Rabies-A Serious Threat

Another case of rabies has been positively diagnosed in the city. This latest case was reported by German officials to the Command's Veterinarian Service at the 279th Station Hospital. According to Hospital officials, the disease was identified in the brain of a cat after specialists in the field of rabies identification were called in for tests.

This is not the first case of rabies diagnosed in the city. A few weeks ago, a German forest ranger shot and killed a rabid fox in the Grunewald. Since that time, another definite case of rabies was discovered . . . this case was also reported to be a cat.

While officials say that the cases of rabies have reached no where near epidemic proportions, the problem must be watched closely and safeguards taken. According to Dr. Dan Knox, the Chief of Veterinarian Services for the 279th Station Hospital, "The problem of rabies is a serious threat, no matter how small. People in the Community must be warned of the possible dangers."



Courtesy classes conducted

Courtesy and Responsive Service. That's the name of a course that employees of the Berlin Command Supply and Services Division are currently going through. The purpose of the course is to make the Army a nicer place to be, according to Lieutenant Colonel John S. Whedbee, Chief of S&S Division.

The course makes the Army a nicer place to be by giving the soldier better service in the commissary and laundry pick-up points. This is not to say the service being given now is bad, but there's always room for improvement in any job.

The program is USAREUR-wide, designed to help the employee cope with "difficult" situations and to help him provide the best possible service to the customer. The major difference with the course being taught at S&S Division is that the division chief is doing the teaching. It allows him the opportunity to listen and find out what problems his personnel are having on the job, and at the same time allows him the chance to let his employees know exactly what his policies are in regards to the services being provided. One of the points that Colonel Whedbee stressed is equal service. "No one will receive preferential treatment, regardless of rank or position."

According to Colonel Whedbee, many people are under the mistaken impression that certain personnel in the command receive special treatment because of who or what they are. "This is not true, he says. The only time we make an exception to policy is when it is mission essential. This means that when someone requires a special service such as one-day service at the laundry facility, it is possible on the basis of being required, not because the individual (private or general) is receiving preferential treatment."

Colonel Whedbee is taking an active interest in the welfare of the soldier in Berlin and the results of this interest are not exactly tangible, but the results can be felt whenever you walk into the commissary or laundry pick-up point. It's all part of the Army's interest in making the Army a better place to stay.

Already a number of measures are being taken. The area of Andrews Barracks is now under a rabies quarantine. This means that no dogs will be allowed on Andrews unless they are on a leash. They must also be under the supervision of a capable adult. Officials say that cats will not be allowed on the compound during the quarantine. According to Dr. Knox, "The reason for the stricter measures with cats is because of more difficulty in control of the animals." Dr. Knox went on to say that the quarantine of Andrews Barracks is in effect now and will be in effect for three months. The quarantine has been imposed under German law of quarantine, and fully complied with by American authorities.

Other measures being taken as safeguards against rabies include strict enforcement of Command regulations governing owning of pets. These regulations state that all animals owned by Command personnel must be on a leash when taken outside. Dr. Knox stressed that the regulations are for the protection of the pet, as well as the pet owner. Military Police and Health Officials say that for the safety of personnel in the Community, and the possible prevention of an epidemic of rabies, these regulations must be complied with.

Dr. Knox also said that dogs and cats are not the only animals that are susceptible to rabies. "All mammals can contract the disease, to include those such as mice." People in the Community should beware of any animal behaving in an abnormal way. Sightings of such animals should be reported to the Military Police or the Hospital Emergency clinic immediately.

Any animal bite should be reported as soon as possible. According to Dr. Knox, "The possibility of the potential hazard of rabies cannot be taken lightly."

PSAT--October 26

The PSAT/National Merit scholarship Qualifying Test will be given at Berlin American High School Saturday October 26, 8:30 a.m. The test is a shortened version of the College Board Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT). It measures certain verbal and mathematical abilities. The questions in the verbal section test ability to understand word relationships and to read with comprehension. Those in the math section, test ability to understand and solve problems about numbers and quantities. Each section is 50 minutes long.

