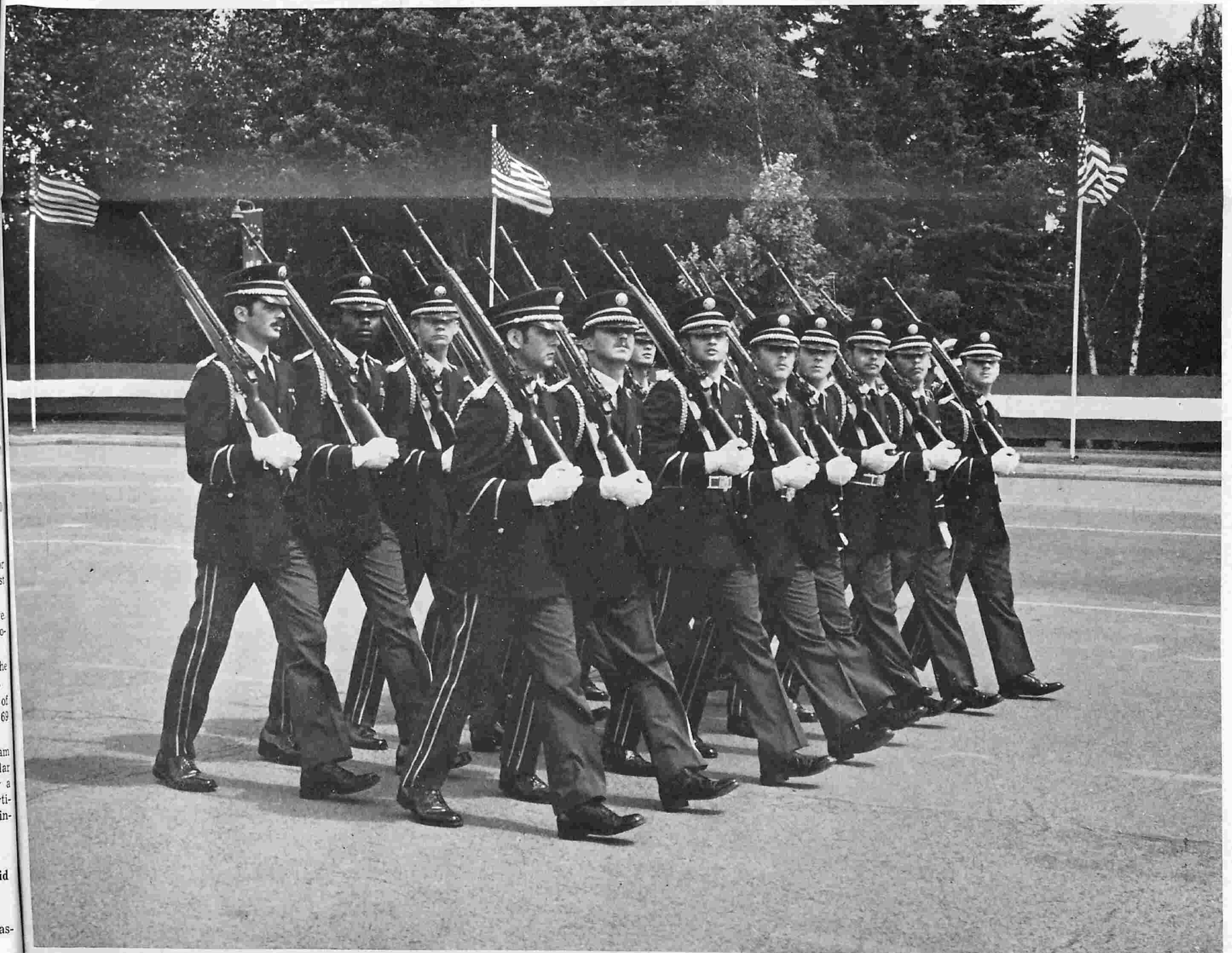

The drivers, assisted by one crew member, ran to the cars, jumped in, buckled up their seat and shoulder harnesses, secured their helmets, and then started the cars and entered the race. Needless to say, it was an interesting start. There were heat races in all classes and there were also two mechanics races, enabling the workers on the cars to get on the track and try out the cars they have labored to build and keep running.

