Berlin looks back on Airlift days

Last weekend was a time of remembrance for many residents of Berlin, military and civilian alike. Sunday marked the 25th anniversary of the lifting of the blockade of Berlin. Accordingly, a memorial service was held for the many airmen who gave their lives that the city might live.

The ceremony was held at the Airlift memorial on Platz der Luftbrücke in front of Tempelhof Central Airport. Attending the services were Martin J. Hillenbrand, U. S. Ambassador to the Federal Republic of Germany; Sir Nicholas Henderson, British Ambassador; Jean Sauvagnargues, French Ambassador; the Allied commanders, Major General William W. Cobb, U. S. commander of Berlin; Major General D. W. Scott-Barrett MBE MC, British commander of Berlin, and General Camille Metzler, French commander of Berlin. In addition, Mrs. Elinor Dulles, sister of John Foster Dulles, Klaus Schütz, mayor of Berlin, and Willy Brandt, ex-mayor of Berlin, were also present at the wreath-laying ceremony.

After the memorial services, thousands of Berliners were given the opportunity to inspect some of the real veterans of the Airlift, the planes that carried the life-sustaining cargo of food and hope. In addition, the 3-6 Drill Team performed and was greeted with great applause as the Berliners are familiar with their excellent maneuvers.



Karate experts at championships

THE MAN WHO DOES EVERYTHING

I'm writing now about Jerry Alley, pitcher for Headquarters and Service Co., Field Station Berlin, in the Andrews Softball League. Jerry is **The Berlin Observer Player of the Week** for the past week.

Alley is the only left-handed pitcher in the league, so naturally he can claim to being the best left-hander. But his statistics, printed below under "How They Stand," prove this to be more than true. He is the only undefeated pitcher in the league at 8-0 as of this writing, and has the second best earned run average.

But he's not only an outstanding pitcher but also one of the best fielding pitchers around. He stabs balls that other pitchers would miss. And he doesn't make many bad throws.

Alley also is the league's best hitter — second in batting average and first in home runs, runs batted in and slugging percentage.

Raised and educated in Wyoming, Alley was one of the state's best athletes, which, according to Alley, isn't necessarily saying much with that state's tiny population. He played one year of professional baseball, with the AAA Pacific Coast League Tacoma team, as a pitcher and catcher. He only started playing softball since he joined

the Army, and last year was his first year as a pitcher.

His success this year from the pitching rubber lies in part from his studying the batters in the league and in throwing accordingly. With a balanced H&S behind him, a team with great depth on the bench, Alley looks forward to a strong finish for H&S.

The Nolan Ryan of Andrews

Since we had no column last week, our Player of the Week for last week is Jerry Glascock, pitcher for Co. B, FSB. His addition to the team is probably the biggest factor in making Co. B the second place club in B Division of Andrews League.

He has, by far and away, the most strikeouts of any pitcher in the league, nearly twice as many as Mike Hutko of the Hospital, second in that department. Glascock also has the lowest ERA in the league at 0.79, certainly a phenomenal figure.

Glascock has played softball now for 23 years, since he was in elementary school. He started his pitching career at age 16 in his native Missouri, learning his trade from one of the best black pitchers in the state. One season he pitched in five leagues at once: company-level, post-level, town and two industrial teams. He retires before next season and will settle in Maryland to raise horses.

Armed Forces Chess Tournament in Washington, D.C. in September

The fifteenth annual Armed Forces Chess Championship Tournament, for the Thomas Emery Trophy and other awards, will be played in the American Legion's Hall of Flags, 1608 K Street, N. W., Washington, D. C., September 6-13, 1974.

The 1974 competition will be sponsored by the American Chess Foundation through cooperation with the Department of Defense.

The plans call for three six-man teams representing the Army, the Air Force and the Sea Services (Navy, Marine Corps, Coast Guard) to compete in twelve rounds for the Emery team championship trophy, with each finalist playing every member of the other two teams; finalist with the highest score to be the individual champion for 1974.

Anyone on active duty is eligible to try for a Service team. The Air Force team will be the six top scorers in the annual USAF World Wide Tournament at McConnell AFB, Wichita, Kansas, August 30-September 3. The Army is planning to produce its six finalists from an Army-wide tournament at Fort Meade, Md., immediately preceding the Washington event, and the Sea Services will select their finalists on the basis of major command tournaments and U. S. Chess Federation ratings. Each finalist will receive \$25 per diem from the American Chess Foundation for each of the eight days of the Tournament.

