

Tempelhof open house sets new record

The Tempelhof Central Airport open house ended Sunday after a record breaking crowd, estimated at more than 330,000, visited the display. This was the tenth and largest exhibition displayed at the airport.

This year's theme of the Air Force-Army show was "Help From the Air". The show was highlighted by pictorial exhibits of the United States Space Program and models of different space vehicles.

Numerous aircraft were on display at the airport including the C-54 "Galaxy," the largest plane in the world, and a hot air balloon supplied by the Westphalia Petrol Co. Also on static display were the C-130 "Hercules", C-141 "Starlifter", USAF T-39, T-29, and more, including four British aircraft.

A U. S. space exhibit which covered 300 square meters traced the space program from the beginning to present. Also attending the affair was a parachute club from Mannheim. Other events included the 298th U. S. Army Band; Army Drill team; M-60 machine gun demonstration; and an Army Bridge vehicle demonstration.

Some of the Army units that participated were; the 592nd Signal Co.; 42nd Engineers; C-95 Artillery; 40th Armor; Bravo Company 2nd Bn, 6th Infantry. All of the units provided their own interpreters for the occasion.

Checks

New cashing policy

The U. S. Treasury Department has directed that the following check cashing policy be implemented at the American Express Company (AMEXCO) Military Banking Facility effective immediately.

- Stateside checks will be cashed only for the drawer or the payee named therein.
- United States Treasury checks, postal money orders, and checks drawn on military banking and finance facilities will be cashed without a service charge.
- Checks drawn on financial institutions in the United States, exclusive of unqualified paper, will be cashed for amounts not to exceed \$100 each. The charge will be 25 cents each, whether an account with the facility is maintained or not.
- Checks exceeding \$100 may be accepted for collection, the charge will be 25 cents per \$100.
- Cashing of unqualified papers (certified checks, bank drafts, money orders) is not limited to \$100. The charge will be 25 cents per \$100, whether an account is maintained or not.
- An account holder may deposit a stateside check to his account to avoid payment of check cashing charges but may not withdraw the proceeds for five days. The limitation of \$100 is then waived.

There will be no need to look for a place to stay or park in Munich during Oktoberfest, you can stay at a Garmisch hotel and take a bus to the festivities.

Stops will be made at all GRA hotels with the last stop before leaving for Munich at the GRA Billeting Office at 1:30 p.m. The return trip from Munich leaves the Oktoberfest grounds at 10 p.m. Charge for the round trip is \$3 per person.