One of the big highlights of the day was the Race of the Commanders. This race saw Chaplain (Lieutenant Colonel) Chris Martin from TCA (the Air Force name) pitted against Lieutenant Colonel Thomas J. Hogan, Battalion Commander of Special Troops, Berlin Brigade (representing the Army). This race was a five-lap event and LTC Hogan led all the way until the final lap when here came the Flyin' Sky Pilot out of turn two taking the lead and going on to receive the Checkered Flag. "It is the Air Force," announced the track announcer.

Chaplain Martin defeated Colonel Myron G. Smith, Commander of TCA at the Grand Opening of Friendship Raceway to become the TCA Champ and now he has also defeated the Army to become the Overall Commander's Champion. Congratulations to Chaplain Martin and once again it was Air Force over Army in the last lap of the race — too bad, Army!

15 graduate from MAPTOE course

MAP-TOE graduated a class of 15 Monday. So what is MAP-TOE? It's a three week course in management practices. MAP-TOE stands for management practices in table of organization of equipment units.

Not many people know about MAP-TOE. Their motto is "Work smarter—not harder," and the men in charge of the course try to help supervisors do just that.

During the first week of the three week course, the participants get classroom instruction on management principles and practices. For the next two weeks they go back to their jobs and apply the techniques they have learned. While they are on their "OJT" they are visited by the two instructors now and then to see how their new practices are working out. At the end of the three weeks there is a results session to discuss any improvements derived from the MAP-TOE course. The men share any ideas that might help the others in their class.

Classes taught at MAP-TOE are methods of improvement techniques, Army management processes, quality assurance, work measurement and motivation. Mr. John C. Moak, Jr., Chief of Management Analysis in the Comptroller's Office says "The primary area concerned in the course is administrative management but we encourage everyone to practice good management in all areas."

To get into the course, people are selected like this: the comptroller makes a list of people in first-line supervisory positions and sends it and a schedule of class dates to the unit. Then the MAP-TOE projects officer in the unit selects the people and dates they are to attend the course. But it is possible for anyone to volunteer for the course. Anyone interested in learning good management practices (and earning three promotion points) should let their first sergeant, projects officer, or supervisor know about it and chances are he can arrange it for you.

Specialist 4 Charles (Chuck) B. Foley is a performing arts specialist with the Music and Theatre Branch of Recreational Services. In November, '72, Chuck arrived in Berlin, and soon afterwards, the Prophets were born. "I was looking for

a band, and me, Tim Mac Wright, and Ed Green started the group. The first place we played was the Harnack House."

Since then, MacWright has left Berlin, and Chuck and Ed Green, band director and First Sergeant at the 298th Army Band, are the two original Prophets left.

Very serious business

"Music is a very serious business," said Chuck, "there's a lot of lonely people out there, and a word in a song can sometimes boost them up. I try to keep busy as much as possible. I like to offer something to the people in my songs . . . to get people together."

Chuck is constantly changing and improving the Prophets. "I'd like to get into some dance and showtype stuff," he said, "to give the people more than just music."