Last year the Sea Services won the Emery Trophy for the second time, although Air Force Sergeant Don Sutherland of Lowry AFB, Colorado, took the individual honors away from Navy's Electronic Technician Charles A. Lawton and Coast Guard Lt. Zacarias Chavez, the defending champion.

Legionnaire Thomas Emery, World War I Marine and donor of the team championship trophy, is honorary chairman of the American Chess Foundation. General David M. Shoup, CMH retired Commandant of Marines, is the Honorary President. General and Flag Officers will represent the Secretary of Defense and the five Services on the Honorary Committee for the 1974 program.

FIRST SPRING RACES TOMORROW

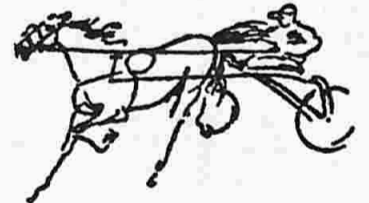

McNair AEC offers new courses

All military personnel, civilians working for the U. S. Forces, and dependents are invited to participate in the new educational off-duty program at the McNair Barracks Army Education Center. Classes will begin May 28. Registration will run through May 24.

German language courses are offered for beginners as well as for intermediate and advanced students. Needless to say, a fair knowledge of the German language enables Americans stationed in Berlin to participate more fully in activities available in Berlin. German classes meet Monday and Wednesday and Tuesday and Thursday.

The primary objectives of the introduction to data processing courses are to provide a broad insight into the many techniques and applications of modern data processing for those desiring a general knowledge of the important and dynamic field, and to provide a good foundation for those planning further study in specific areas

of data processing. Some time will be permitted to see and operate KP, sorter, reproducer and interpreter machines. Classes will be held Mondays and Wednesdays. Prerequisite for this course is a high school diploma or the equivalent.

The pre-college English course is especially useful for individuals who have been out of school for a few years and would like to review English in order to prepare for the college entrance exams or to raise GT scores. The course will cover study skills, note-taking, research papers, essays and listening skills and will help to improve the student's vocabulary and writing style. English meets Tuesdays and Thursdays.

The typing course is designed to provide a foundation in correct typewriting techniques. Emphasis is placed on learning the correct use of machine parts, correct stroking, mastery of the keyboard and touch control. Advanced

students who wish to develop their speed and accuracy are also welcome, as the instruction is individualized. The typing course meets Tuesdays and Thursdays.

The objective of the criminology course is to acquaint the student with an introduction to law enforcement, corrections and prevention. The course deals primarily with the sociological statement of the crime problem and with the location, involvement, deviation, critical issues of crimes and trends in punishment. Classes will be held Mondays and Wednesdays, and a high school diploma or the equivalent is required for this course.

All courses will last eight weeks (May 28-July 18), meeting from 6:30 p.m. to 9 p.m. two nights a week. Registration will be taken Monday through Thursday, 8 a.m.-9 p.m., Friday 8 a.m.-5 p.m. in room 327/329, McNair Bks AEC, Bldg. 1001-D, or by phone at 3164 or 3120. —Evan Wendler

BAHS is gaining space

After several years of crowded conditions at the Berlin American High School, there will be some new classrooms for next fall's classes.

An eight-room wing now under construction at BAHS will provide some extra space for the junior high school classes. Each room will be equipped to use all audio-visual equipment needed by the teacher.

At approximately 25 students per room, 200 students can be accommodated in the new classrooms. This space will still account for only one-half of the junior high. Of the expected 825 students who will enroll this fall, 400 will be of junior high age.

The administration hopes to house two departments in the new wing, either social studies and English or mathematics and English.

The new wing will be connected to the existing structure by a covered walkway and will open onto the causeway. The causeway connects the gymnasium to the administration building. It will have a basement for a supply and storage area. Lockers for junior high students will be in the walkway.

The new wing should be completed by September so that it will be ready for use for the 1974-75 school year.

New ticket machines — in English!