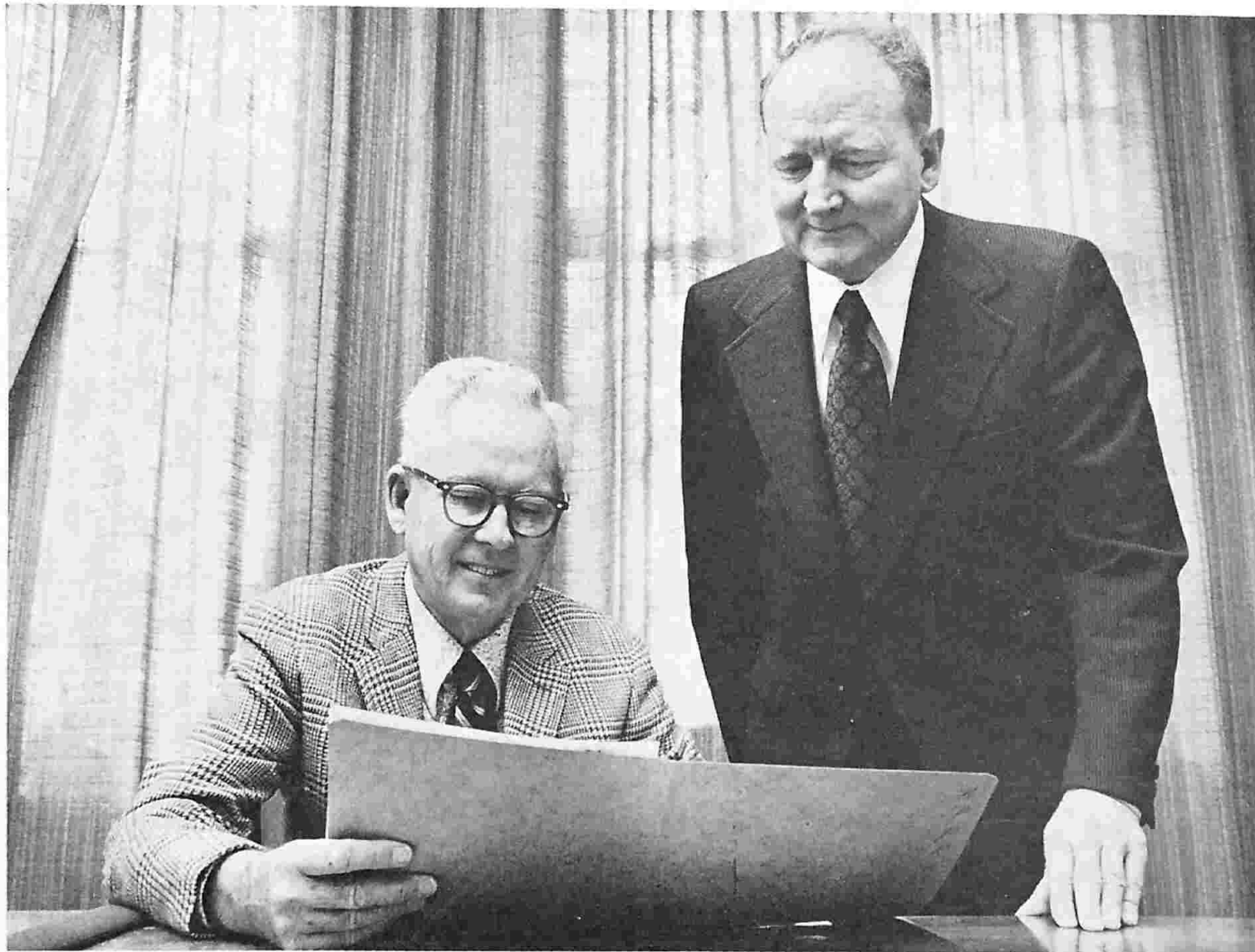

Hospital stops routine appointments for training

Personnel of the 279th Station Hospital (U. S. Army Hospital, Berlin) will undergo three days of intensive training during the period of September 17-19. This training, which will be presented quarterly, will include four hours instruction of mandatory subject material for all personnel, and 24 hours in medical technique and procedures for personnel whose duties involve direct patient care.

Personnel whose duties are not directly related to patient care will receive twenty hours of instruction including emergency medical procedures, selected military subjects, and job related training. Physicians, nurses, noncommissioned officers, and specialists will provide the instruction.

Local National personnel will maintain the operation of the hospital during normal duty hours, while military personnel will continue to staff the wards and departments during the evening and night shifts. During this three day period, the Outpatient Department will continue to handle emergencies or medical conditions that cannot wait. All other clinics except Psychiatry will not be scheduling routine appointments.

This modification of the hospital schedule and training schedule is necessary so that all personnel may be available to participate in a meaningful training program which will ultimately result in improved medical treatment for the American military and civilian community. The cooperation of the community during this three day period will be greatly appreciated.

Ann Landers visits Germany

Sixty million readers, of 800 newspapers throughout the world, would probably respond with blank expressions when asked to identify Esther Pauline Friedman Lederer — but would instantly recognize the lady's famous pen name, "Ann Landers."

Writer of the celebrated advice column, Ann Landers is a 56-year-young dispenser of pithy wisdom whose crisp, to-the-point counsel has established her, in the words of former Vice President Hubert Humphrey, "as one of the nation's great natural resources."

Vis a vis USAREUR teens, the famed counselor on human relations will be "letting it all hang out" when she conducts rap sessions at this year's Teen Forum October 12-14 in Berchtesgaden.

Some 300 American and Canadian youths, aged 15 to 19, from Holland, Belgium, England, Italy and Germany, are expected to participate in forum discussions on such varied topics as teen sex, drugs, parental apathy, mixed marriages, homosexuality and social adjustment.

Affectionately dubbed "Eppie" by her friends among the world's most important people, Esther Pauline Friedman Lederer describes herself as "an upper-middle-class, Midwestern, Jewish girl, from Sioux City, Iowa." She is married to Jules Lederer, a successful real estate executive, has a daughter and three grandchildren, and resides in the "Windy City" where the first "Ann Landers"

column appeared in the Chicago SUN TIMES in 1955. As might be expected of a person wholly dedicated to helping people from all walks of life, Ann Lederer is a "compulsive civic do-gooder" on an impressive scale — being a member of the National Board of the American Cancer Society, the Sponsors Committee for the Mayo Medical School, a trustee of the Menningen Foundation, a member of the Visiting Committee for the Board of Overseers of the Harvard Medical School, and the only woman member of the American Medical Association Advisory Committee.

school assemblies. Her prolific pen (some 7000 daily columns since 1955 PLUS answering as many as 100 letters a day) has produced a trio of best-selling books — **Since you ask me, Ann Landers talks to teenagers about sex, and Truth is stranger.** Other popular "Eppie" works include **Bugged by parents?**, **How to get more freedom Teenage Sex — Ten ways to cool it and Booze and you — For teenagers only.**

In addition to responding to thousands of advice-seeking letters a week, she also finds time to conduct a five-minute NBC network radio program.

Typical of Landers' salty advice to some 60 million readers: to a wife whose husband won't consult a marriage counselor: "While two heads are better than one, one head is better than none. Go alone."

To a teenager sick about being jilted: "Don't be like the worm in the horseradish who thinks it's the sweetest place in the world because it's the only place he's been. Date others and live a little!"

To the mother of a young man slapped with a paternity suit: "A 25-year-old man should know as much about birth control as a 28-year-old woman. You need a lawyer, not Ann Landers."

To a transvestite who wants to shop incognito: "Find a lady who sews and can keep her mouth shut."

To an opponent of abortion reform: "I believe a woman who does not want a child (whether she's single or married) should have the right to terminate a pregnancy in a hospital by a competent physician. She should not be forced to go to a back-alley butcher and risk her life. This decision should be made by the woman and her doctor, not the church or state."