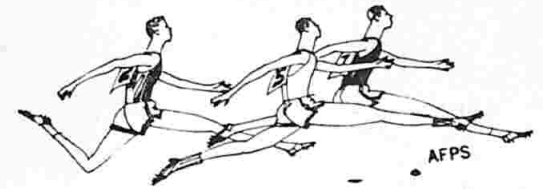
Band will be recording

Tourney needs trackers

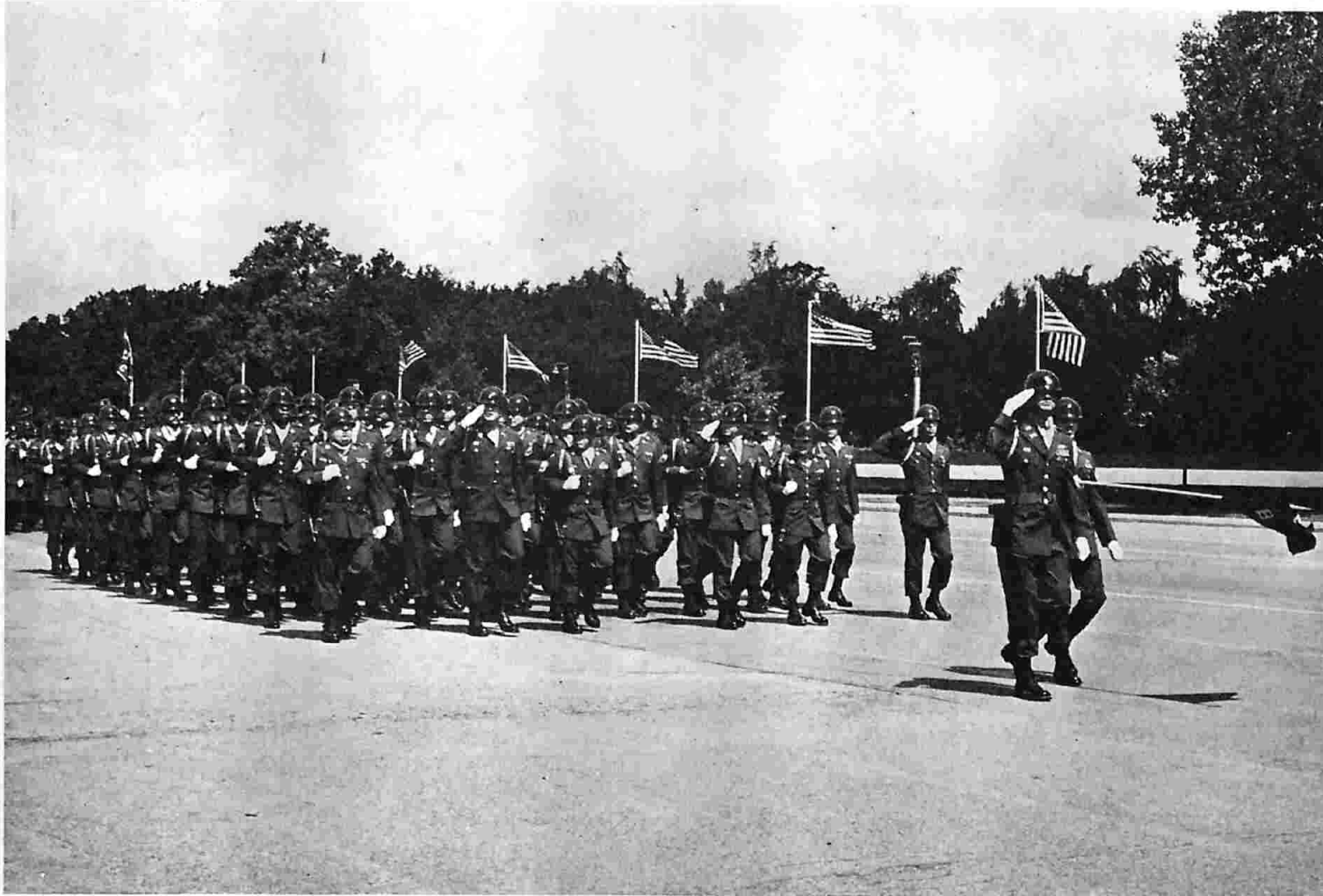

4th of July held dual meaning

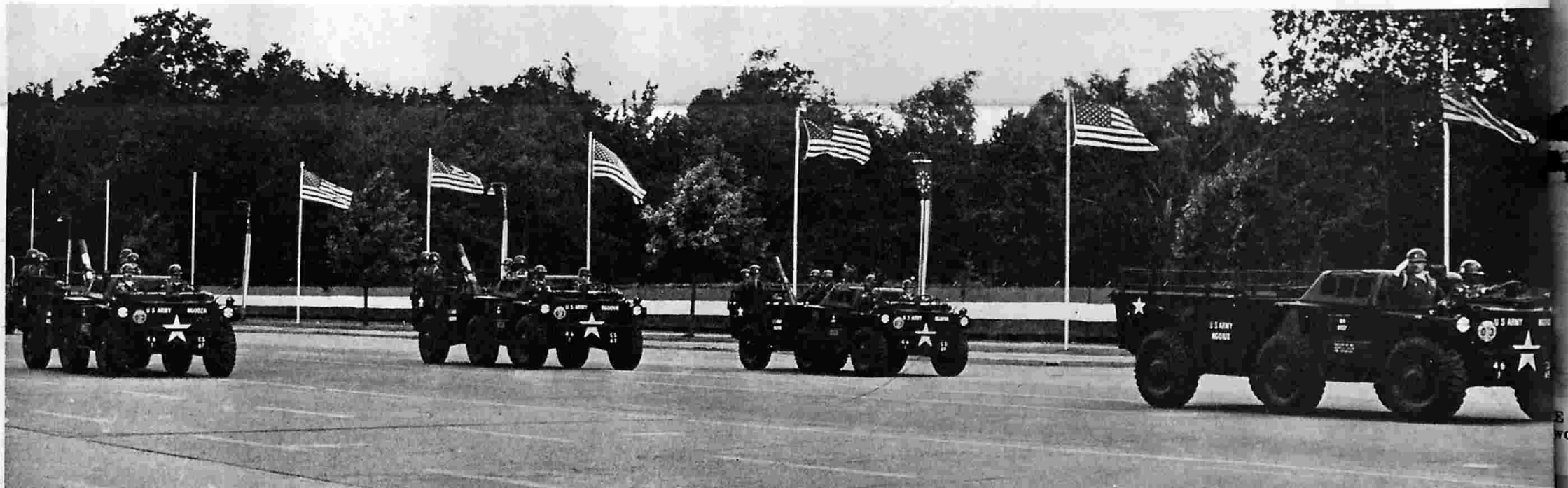
July 4th has a double meaning for Americans in Berlin. Not only is it the day the United States declared its independence but it was also the day in 1945 that United States forces occupied Berlin.