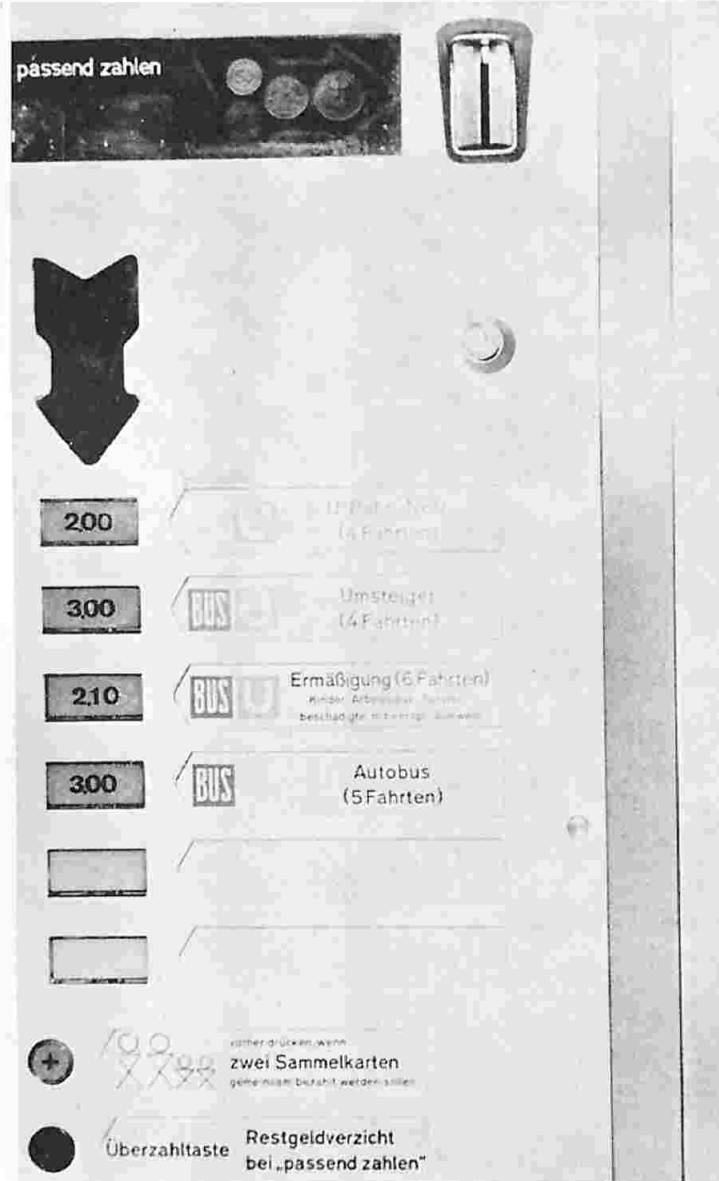
Has the language problem kept you from buying tickets on the buses and subways in Berlin? Well, your problems are over. The city transit authority, the BVG, has installed ticket-selling machines at McNair and Andrews Barracks.

At the suggestion of the U. S. Command, the BVG (Berliner Verkehrs-Betriebe) installed the machines last week. The machines have English instructions for using them. The machines dispense Sammelkarten (multiple-ride tickets) for buses and U-Bahns (subways) and Umsteiger-Sammelkarten (transfer tickets for transferring from bus to bus and between buses and U-Bahns).

The machine at McNair is located inside the compound near the Goerzallee entrance. The machine at Andrews is located at the Labor Service guard house inside the Finckensteinallee entrance.

Simply choose the ticket you want and push the button for that ticket before you insert your money. Buying these multiple-ride tickets saves you money. For example, a one-way ticket (Einfach) on a bus costs 70 pfennigs. The

Multiple-Ride-Ticket Automat

Dear Passenger:

This machine issues 4 different multiple-ride-tickets. Only the empty spaces on the ticket are still useable. The two spaces on the backside are only to be used for the 5th and 6th ride of the discount multiple-ride-ticket.

The following coins may be used:
10 Pfennig, 50 Pfennig, 1 DM, 2 DM.

- U-Bahn system only (4 rides)
- Transfer between buses and U-Bahn (4 rides)
- Discount Primarily for children (6 rides)
- Autobus, one line only (5 rides)

Push button prior to inserting money when you desire to pay for 2 multiple-ride-tickets at one time.

Tariff Directives:

A change of trains within the U-Bahn system is not considered as a transfer. Your U-Bahn-ticket is good for rides throughout the U-Bahn system. You must however take the next train at each change. Transfer tickets are valid for 120 minutes, the right of transfer expires after 90 minutes. When traveling, you must adhere to the BVG regulations.

Refunds:

The LS Guard at the gate will arrange for a refund if the machine takes your money and does not give you a ticket. Some U-Bahn stations use automatic cancelling machines. Insert your ticket into the machine. If it does not cancel your ticket inform the U-Bahn personnel.

