The commissary and you, the patron, are experiencing growing pains.

Since we only have one commissary, it couldn't be shut down while the expansion was being completed. So, the contractors have had to work around the shoppers in order to have the expansion ready as soon as possible. The only problem is, in order to keep the plaster from falling in your broccoli, the commissary personnel have to move the store items out of the way to allow the contractors to do their job.

When the commissary is finally completed, you'll have twice as much space to shop in. You'll also find that the store won't run out of items so quickly. You see, with the limited shelf space the commissary had before, the shoppers bought staple items (bread, milk, etc.) quicker than the store personnel could stock them, and so, they soon ran out. 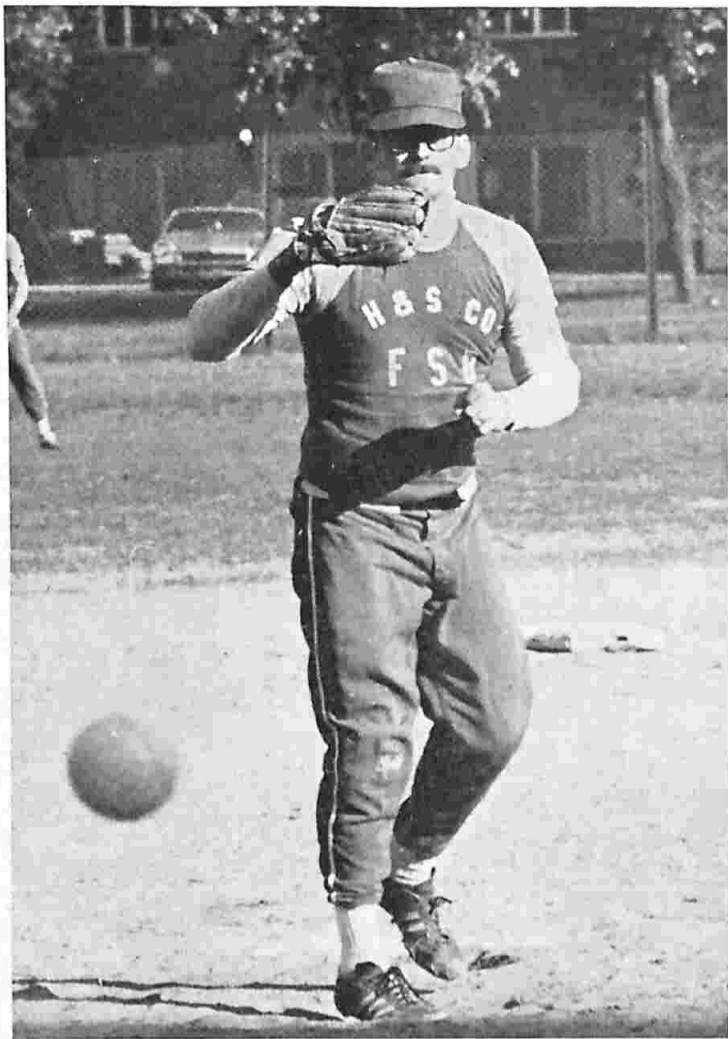
No other games were scheduled for May 27.

First time ever

DYA swimmers sink German team

The DYA-sponsored Berlin American Aquatic Club defeated the BSC-Robben Swimming Team May 19, 1974. This marked the first time that the BAAC has ever beaten a German opponent. The Americans dominated the entire meet and left no doubt in the opposition's mind that this is now a much improved team.

Six weeks ago the BAAC came in third in a triangular meet in which the same BSC-Robben team came in first.

Stellar performances were turned in by Klaus Erb, three firsts and one second; Brian Storer, four firsts; and Susan Platt with four firsts.

Storer literally destroyed the 100-meter freestyle record of 1:09.4 which was previously held by Derrick

Fulton. Brian was clocked in at 1:08 in a thrilling race where he beat his opponent by a mere 2/10 of a second. Since joining the team four weeks ago, Brian has not yet been defeated in the nine races in which he has been entered.

