

# Soldier's life saved by quick-thinking sergeant

Without the quick thinking and help of his platoon sergeant, Sp4 Stanley Clifford, Combat Support Company, 4th Battalion, might not be alive today, according to Clifford.

Thanks to SSgt. Floyd Bench, Clifford "was given a new lease on life."

Bench and Clifford's company were out on a physical training run recently, when Clifford suffered a

heart seizure and "blacked-out," Clifford said. Bench noticed that Clifford wasn't breathing and immediately performed CPR on him.

"Actually, it was more difficult than that. My jaw was locked and I had swallowed my tongue. My platoon sergeant tried to get my jaws apart and clear my airway. In the process, I bit him," said Clifford.

"The next thing I remember I was lying in the Troop Medical Clinic at

McNair. At least, that's what the medics told me. I really didn't know where I was," said Clifford.

The ironic part of this accident is that Clifford is the section medic. If not for the training that Clifford had given the other men in his section, he might not be alive today, he said.

"After my accident, I just couldn't thank Sergeant Bench enough. In fact, I bugged him beyond belief," explained Clifford. "All of the peo-

ple who helped me should be thanked.

"I really scared Sergeant Bench. All he said though, was that he thought he'd have to fill out a whole lot of paperwork on me," Clifford joked.

"I'll just have to look back at this and be more careful from now on. I guess I just got a second chance. It's almost like I'm reborn," he said.

### After 100 miles in four days

## Nijmegen marchers return

The hundred miles of Nijmegen. A historic walk that has been occurring for many years now. Nijmegen is more than just a walk, it's a test of human endurance, pitting man against the elements and the clock.

Fifteen soldiers representing the Berlin Brigade returned from Nijmegen Sunday. Starting each day out in last place, the Berlin team passed all the other teams on their way to the finish, and were even cheered on by the members of other teams.

Though the weather was not on the marchers' side, they walked the 100-mile trek, covering one day's walk of 25 miles in just five hours, 15 minutes.

"It was just great! Those people came out to watch us in the pass-in-review parade," said SSgt. Bill Williamson, Company B, 2nd Battalion. "It was raining like crazy, but they just cheered and applauded anyway. It was really a once in a lifetime experience."

"We trained in the rain, so when it started it didn't bother us too much," said 1st Lt. Larry McCormick, also of Company B, 2nd Battalion. "The other marchers didn't think that we were going to be so good. I guess they felt that Berlin was such a great assignment we didn't bother to train here!"

The march is over for another year and as the members of the Berlin team stepped off the train, the 298th U. S. Army Band struck up a tune to welcome the men back in hero fashion. Also on hand were the Berlin Brigade Commander, Brig. Gen. John E. Rogers, and Col. David H. Harris, deputy brigade commander, and many other well-wishers.

"You guys did a terrific job and if you stop by my office sometime next week or tomorrow we have a leave form for each of you all made out and ready for you to sign for seven days administrative leave," said Harris.

According to the members of the team, the biggest thing about the march was "accomplishing what we

had set out to do." "I would do it again, right now," said Williamson.

Living up to the expectations of the members of the command is never a simple task. Living up to your own expectations is even tougher. The men of the Berlin Brigade put the Infantry motto to common use as they passed each team of the march and glanced back as if to say "fol-

low me."

Through the pouring rain, and on top of all the competitive spirit the men covered the 25-mile-a-day course with amazing speed. As the memories dwell in the minds of the men who took part in the march, one thing stands out... the men of the Berlin Brigade have proven again the "can-do" spirit of the brigade.

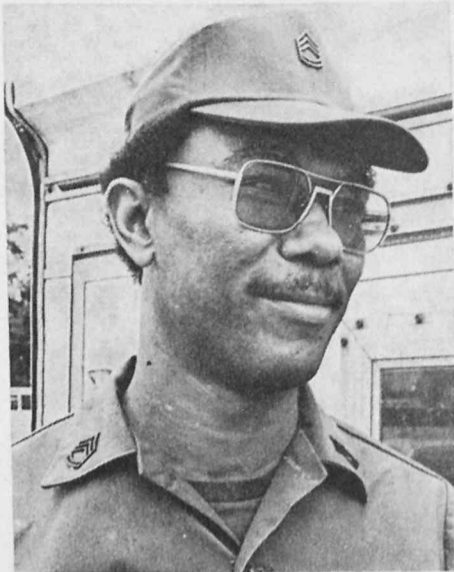

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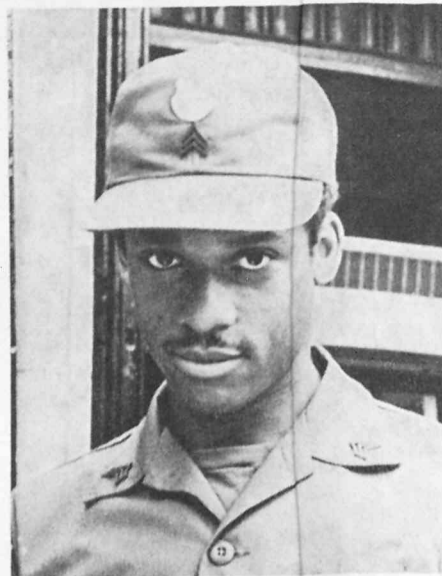
# What would you like to see more of in your club?