She has been awarded a Presidential Citation (President Lyndon B. Johnson) for her tireless work on alcoholism and enjoys the distinction of having been named "Woman of the Year" for six national organizations. In a 1967 UPI (United Press International) poll, Ann was listed as one of the ten most influential women in the U. S.

In national demand as a guest speaker, the peripatetic Ann Landers delivers approximately 100 speeches a year before such diverse groups as medical societies and high

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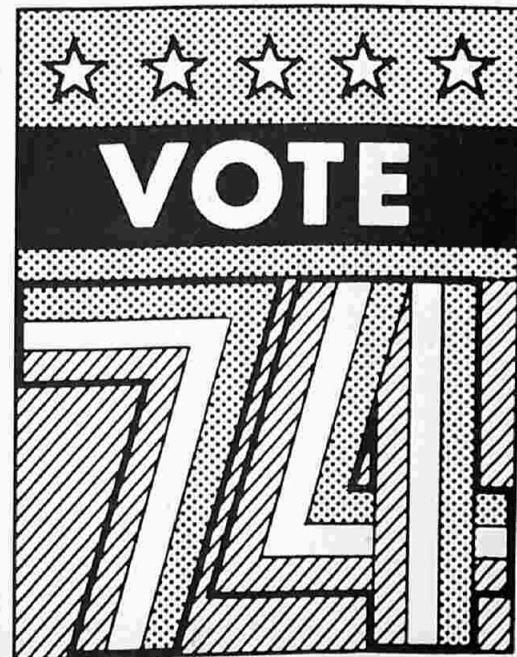

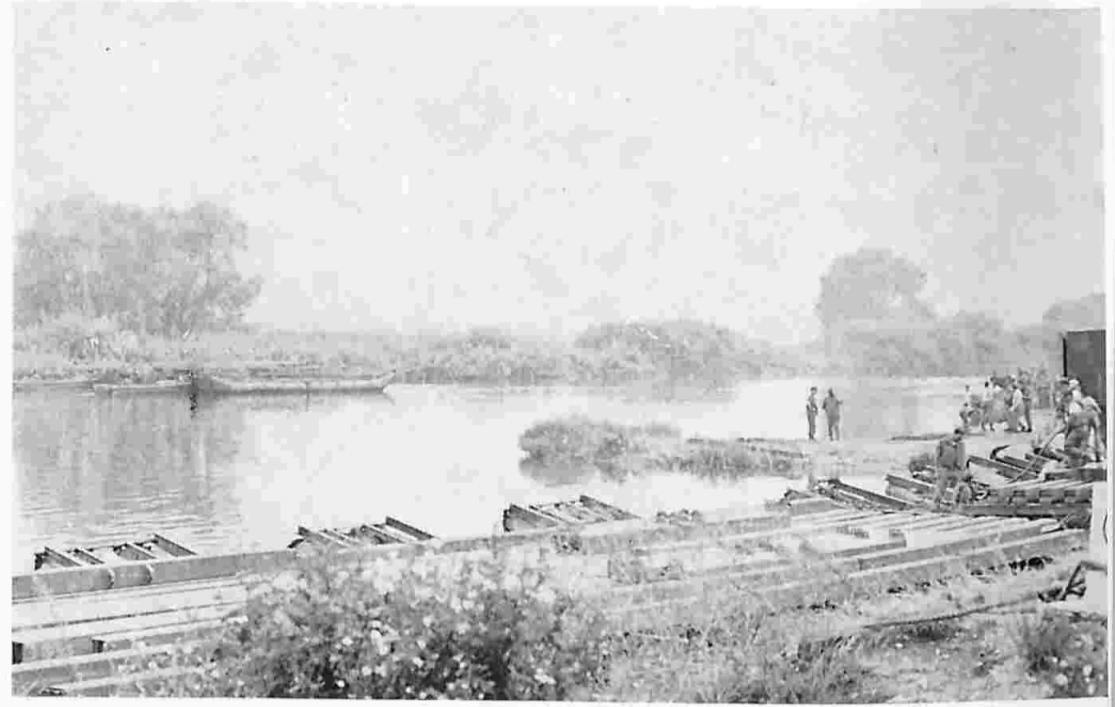

Like a bridge over troubled waters . . .

The 42nd Engineer Company added a new dimension to the Major Training Area at Wildflecken last month, by bridging the Main River, near Geilachshausen, FRG. The event was part of a seven-day exercise that included bivouacing, training on bridge equipment, and rafting operations. "E" Company of the 16th Engineer Battalion supplied the bridge, a M4T6 float type.

The exercise began on August 14, with the company's move from Wildflecken MTA to a wooded area near Volkach FRG, 80 miles to the south. There the company set up a bivouac site for the exercise. The support element from the 16th Engr. Bn. joined the 42nd Engineers at the site.

Training began the following day with basic instruction on the M4T6 float bridge and use of sections for rafting operations. The training continued thru the 16th and 17th with actual bridge construction, and operation of the rafts on the river. The rafts used, were capable of transporting vehicles up to class 60.