The scoring for BAAC was very evenly distributed with 12 swimmers scoring in double figures. The high scoring boys were: B. Storer (22), K. Erb (20), B. Lahue (15), J. Baker (13), Robert Wenzel (12) and Richard Wenzel (10). Among the girls there are also six in double figures: S. Platt (22), A. Lahue (15), E. Stapleton (13), K. Werner (12), A. Cochran (12) and M. Shachnow (11).

Overall for the season, which is coming to a close soon, the high scorers are: M. Shachnow and J. Baker who tied

for first with 91 points, D. Holsapple with 78, B. Lahue with 24 and K. Erb with 73.

To have a successful swimming team there are a few things that are absolutely necessary. Suggestions roll in

The Berlin Observer recently announced that an SFC, whose suggestion was processed and approved in one month received a cash award of \$345 based on an annual savings to the government of \$5,827.79. Well he's done it again. He designed a secondary locking device that can be applied to all Army vehicles with the lateral steering system. For this idea the SFC earned a cash award of \$100.

Other recent awards include: \$140 to an SFC and a SP5 of Special Troops who shared the award for a suggestion which resulted in a revision of AEBA Form 034002, thereby eliminating errors in the records of attendance and certificates of completion of Race Relations Seminars. This has reduced administrative errors and increased manpower efficiency at an annual estimated savings of \$1,785.

An SFC of Service Company was given \$40 for his idea that AG Division add USAHB and the McNair Dispensary to the distribution on reassignment and PCS orders. This will eliminate of the misplacement and greatly improve the handling of medical records.

Many good suggestions are being received daily but more are needed. Ideas like the one's above that will help the Army in doing its work better.

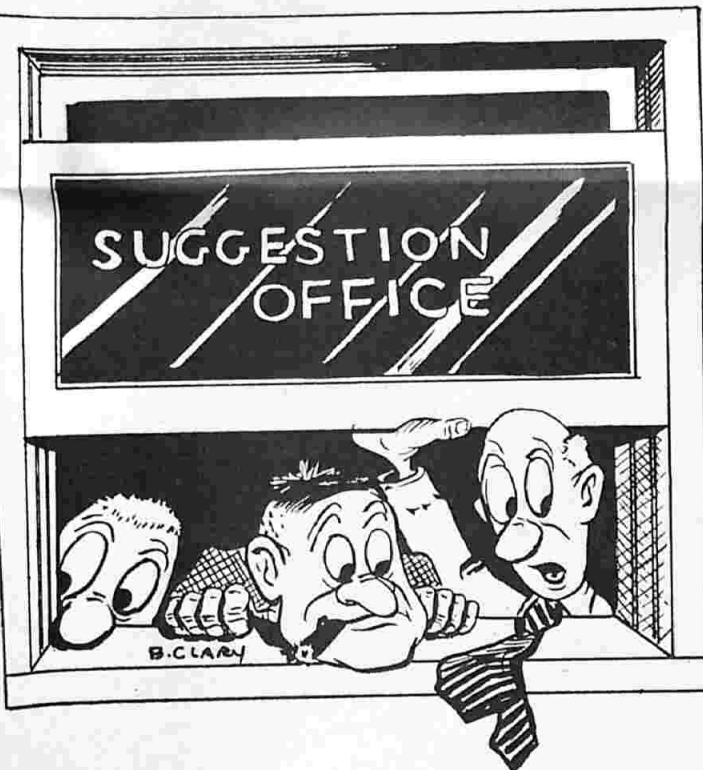

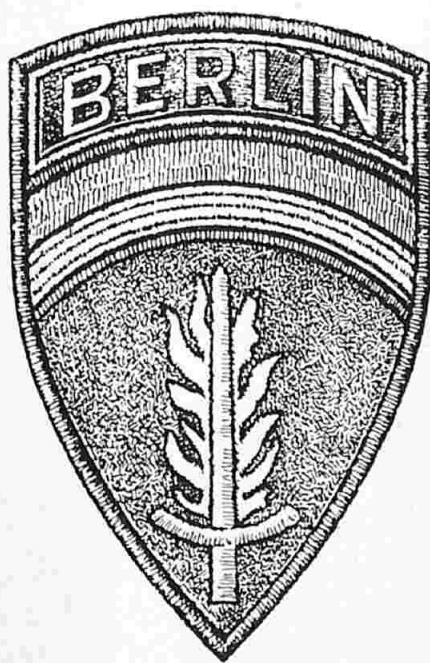
MG Cobb completes his tour in Berlin

Biography of MG Cobb

Major General Cobb entered upon active military duty in January 1941 as an enlisted man. In May 1941, he received a direct commission as a second lieutenant.