The test fee is \$3.00. A student bulletin including a study guide will be given to each registrant.

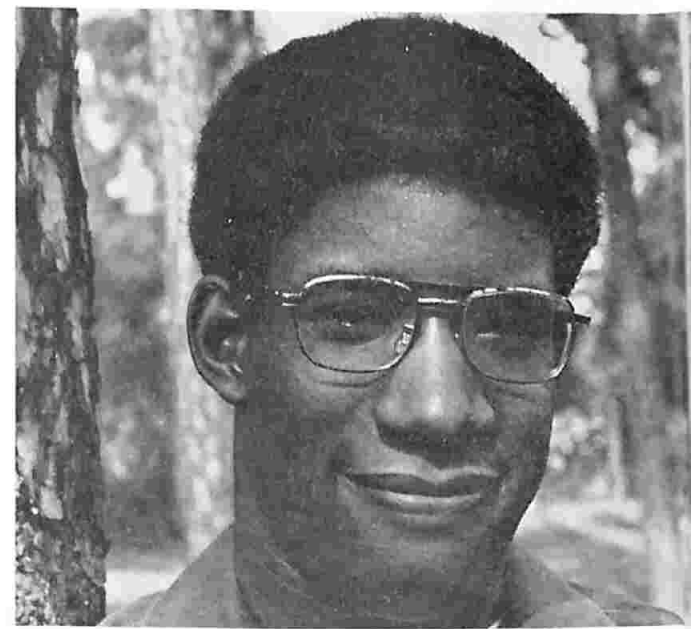
Cubs hold home game

Tolbert takes Kontakt

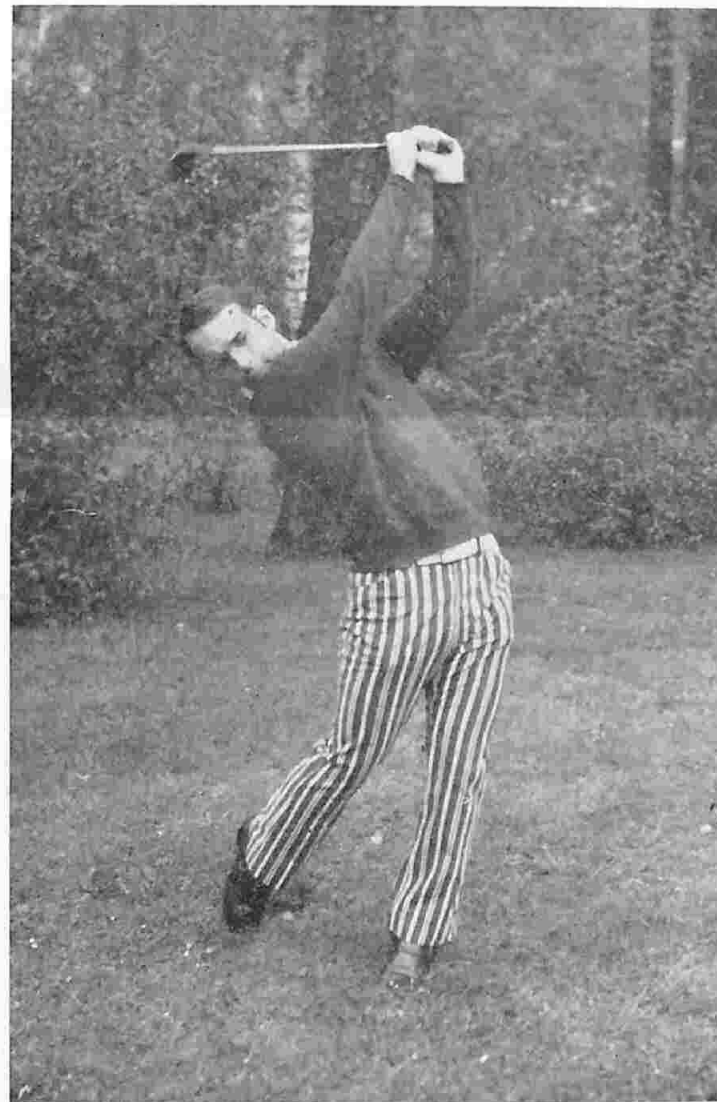

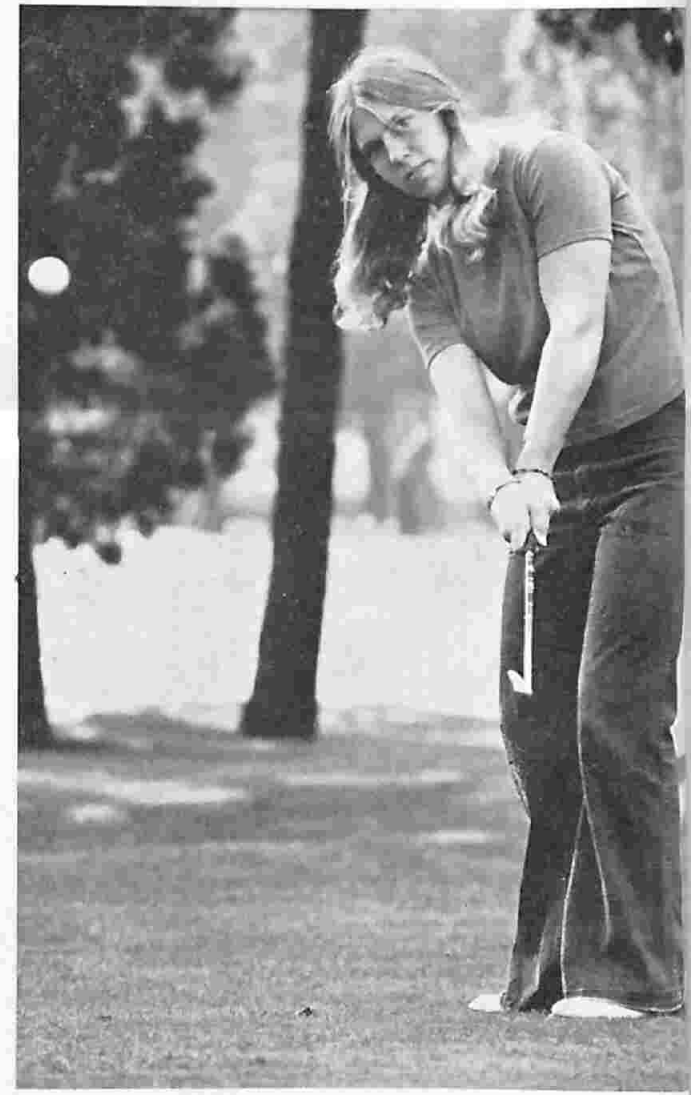

AFRC teaches skiing

Learn to Ski at AFRC — As in past years, the Armed Forces Recreation Center will have "Learn to Ski Weeks" at Garmisch and Berchtesgaden.

The 1974-75 learn to ski program will get underway at

Garmisch November 3, with a new session beginning each week through December 15. A special "Holiday" ski week is scheduled for persons who have reservations during the Christmas-New Year period.

Following the holiday period, the Garmisch ski weeks will start again January 5, and continue through April 20. Along with the regular program of instruction, there are special children's classes for the Thanksgiving and Easter weeks.

At Berchtesgaden, the "Learn to Ski Weeks" are set to start December 1, snow permitting, with two more sessions starting in December on the 8 and 15. Following the holidays, the B'gaden ski weeks will get underway January 5 and continue weekly through March 23.

The "Learn to Ski Weeks" are open to all military personnel, dependents, and civilians with PX privileges and cost \$70 per person plus accommodations and meals at Garmisch, and \$75 per person plus accommodations and evening meals at Berchtesgaden.