Later, with permission to close the river, by building the bridge completely across it, construction of the 240

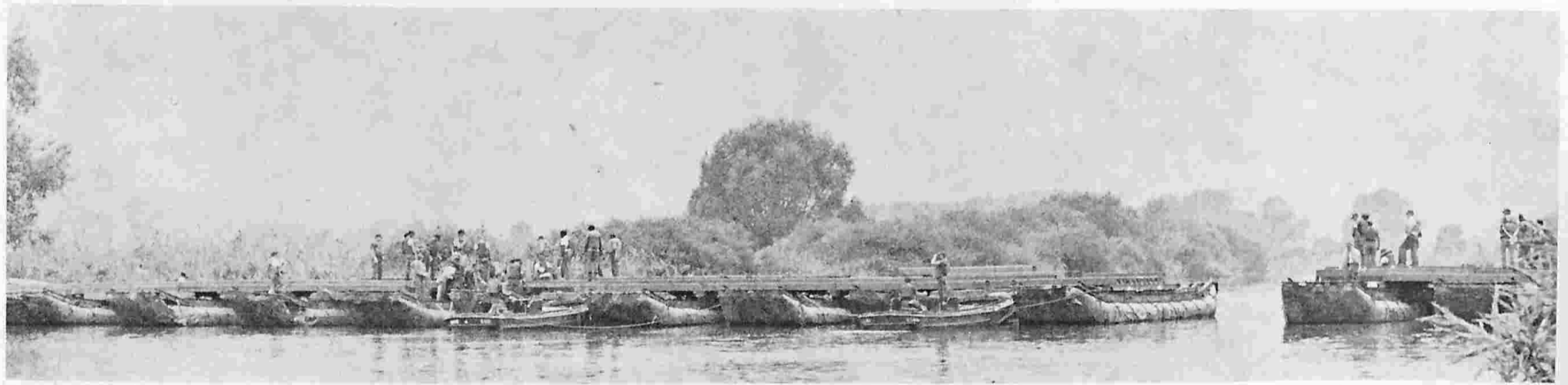
foot bridge began. End sections were floated into position and secured to the banks. With these sections in place, the center piece was brought into position. After the addition of the final sections and some maneuvering of the main body, the bridge was completed.

With the bridge completed, the Company Commander, Captain Rainer Schulz, received the traditional dunking in the river. This was followed with swims by the First Sergeant, all company officers, Lieutenant Colonel Thiede, Chief of E & I Division, and Lieutenant Colonel Hogan, Special Troops commander, also on hand for the closure.

The afternoon of the 18th and the next day were taken up with dismantling the bridge. The 16th Engineers returned to their home station, Furth, FRG on the 19th, with the 42nd's men clearing the bivouac area early the following day.

Other training at Wildflecken included weapons qualification and construction of the Bailey Bridge, another new experience for the 42nd Engineer Company.