During World War II, he served in the Southwest Pacific Theater as a platoon leader and later as a company commander in the 503d Parachute Infantry Regiment from 1942 to 1944.

Upon return to the United States he served at the Parachute School, Fort Benning, Georgia, first as the Supervisor of Parachute Jump Training and later as the Director of Parachute Training.

With the outbreak of the conflict in Korea, he was assigned to Headquarters X Corps as Operations Officer, G-3 Section, during the period 1950 to 1951.

In 1952, General Cobb joined the 1st Armored Division at Fort Hood, Texas, where he served as Operations Officer for the 81st Reconnaissance Battalion and later as Assistant Division G-3.

In 1954, he assumed command of the 4th Armored Reconnaissance Battalion (Separate) in Linz, Austria, with the mission of patrolling the United States-Soviet line of demarcation along the Danube River.

He served on the Staff and Faculty of the Command and General Staff College, Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, from 1955 to 1958.

In 1959, he was assigned to the United States Army Missile Command, Redstone Arsenal, Alabama, serving as a weapons system project manager.

In 1962, General Cobb went to Okinawa where he served successively as the Special Assistant to the High Commissioner and later as the Deputy Civil Administrator of the Ryukyu Islands.

Returning to the United States in 1965, General Cobb assumed command of the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment at Fort George G. Meade, Maryland. After a period of reorganization and training, he deployed the regiment to South Vietnam in August 1966 and commanded the regiment in combat until May 1967 when he was assigned as Assistant Chief of Staff, G-3, II Field Force, Vietnam.

Upon return to the United States in September 1967, he became Assistant Commandant of the United States Armor School, Fort Knox, Kentucky.

In October 1969, General Cobb was assigned to Germany as Assistant Division Commander of the 4th Armored Division stationed in the Nürnberg-Fürth area. In February 1970, he assumed command of the 4th Armored Division with headquarters at Göppingen, Germany.

Major General William W. Cobb assumed his present duties as United States Commander, Berlin on May 12, 1971.

General Cobb is scheduled to become the Director of Command and Control and Military Support, Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff for Military Operations, Department of the Army at the Pentagon.

Major General Sam S. Walker, currently the Commander of the 3d Infantry Division in Würzburg, will replace General Cobb at a change of command ceremony to be held June 10 at the United States Command Headquarters.

