhammed Ali as the boxer he hopes to exemplify.

Also making a return is PVT Phillip Smith, HHC 2/6 who earned his record of 5-1 (2 by KO) in his hometown of Trenton, N.J. In 1968 Smith won the Golden Gloves title for his state in the Middle Weight Class. He received all his tutoring from the Trenton Police Athletic League, which he attended for two years. Like Bermudez, PVT Smith takes Ali as his source of inspiration. As far as making boxing his life's work goes, PVT Smith does not consider this at present. He simply prefers to state that he boxes for the pure love of the sport.

The third American to face the Germans will be PVT George M. Leutele a medic from HHC 2-6 who

will enter his first fight on Feb. 16 at the BBde gym. Leutele made Honolulu, HA., his home before entering the Army, and he admits that his only formal training prior to this year was in his high school days. Irregardless, Leutele feels confident as do the other fighters. This spirit was evidenced by their aggressive nature in the practice sessions, a very positive indication. Like Smith, Leutele is in the game only to keep in shape and for the love of the sport.

The trainer for these men is SSG David "Bang Bang" Harris. Quite naturally this reporter inquired as to the origin of his nickname picked up in the late '50's. From 1957 to 1960 SGT Harris earned the title of Third Army, All Army, and Inter-service Champ. The SGT has had 124 pro fights and has won 112. Sugar Ray Robinson is the last perfect (or closest to that) boxer in his opinion. His reasoning is that Sugar Ray had the class, footwork and power to do it all effectively. SGT Harris stresses that running and a protein diet are the most important factors to his students at this time. In fact you can find any one of his three men run-

ning Defenders Field, the cemetery adjacent to McNair Kaserne, or on the road towards BBde HQ, long before first call rolls around.

In training, SGT Harris stresses the importance of aiming for the torso area. In this matter he cites a very old boxing cliché: "Kill the body and the head is dead."