The Garmisch fee includes ski instruction, transportation to and from the slopes, lift fees, equipment (except socks and mittens), Bavarian party and graduation banquet.

At B'gaden, the fee includes breakfast and noon meals Monday through Friday, ski instruction, lift fees, equipment (except socks and mittens), reception party, and graduation banquet.

A five dollar deposit (check or money order payable to CUSTODIAN ECN 1835) must accompany all requests

for reservations and will be applied against billeting costs. This will be refunded if the reservation is cancelled at least three days before the start of the ski week.

Reservations for the Garmisch ski week may be made by writing the GRA Billeting Office, Attn: SKI WEEK, APO 09053. For the B'gaden ski weeks reservations may be made by writing the BRA Billeting Office, Attn: USA SKI SCHOOL, APO 09029.

For billeting, give the number of adults in your party, relationship, number of children, age and sex, and indicate who will be taking part in the ski week. Billeting reservations require arrival on Sunday and depart on Saturday.

3rd Btn. 6th Inf. goes on a 21-day zone trip

Seven days a week, 12 hours a day, no days off, living in "pup" tents and firing weapons almost every day — that's the picture of an Infantry Battalion at a Major Training Area (MTA) in the "Zone" (West Germany). And such was part of the picture of the 3rd Battalion, 6th Infantry in their recent Zone trip.

Part, because there is a great deal more to a Zone trip than this. A Zone trip is a wide variety of different activities under what is as close to combat conditions as we can simulate in peace time.

A Zone trip is a kaleidoscope of activity — and occasionally it is difficult for a single observer to keep track. Each company is engaged in a different activity, some of the units even fracturing down to smaller elements for a particular function. But this supposed confusion really isn't (months of planning have gone into the scheduling of the various activities) but a necessity to insure that every man receives the maximum amount of training that can be had in the time available.

The men rise early each day — performing many of the same jobs that they do back in Berlin (police call, morning formations and the requirement to keep a clean area still remains with you). The early rising is also

necessary to keep the training cycle flowing. Some units depart for the ranges to continue with qualification and familiarization of the men in their individual weapons. Others depart to maneuver areas to help build the skills of the squads in specific types of tactics. It is all part of insuring that the men react quickly in a tactical situation later, for what you know now in theory must be a reaction and instinct in combat.

While the men who form the cutting edge of the battalion are polishing their infantry skills, the other members who support them are also engaged in their's — the cooks are reintroducing themselves to the problems of creating a first rate meal in the field away from their fine mess hall, the communications men are perfecting their techniques in insuring rapid and efficient communications, and the mechanics are learning that repairs

can also be accomplished in a field location as well as in the garages of Berlin.

Emphasis during this Zone trip was placed on squad level training and improving the squad leader's skills. To challenge each man, problems were created that would tax him to the utmost, including RECONDO, MISPIC and Combat Squares problems. RECONDO is directed at improving skills in reconnaissance, MISPIC develops skills of the squad leader in using mechanized (armored) vehicles, and Combat Squares develops the skills in maneuvering under live fire over various terrain.

A Zone trip — in some ways an ordeal, in all ways an enriching experience. Sometimes confusing to an observer, always interesting, and a definite challenge.

EM Promotion Boards: How they work

WASHINGTON (ANF) — Back in brown-shoe Army days when a corporal was godalmighty and paid 46 bucks a month, promotions were as scarce as beer in the barracks.

"I spent nine years as a corporal," a balding sergeant major recalls, drawing out the words as though he was polishing a hard-earned trophy.



"Times have changed," he adds in an inflection that is more resigned than philosophical.

Times have changed in the enlisted promotion system but ouija board myths remain.

Board Selection

The promotion machinery begins when DCSPER officials add up the projected slots and compare them with grade ceilings. The cut off dates for the zones of consideration depend upon how many can be promoted, the number of soldiers with DOR in the potential zones, and a determination of selection rates for both primary and secondary zones. Once decided, the zones and the numbers to be selected are TWXed to the field.