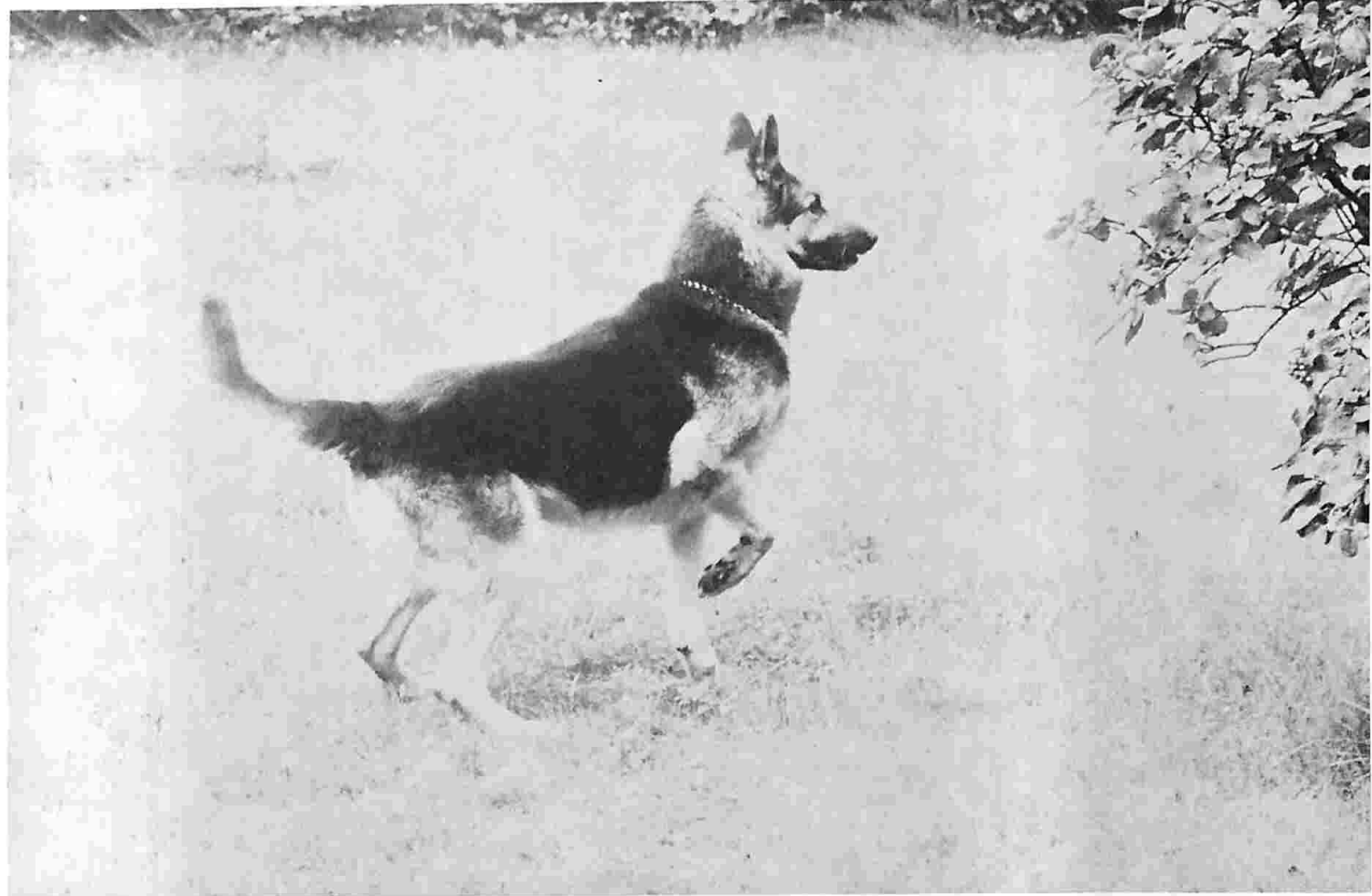

Narcotics detector aids Command

Buddy is a friendly, rambunctious, black and tan German Shepherd who loves playing with tennis balls during his off-duty hours. During duty hours, Buddy and his partner, Specialist Four James V. Darrow, make random checks of various buildings in the Berlin-American community, searching for concealed illegal drugs.

"It's all a game to him," said James, "We try to get him to relate the smell of the drugs to the praise he receives."

Buddy and James underwent a 13-week training course at Ft. Gordon, Ga. The course consisted of procedures in conducting searches for concealed drugs in buildings, automobiles, and warehouses.

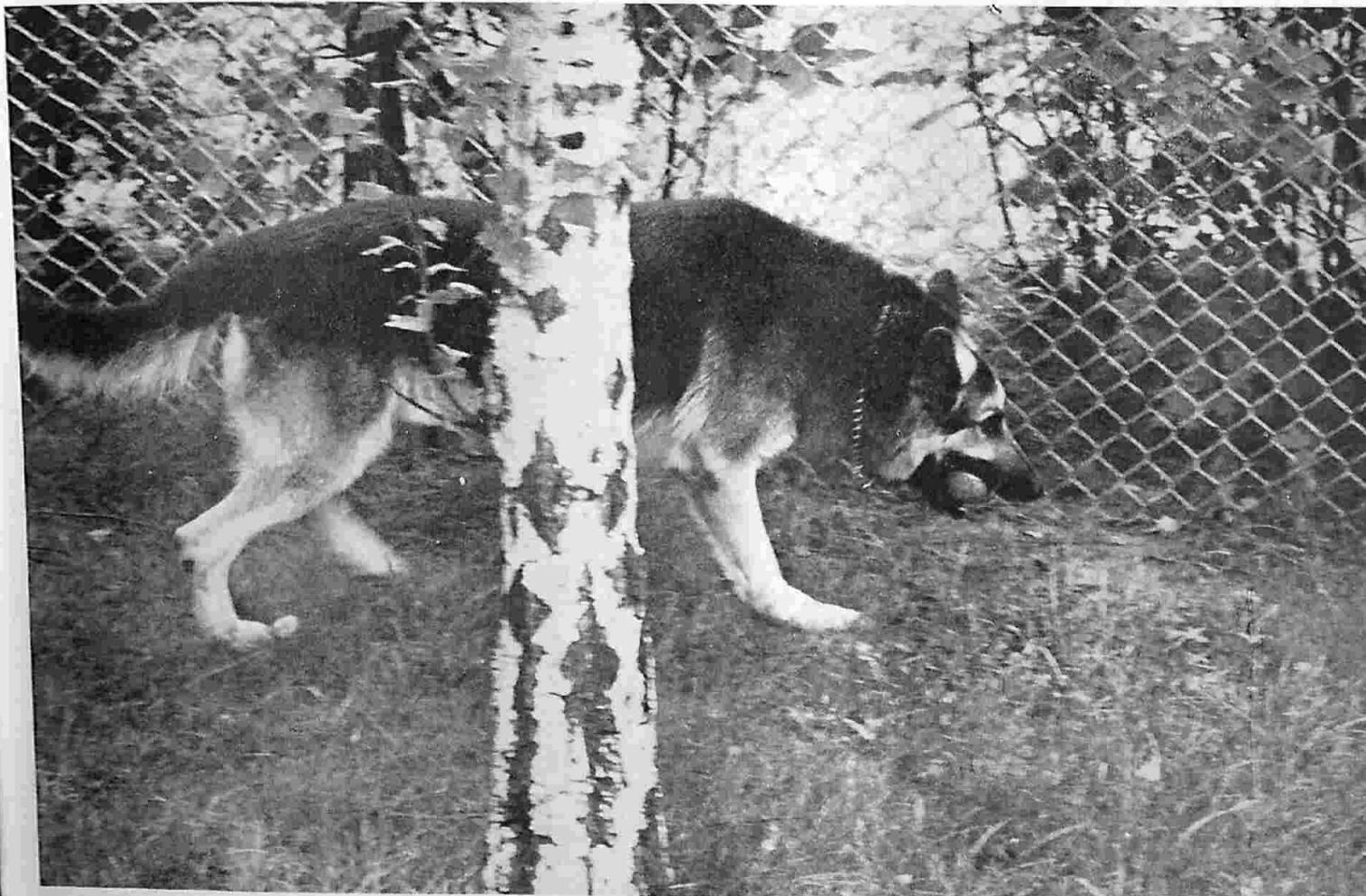
"It's up to the handler to recognize whenever a dog alerts (recognizes the smell of the drug and pulls his handler toward it)," said James, "and the handler must be able to differentiate between alerts on drugs, food, or other dogs."