Kim Philips and Colleen Gilligan in duet acting and by Page Wertebaker in oral interpretation.

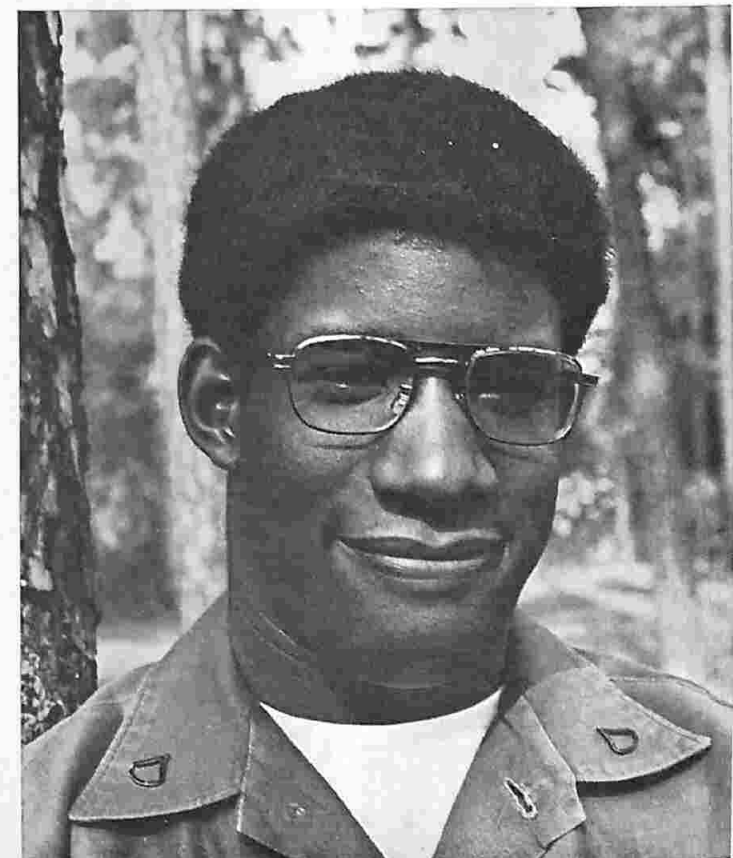

New DA 31 is explained

Just about anyone who has applied for leave recently has probably noticed that the Army now has a new DA Form 31 (Request & Authority for Leave). The new DA 31 is to be used for all leaves beginning after May 15. The old forms will no longer be used.

One big difference with the new form is that it must be used not only for ordinary leave, but for temporary duty (TDY) and for leave in conjunction with permanent change of station (PCS). In the latter case, the individual must take his completed form to the Finance & Accounting Office (FAO) when he processes out of the command and to the FAO at his new assignment when he processes in.

You will note in the sample form at left that Blocks 1-17 of Part I are more or less self-explanatory. Block 5 (Control Number) is for the use of the individual's orderly room and the FAO.

Blocks 18-24 are entirely new and eliminate the need for the orderly room to enter leave data on the DA Form 1 (Morning Report). If the approving authority (your company commander, for example) permits, you may phone in the data for Block 18, date and time of departure. The "authenticating authority" (Block 19) may be the first sergeant, the staff duty officer or whomever your commander authorizes. If you use the telephonic method, you must fill in the information in Blocks 18-19 of your individual copy. Your orderly room will enter the data on the organization copy.

The same instructions apply to Blocks 22-24 when you return from leave. However, the phone-in method may be used only if your commander says you may—he may require you to come to the orderly room before you depart.

Part II is for TDY, PCS, and leave in conjunction with PCS or TDY or both. Let's say you depart Berlin on PCS, and you will take leave en route. You will also pass in some TDY before you report to your new duty station—to attend school, for example. When you arrive at Kennedy Airport in New York, an Army office there will fill in Blocks 26a and 26b. From that point on, you'll be on leave, unless you go directly to TDY.

Your TDY station will fill in Block 26c when you arrive and 26d when you depart. There are provisions for as many as four TDY stations en route to the permanent station. If you need more blocks, use the "remarks" section.

Your new permanent station will use Blocks 27-29 when you arrive. The information in Part II will be used by the FAO to compute leave and travel time so you'll be paid correctly.

A special note to first sergeants: Leave requests received in orderly rooms prior to July 1 must be assigned a control number for the current fiscal year, even if the leave will begin after June 30. Leave requests received after June 30 will be assigned a control number for fiscal year '75.