While hopeful candidates pass the word among friends, MILPERCEN officials are going over names and attributes of potential board members.

It isn't easy to pick a promotion board.

Twenty-six members are required. The senior member is a general officer. He serves as president of the board which includes both female and minority group members.

- All must have outstanding records.
- Colonels must have commanded at the brigade level and must be graduates of a senior service college.
- Lieutenant colonels must have commanded at battalion or equal level and must be graduates of C&GS.



- Command sergeants major and sergeants major must have recent CSM experience in both required levels and career fields. Each must be at least a high school graduate.

Once MILPERCEN selects the best qualified members, the list is forwarded to DCSPER for approval.

Guidance Begins

While DCSPER mulls over the board list, staff members at the Army Enlisted Records Center, Ft. Ben Harrison, complete the screening and updating of official military personnel files (OPMF). This insures the records of those in the zones are ready for the board. DCSPER and MILPERCEN are informed of the final count of eligible soldiers in each career field.



These numbers will be used to determine guidelines on how many NCOs can be chosen from each career group.

The career field with the greatest shortage normally will get the heaviest selection; career fields with overages get the lowest selection. Selection rates vary because of the number eligible, the number authorized at the next grade up, projected losses, and the quality of individuals in each career group.

This guidance and more goes into a letter of instructions which the board president uses to guide board deliberations.

Board is Convened

TDY orders are issued to the board members who proceed to Ft. Ben where they report to the DA Selection Board Secretariat. They are briefed by the CO of



the Enlisted Records Center, the commander of the Enlisted Evaluation Center, and a general officer from DCSPER. The thrust here is on the importance of the board's mission.



The board now is convened, sworn and organized. Each member becomes familiar with the voting procedures. Guidance comes from the board recorder provided by DA and from the board president. All boards have five panels who consider soldiers in five career groupings: Combat arms, communications-supply, general support, engineer-transportation, and special categories. Each panel has three specific tasks:

- to select those to be promoted.
- to identify unsatisfactory performers.
- to designate the promotion MOS for those selected whose normal career progression MOS is overstrength.

Voting Starts

The next step is practice voting. Each panel is provided records for study and practice voting. This training, plus study of the letter of instructions, prepares each member to share equally and independently in weighing the merits of each eligible soldier.



Once the practice voting is finished, the selection process begins. Each individual OPMF contains a vote card and the file is passed to each member of the panel. The promotion board member goes over the file and writes a



score, ranging from 1 to 6, on the vote card. After the panel has voted, the scores are totaled. The lowest score

possible is five; 30 is max. Scores are then arranged in numerical sequence in each career field.

Best Qualified Selected

Now comes the actual promotion selection. For example, let's say a panel examining eligibles in the communications-supply career field considers and ranks 198 eligibles in the primary zone. The letter of instructions says to choose 62 in this field. So, the top 62 are recommended for promotion. The same procedure is used for selection in the secondary zone where, for example, the letter of instructions said six could be recommended.

After the best qualified are selected, the projected MOS status is checked. If the MOS group is overstrength, the



panel designates a promotion MOS in an understrength MOS but in the same career field as the PMOS. Should the panel be unable to make this decision, the record is referred to MILPERCEN for selection of the MOS into which the person will be promoted.



Once all career management fields have been considered, the names are typed of those recommended for promotion.

Unsatisfactory Performers Weighed Also

But the promotion board is not through. Now comes the search for unsatisfactory performers. Records are reviewed carefully of those soldiers who are not recommended for promotion. At the same time records of those in the zone but not eligible for promotion are reviewed also. The end result is a list of soldiers who, in the judgment of the board, should be recommended for a bar to



reenlistment. This opinion is later provided the commanding officer of the EM concerned.