Buddy and James have been a team for about 2½ years. Prior to their assignment in Berlin with the 42nd Military Police Customs, they were stationed in Munich.

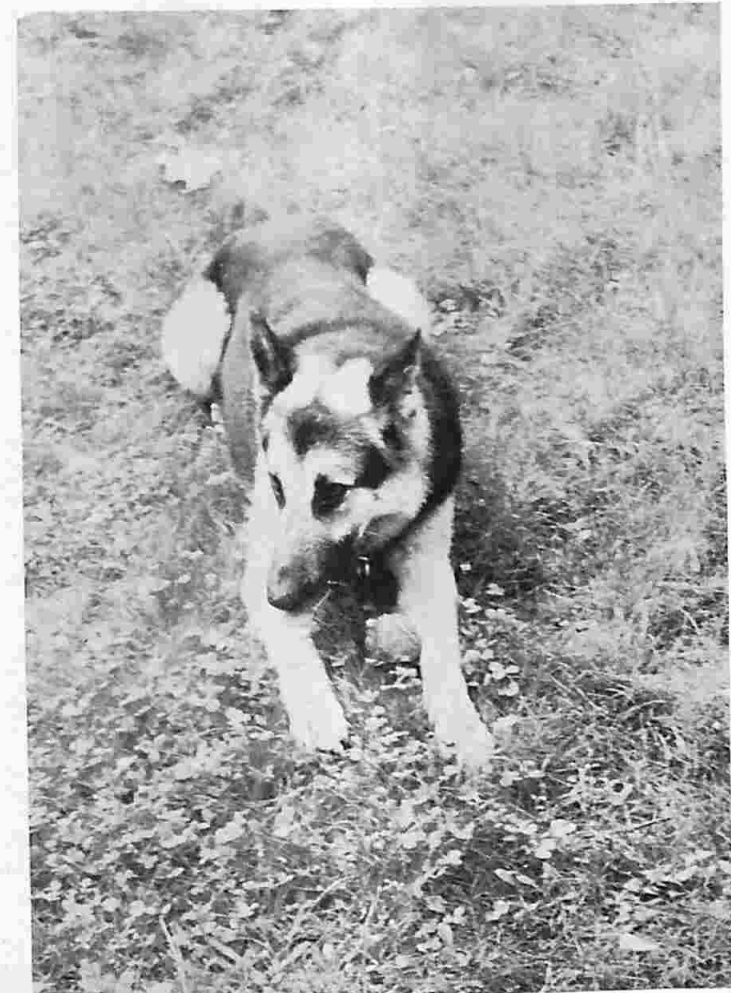
Before he became a Narcotics Detection Dog, Buddy served a tour in Vietnam as a scout dog. He preceded his men while on patrol, scouting for ambushers and booby traps.

'Fairy Tale' at Deutsche Opera

Well, it looks like the Berlin Opera has another success in their repertoire with Boris Blacher's "Prussian Fairy Tale" (Preussisches Märchen). This light-hearted opera with ironical undertones plays in old Berlin at the turn of the century, a time period which is and has been "in" for a while now.

But it is not only the time period in which this Prussian Fairy Tale takes place that makes this evening at the opera so entertaining. The text and music waltzes, polkas, and marches of the period, are good listening; you're not forced to hear the same refrain umteen times (which makes opera so tiring for many).

The story of the opera tells about Wilhelm Fadenkreutz, a clerk, who loses his job because he got fresh with the mayor's daughter. His sister, who wants to hide this shameful incident from her suitor, introduces Wilhelm as Captain Fadenkreutz. An invitation to a big ball makes it necessary that Wilhelm appear in uniform (which he rents). The respect and admiration he gets with the borrowed uniform goes to his head, and he decides to storm the Townhall and arrest the mayor. Of course, this fairy tale, which is based on an actual happening, does come to a good end.

A delightful gag is the casting of Wilhelm's parents, which the audience doesn't notice until the small, fat father with a big beer belly starts to sing — a clear soprano! Mother Fadenkreutz presents a beautiful bass.

A highlight of the opera is a ballet scene where Wilhelm in his rented uniform dreams in the second-hand shop of how everyone pays him homage as a captain. The pomp and gloria of a period that lived for a Kaiser is portrayed in dance.

The "Prussian Fairy Tale" is scheduled to be performed this Tuesday (Sept. 17) and on the 28th of September (Saturday). Do treat yourself to this superb tidbit.