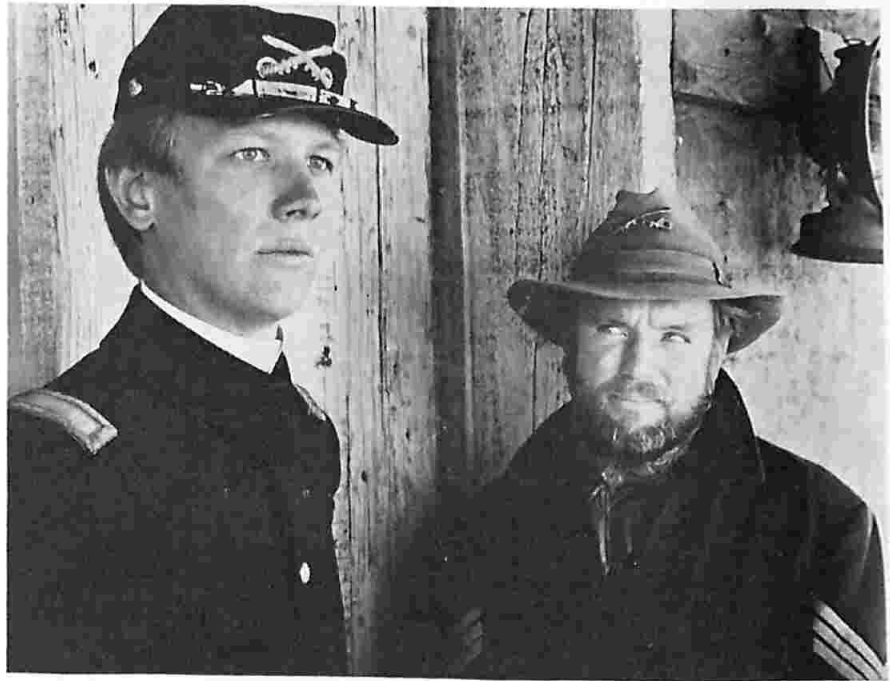

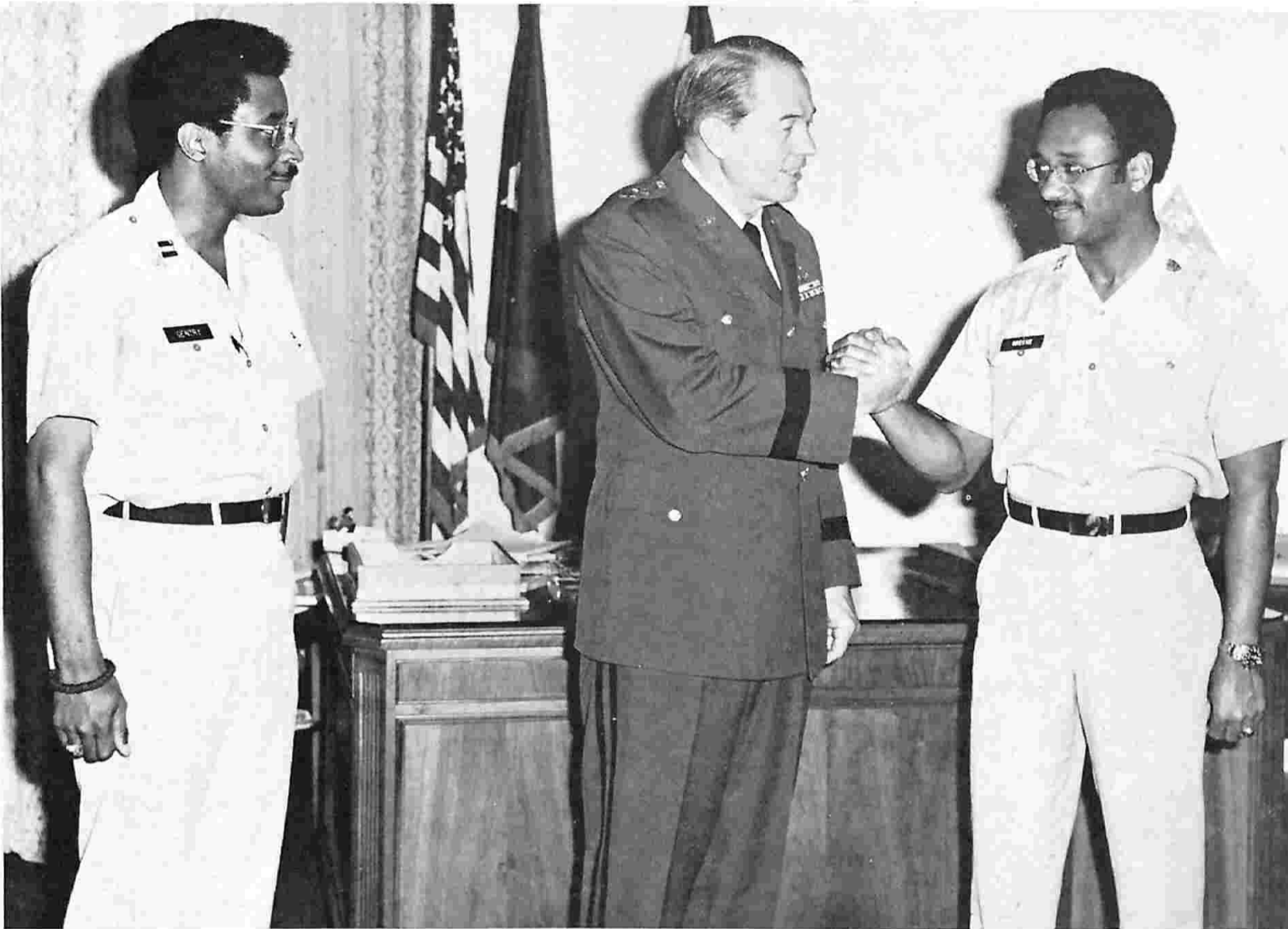

New EOSO

Green replaces Gentry

Captain Charles Green took over as the Berlin Command Equal Opportunity Staff Officer (EOSO) Tuesday as CPT Joseph W. Gentry, the command's and USAREUR's first such officer, departed the command. Gentry will attend the Adjutant General's Officer Career Course at Ft. Benjamin Harrison, Ind.