The board sends the promotion list and the unsatisfactory performers list recommendations to DCSPER



for approval. The promotion list is provided also to the Army Personnel Security Office for appropriate review.



All that's left is to publish and to dispatch the DA promotion circular.

And—to sew on the new stripes.

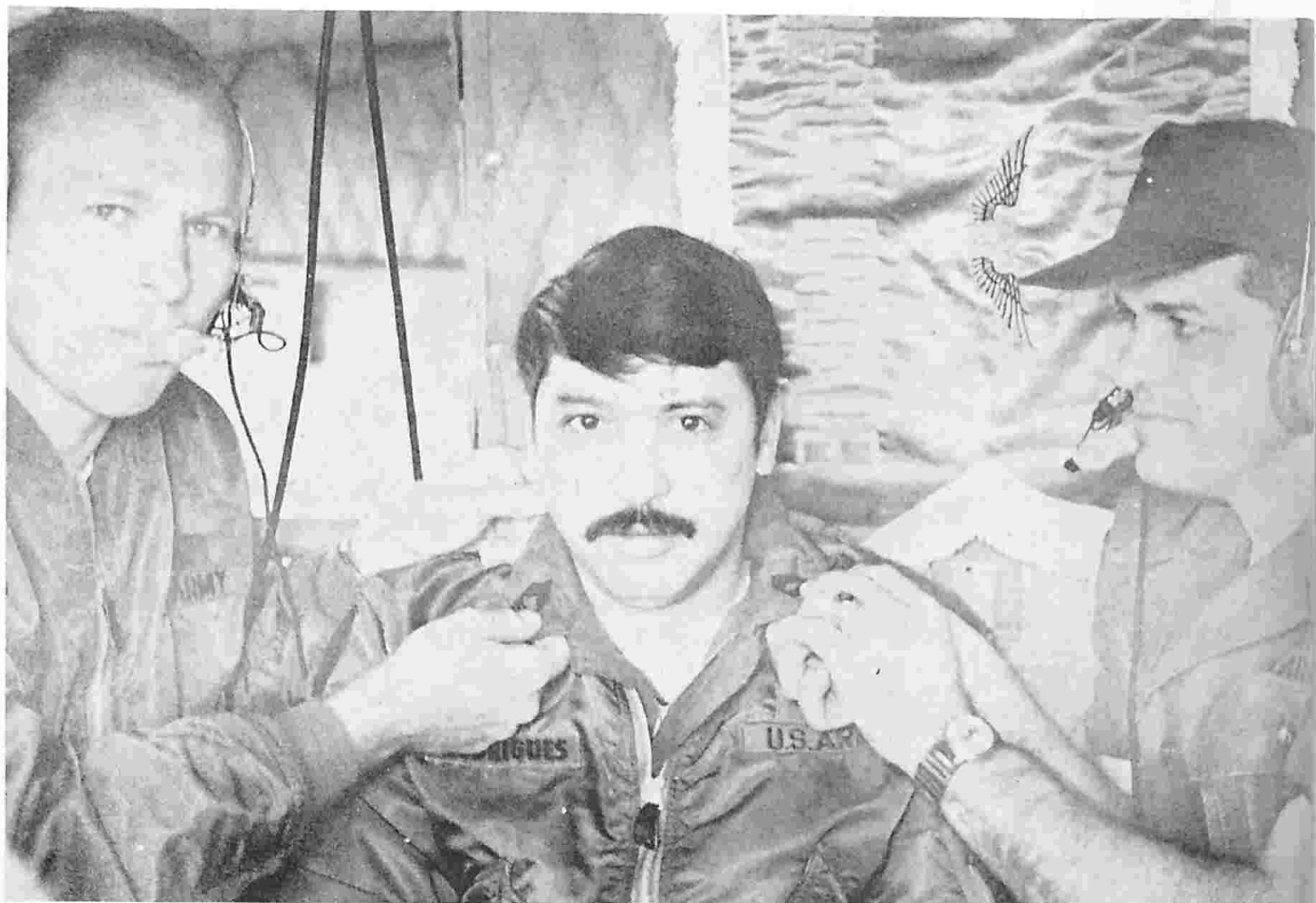
Fuel still needs saving

HEIDELBERG—Although there is no longer an energy shortage like the one last winter, USAREUR officials point out that there is still a need to conserve energy and resources such as electricity, water, heating fuels and fuels for military vehicles and engines.