Round out the evening in an atmosphere similar to the stage happenings with a visit at the Zille-Stuben right behind the opera (go down Richard-Wagner-Str. on the left side of the opera and you'll walk right into it.) At the Zille-Stuben you'll naturally find the walls plastered with the sketches of this famous Berliner caricaturist. A friendly welcome is guaranteed by Roderik (an adorable poodle) and the beer from the tap is great. You can come daily except Monday.

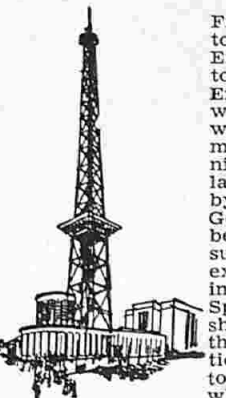

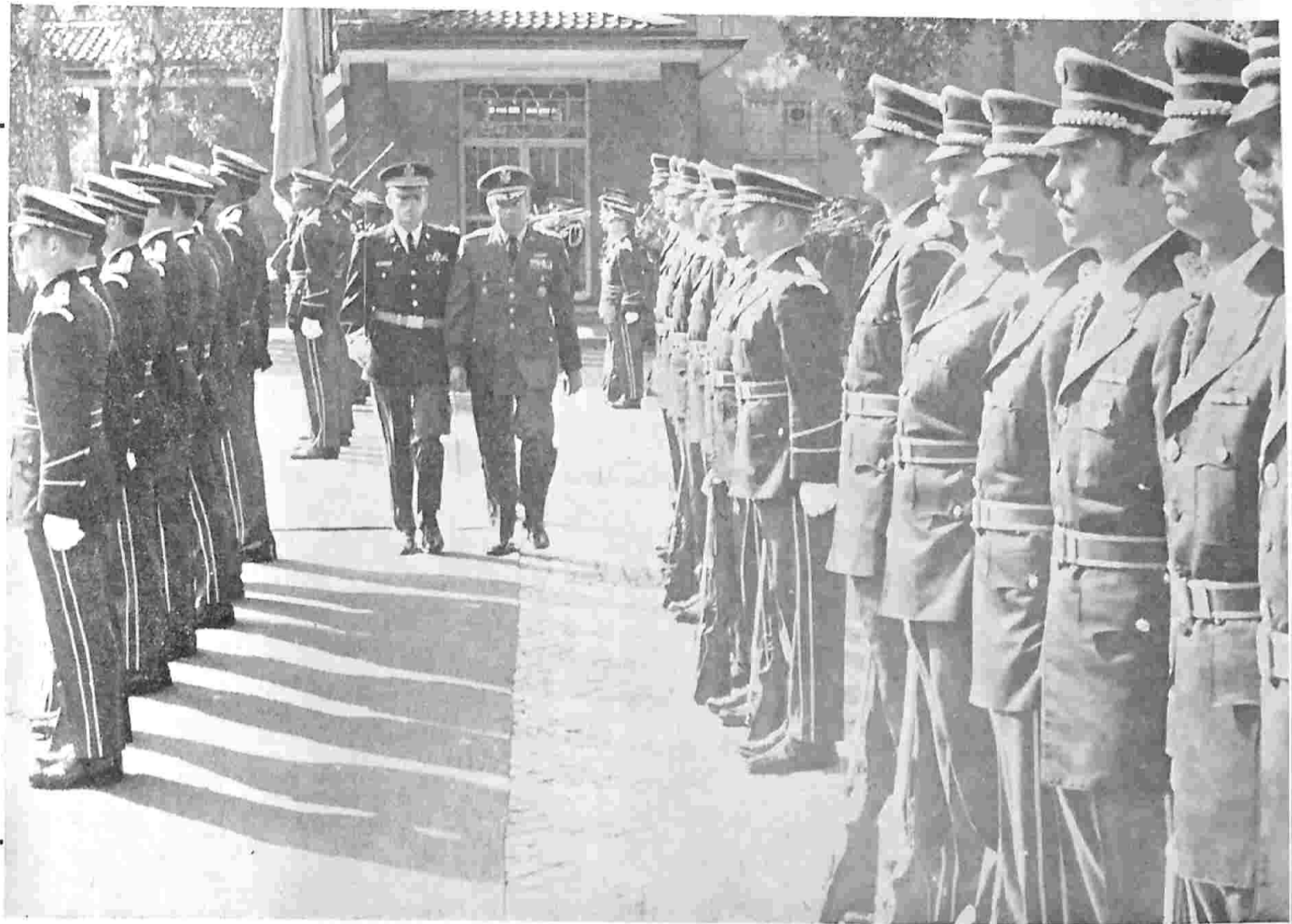

More apartments are available

The Schlangenbader housing complex, located at the corner of Schlangenbader and Wiesbadener Strasse in the Wilmersdorf district, opened on September 2, for occupancy and families have started moving into the bright, sunny apartments. Work is still being done on the 422-apartment complex, which is scheduled for completion in February '75.

According to Mr. Wismayer, general supply supervisor for the Schlangenbader project, "all apartments will be completely furnished including stoves, refrigerators, rugs, and drapes. Linen and kitchen utensils can be obtained from E&I if desired."