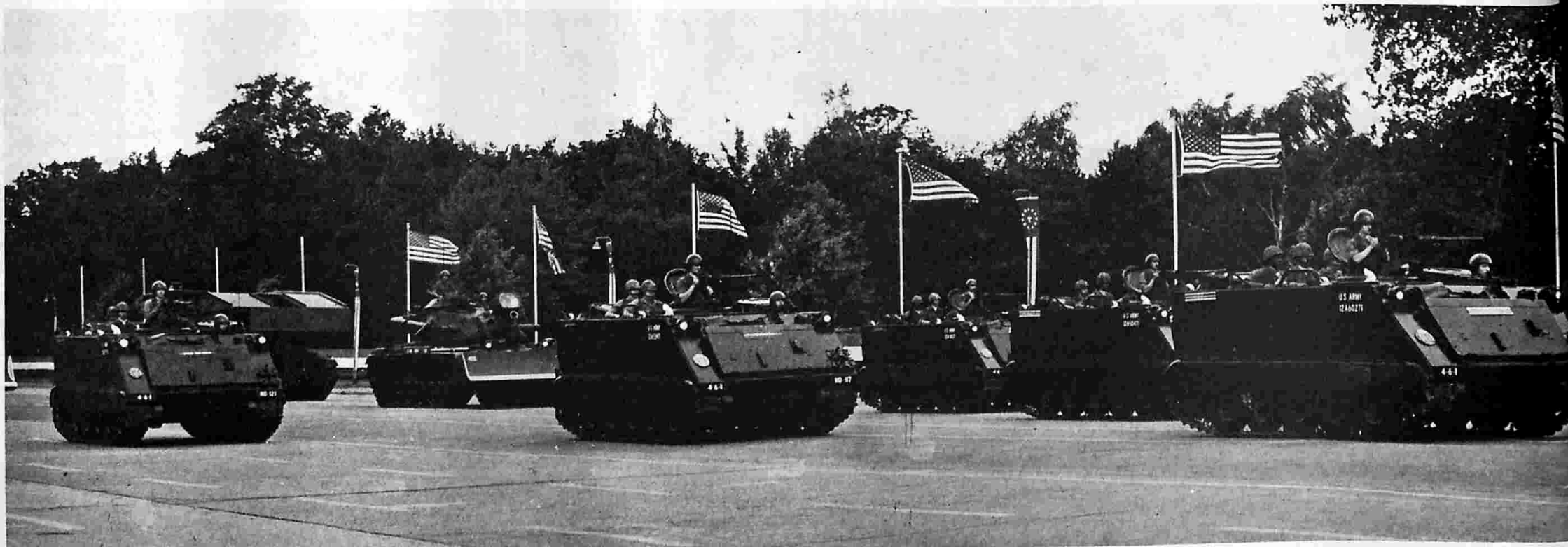

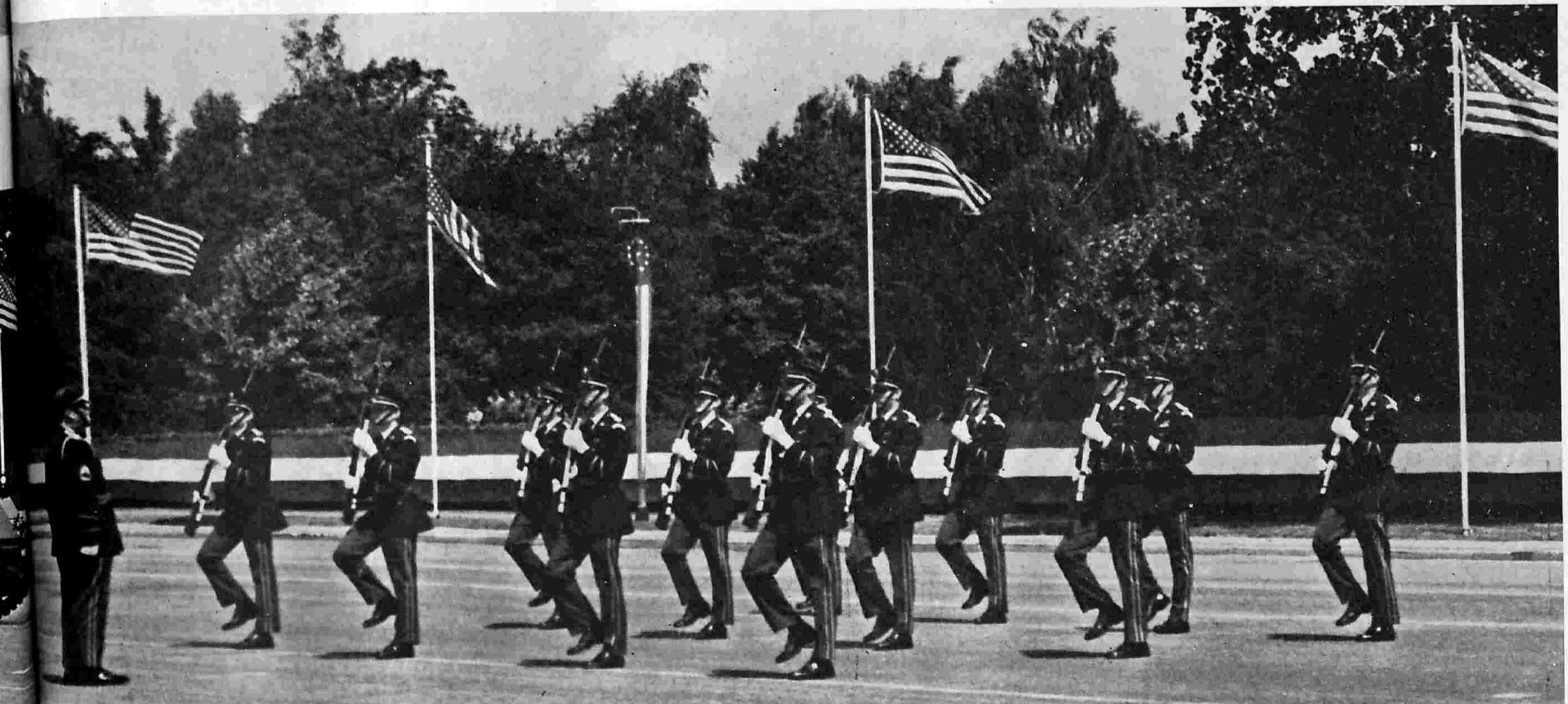

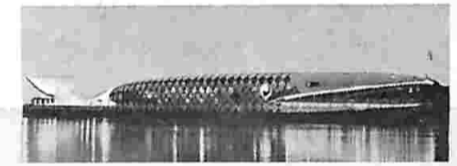

Two and a half years in Berlin — a long time, it seemed at first, but how fast it went by, now that they're gone. I'm gone too, right now on a PanAm flight somewhere over the Atlantic. History should teach us lessons, and our own histories are no different. Let me reflect upon my own experience of the past 30 months, and hopefully some of you, as well as myself, will profit.