Funding is the problem this year, the officials say, and it could mean an eventual shortage of fuels.

Here are some recommended conservation measures:

- eliminate unnecessary administrative travel in military vehicles.
- consolidate transportation requirements.
- use administrative and small vehicles for transportation requirements whenever possible.
- drive within speed limits.
- avoid hot-rodding and excessive idling or warm-up.
- keep vehicles in fine tune.
- keep room temperature between 65 and 68 degrees.
- don't heat empty buildings except as necessary to keep water in pipes from freezing.
- keep windows and doors closed when heat is on.
- don't waste water.
- use lights only when necessary.
- seal up loose-fitting windows and doors.
- report speed violators to unit commanders.
- unplug transformers when not in use.
- submit suggestions for energy conservation to the local Incentive Awards committee.

Reforger is here

HEIDELBERG—United States-based Army units have returned to Germany again to participate in a field maneuver called Exercise Reforger '74.

This will be the sixth time in as many years that approximately 12,000 soldiers will be flown from U. S. bases by U. S. Air Force planes to Rhein-Main, Ramstein and Echterdingen Airfields in the Federal Republic of Germany. Advance elements of the Reforger forces arrived September 30, followed by the main body elements October 2.

Major units deploying from the U. S. for Reforger '74 include the 2nd Brigade of the 1st Infantry Division (Big Red One) from Ft. Riley, Kansas, which will join the 3rd Brigade of the Big Red One stationed in Goeppingen, Germany, and the 2nd Brigade, 2nd Armored Division from Ft. Hood, Texas.

Other units are 337th Army Security Agency Company from Ft. Riley; 85th Combat Support Hospital from Ft.

Lee, Virginia; 427th Medical Company (Ambulance) from Ft. Rucker, Alabama; 34th Engineer Battalion from Ft. Riley; 100th Transportation Company from Ft. Eustis, Va.; and 664th Ordnance Company, HQ Detachment, 36th Medical Battalion, and D Company of the 1st Signal Battalion, all from Ft. Hood.

Military Airlift Command's all-jet strategic airlift force of C-5A Galaxy and C-141 Starlifter aircraft will be used in both the deployment and redeployment phases of the exercise to transport the soldiers and equipment.

The units will draw major items of equipment, including combat vehicles, from prepositioned storage sites in Germany and move to an exercise area extending from Stuttgart-Ulm east by northwest along the Nuernberg-Munich Autobahn to Ingolstadt-Roth.


On Thursday, Reforger units begin an 11-day field maneuver called "Certain Pledge," in which they will be pitted against "Aggressor" forces composed of European-based elements of NATO, including the U. S. 1st Armored Division and the 4th Canadian Mechanized Brigade Group. During the maneuver, U. S., Canadian, and German air forces aircraft will support the field units. The German 30th Panzer Brigade will also participate on the side of the Reforger forces.

Following the field maneuver, Reforger units will conduct fire artillery and tanks at the U. S. Army Training Area at Grafenwoehr, before returning equipment to storage sites. The main body will fly back to the U. S. from Nuernberg, while those who complete final maintenance and turn-in of equipment will depart from Ramstein.

As in Reforgers past, the focus of the exercise is to sharpen techniques for receiving, equipping, assembling and deploying dual-based Army units which are designed to fulfill U. S. commitments to NATO and those made in the bilateral agreements between the Federal Republic of Germany and the U. S.

Again, emphasis, during the deployment phase from the U. S., will be on movement techniques and not on speed.