Gentry assumed the job as EOSO in December 1972. At the time, the goal of the program was to get a handle on the sensitive state of race relations in the command, and to help to achieve a state in which the individual, regardless of race, could achieve his full potential in the United States Army in Berlin.

HAS THE EQUAL OPPORTUNITY and race relations program achieved its goals? "No," said Gentry. But, he said, we now have the programs needed to reach those goals, such as race relations councils, dependent and military race relations seminars, and programs for students at the Berlin American High School.

While the tools are there, Gentry pointed out, there are some in the system who don't want to utilize them. Thus, enforcement is still necessary.

GENTRY'S BIGGEST SATISFACTION in his tenure here came when the community worked together to produce the Ethnic Expo last November. This proved, he said, that people of various races and ethnic backgrounds can work together.

The former EOSO had four final points to make to the command as he left:

- The most dangerous enemy is complacency over the small amount of progress made so far. That progress can reverse very quickly and easily.
- Until a large majority start working together, there will be no real racial progress.
- Hope is absolutely necessary by those working for racial harmony. They should not, despite ridicule, hard-core racist acts by majority members and bigoted attitudes by minority group individuals, give up hope, or else all is lost.
- To racists and bigots, he said that they must recognize that if their attitudes continue, the destruction of America will be in their hands.

Gentry also wanted to thank Major General William W. Cobb, and Brigadier Generals Harold I. Hayward, Raymond O. Miller and Robert D. Stevenson, without whose support nothing could have been accomplished. "It was," Gentry said, referring to his time in Berlin, "an experience I'll never forget."

GREEN, THE NEW EOSO, has been in Berlin since October 1971 and has known Gentry for several years. He had formal training in his new job at the Defense Race Relations Institute, Patrick Air Force Base, Florida, last September.

His goal is to do all he can "to promote the American dream," which he said was stated in the Declaration of Independence, that "all men are created equal." As an American and a member of the U.S. Army, Green said he believed he could do most for his goal in his new job.

Recruiters in Europe

The Army's seven-man recruiting team now touring Europe, in an effort to reach prospective enlistees in the Delayed Entry Program (DEP) in their meetings with high school seniors.

According to Major Delbert L. Collins, officer in charge of the team, the DEP is considered an outstanding program for the senior enlistee who has decided to go into the service after graduation. DEP allows the enlistee to join the Army up to 270 days before actually reporting for active duty.

Time spent in the DEP also counts towards pay and allowances upon entering active duty. Anyone enlisting under the DEP for four months prior to entering active duty is qualified to enter basic training as an E2—that's a promotion before the enlistee even enters active duty! This means a DEP enlistee receives a starting salary of over \$360 a month, or almost \$40 more than someone who enters the Army under normal enlistment.

Any dependent student wishing more information of the DEP or any of the Army's programs, can talk with members of the recruiting team. School guidance counselors can provide full details about the team's scheduled appearance in appropriate school districts.

U.S. dependents get tax break in economy jobs

Many dependents of members of the U. S. Forces, Berlin, are employed with firms on the German economy and have to pay German income tax. In the past, German tax authorities have refused to give these dependents an income tax refund. By negotiating with the Berlin Senator for Finance, the Staff Judge Advocate, has obtained a change in this decision. Dependents of members of the U. S. Forces, Berlin, working on the economy are now entitled to a tax refund and possibly will receive a better tax classification.

To file for an income tax refund for 1973, contact the German Finance Office in Zehlendorf at 20 Martin-Buber Strasse. There you can obtain the necessary forms and get assistance in filling them out.

This decision does not apply to dependents who are employed with the U. S. Forces.