Most of the couples living in Schlangenbader lived on the economy prior to taking up residence in the complex, and seem quite pleased with their new quarters.

The Taylors moved into the complex August 27 from an economy apartment. Deirdre Taylor described the economy apartment with a smile and gesture as "about as big as the kitchen." She described her apartment as adequate for herself, husband and the baby that is due in October.

The McGarrs occupy a large, bright apartment in Schlangenbader, and referred to their economy apartment as "old and antique."

Susan Reich is an Air Force wife who moved into the complex about two weeks ago from an economy apartment. Outside of a leak in the bathroom (which is currently being fixed) she has encountered no major problems with her quarters.

All persons interviewed said the bus system to and from Tempelhof Central Airport and Headquarters Compound is good, with buses running on schedule. They have encountered no major difficulties in reaching the Main Shopping Center, commissary and other facilities.

Washers and dryers for each apartment are to be installed in the basement. A Post Office, Foodland, Army Community Service Office, and Army Health Nurse Service will be located on the ground floor; an indoor children's play area and covered garage are scheduled for completion.

All apartments are equipped with terraces and individual storage areas and elevators are in each building.

Approximately 70 new units in Schlangenbader will be available for occupancy each month. The apartments are classified as adequate government quarters for enlisted personnel in the grade of E-6 and below, with two or less dependents.

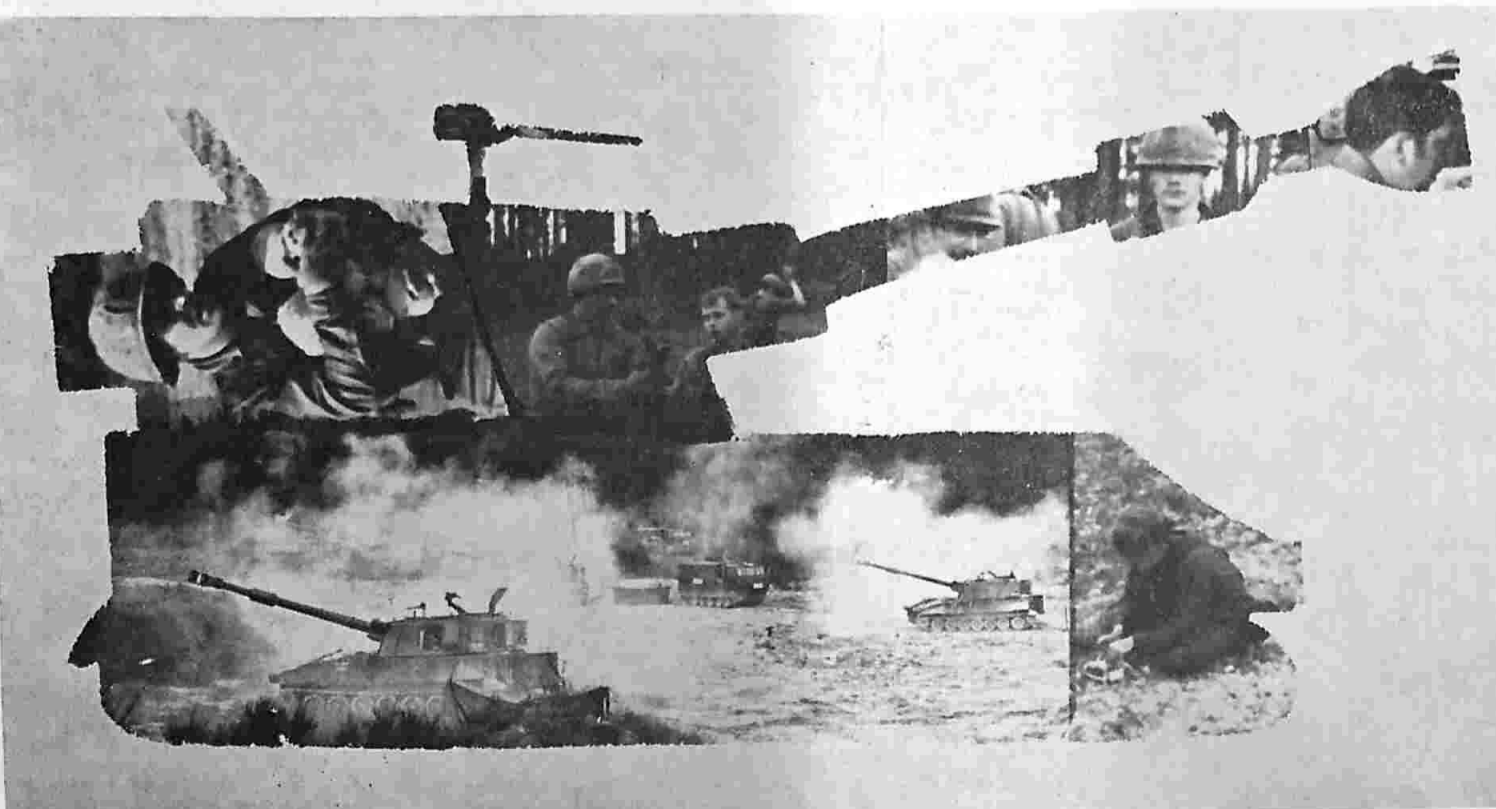