One of my biggest discoveries while here was the weekend. It's amazing how much territory one can cover in two or three days! So try to leave the city once a month or so, on a two- or three-day pass. You can see everything in West Germany, the Benelux, Denmark and even the closer parts of France, Switzerland and Austria this way. Take advantage of the R&R program and religious retreats. Don't let opportunity pass you by, as I did my first year here.

Meanwhile, don't forget the city you're living in and to get out and see it. And enjoy it: the Grunewald and Wannsee in the summer, and all the night life and culture throughout the year.

Berlin is a good place to get into a regular fitness program, with the swimming pools, gyms, company-level sports program and the great outdoors so accessible.

And don't pass up the opportunity to learn to speak German the best way, right here where it's the real thing.

A few harsher lessons

There are a few harsher lessons that I've learned on the staff of *The Berlin Observer*. One is that few people read editorials, so you who are reading this can count yourselves as being in a minority. Though I have no statistics to prove it, it's probably true that safety and drug and alcohol articles are read even less. Sorry, all you writers of little readership, but the anonymous "Synopsisizer" has his movie reviews the most read section of the paper.

I know that Europe's wonderful, yet something seems to lack:

The Past is too much with her, and the people look back.

But the glory of the Present is to make the Future free. We love our land for what she is and what she is to be. Oh, it's home again, and home again, America for me. I want a ship that's western bound to plough the main sea,

ASC can help you

The Army Community Service can help you: with the establishment of the National Army Community Service program in 1965, the army created a central agency to provide information and counseling, and to give assistance to the military community.

Just as each community is unique, so is each ACS program that serves that community. In Berlin our program gives special emphasis to the waiting wife, the resident widow, the resident retired person, and the non-command sponsored couple. However, every ACS center exists for the sole purpose of serving the entire military community.

Our ACS program is largely dependent on volunteer help to staff our service committees, to provide the nucle-

us of our workforce, and to help plan new programs. The volunteer is our liaison with the community — the backbone of our program.

ACS volunteers currently staff four committees: the office committee, the lending closet, the newsletter and publicity, and welcoming. The office committee is responsible for information and referral during duty hours and provides paperwork for PX passes, and ID and ration card applications for eligible personnel. The lending closet committee offers a large variety of electrical appliances and pots and pans, china, kitchen utensils, linens, cribs, strollers, and many other items on a 90-day loan basis. Transformers are loaned for up to 30 days. The newsletter publicity committee publishes our monthly newsletter "Good Neighbor" and advertises special events and ACS news items. The welcoming committee extends a personal welcome to each new non-command sponsored wife arriving in Berlin and affords her a place to turn to if assistance is needed.

In addition to the services provided by the volunteer committees ACS also has a paperback book library, an extensive military post information library, and, by appointment, a sewing room, a fully equipped kitchen, and a meeting room.

ACS sponsors the economy couples' advisory committee composed of unit representatives from Andrews and McNair. All economy couples are urged to bring their community problems to the attention of their unit representatives. The council tries to solve economy-related problems through mutual self-help and understanding.

The professional staff at ACS will help any individual solve his or her problems, no matter how great or small.

During the summer the number of our volunteers decreases while our need for them is at its greatest. You desire to become a part of a much needed and valuable service to the American community in Berlin. Give your time to ACS. No experience is necessary, simply call 819-6500.

Gardens under glass is the topic of the July program at the Main Library, Berlin Command; especially arranged for those who are interested in gardening at home.

There is something fascinating about looking at plants through glass — they become a living landscape in a world of their own.