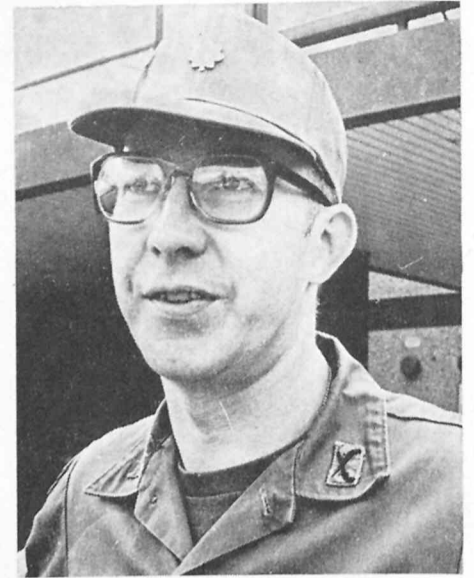
SFC Osie Martin, Headquarters and Headquarters Company (P): "I don't frequent service clubs but I would like to see more live bands if at all possible."

## Courts-martial hearings convict soldiers

Pvt. 1 Walter R. Deal, Company C, 3rd Battalion, was convicted by a Special Court-Martial on July 15 for failure to repair, AWOL, breaking restriction, missing movement and disobeying a lawful order. Deal was sentenced to forfeit \$334 pay per month for four months and to be confined at hard labor for four months.

Pvt. 2 Michael J. Cona, Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 3rd Battalion, was convicted by a Special Court-Martial on July 15 for AWOL and use of heroin. Cona was sentenced to be reduced to E-1, to forfeit \$334 pay per month for two months, to be confined at hard labor for two months and a Bad Conduct Discharge.

Pvt. 1 Gerardo Antu, Company A, 3rd Battalion, was convicted by a Special Court-Martial on July 16 for possession, transfer and sale of LSD and escaping from correctional custody. Antu was sentenced to be confined at hard labor for four months, to forfeit \$334 pay per month for four months and a Bad Conduct Discharge.

Pvt. 2 Stuart D. Wallace, Combat Support Company, 2nd Battalion, was convicted by a Special Court-Martial on July 17 for assault on a commissioned officer, assault on a noncommissioned officer and disobeying an officer. Wallace was sentenced to be reduced to E-1, to forfeit \$200 pay per month for six months, restriction for two months and to perform hard labor without confinement for three months.

## Transition to be smoother for reserve officers soon

The latest development in the saga of the Defense Officer Personnel Management Act (DOPMA) will ease the act of transition for a number of reserve officers.

Proposed legislation to "Grandfather" certain persons holding a reserve commissioned grade higher than the active-duty grade as of September 14, 1981, has passed the Congress and is on the way for the President's signature.

The "Grandfathering" provision is just one of the technical corrections in the act, say Department of the Army personnel officials.

Translated to specifics, it means: A reserve officer on active duty (either as officer or enlisted) on September 14, 1981, and who

later retires with 20-plus years active service (including 10 years as a commissioned officer), can retire in the reserve grade held or to which they had been selected for promotion on Sept. 14 (even if not having served in that grade on active duty).

Of course, if that person wins promotion to a higher reserve commissioned grade after Sept. 15, 1981, he/she becomes bound by the DOPMA-added active duty requirements of Title 10, U. S. Code 1370.

Now that this refinement is part of the newly passed legislation, no longer will retirement-eligible reserve officers have to consider retiring before September 15, 1981, in order to preserve their higher reserve grade. (ARNEWS)

# CDAAC named 'best in USAREUR'

A Certificate of Achievement was awarded to the staff of the Berlin Community Drug and Alcohol Assistance Center July 14, by Brig. Gen. John E. Rogers, Berlin Brigade commander.

The award is a result of a USA-REUR assistance team visit which rated the Berlin Alcohol and Drug Abuse Prevention and Control Program (ADAPCP) "without qualification, the best Community Program in USAREUR," according to SSgt. Dale A. Reigle, CDAAC's senior counselor.

"We try to help all members of the Berlin American community through individual and group counseling, a six-week hospital program and many other welfare-minded activities," said Capt. Timothy F. Fitzpatrick, Alcohol and Drug Control officer.

All of the personnel are well-qualified also, said Fitzpatrick.

Military counselors are 91G, Behavioral Science Specialists. Plus, I ensure that they take courses given in Munich on such things as Individual Counseling Skills, Advanced Alcohol Counseling and more. "For my civilian counselors, they must have at least a Masters degree in either Social Work or Human Resources Counseling.

They too must take courses in Munich.

"Through our education coordinator, we are able to get out and inform soldiers, family members, DoD civilians and retired members as to what the problem is and how they know if they have one. Also, we educate supervisors, so that they are

able to help their people before a crisis is reached," continued Fitzpatrick.

"To assist the education coordinator, we have drug and alcohol specialists at company-level. These members are certified through CDAAC by attending a 40-hour course given by SSgt. Stephan Ford, education coordinator for CDAAC.

Education is expanded into the schools, said Fitzpatrick. Counselors present classes in Drug and Alcohol Prevention and Control in health classes at the high school level.

A new program for Berlin is the Teen Involvement Program, where high schoolers visit elementary schools and act as positive role models by teaching them classes and discussing in groups.

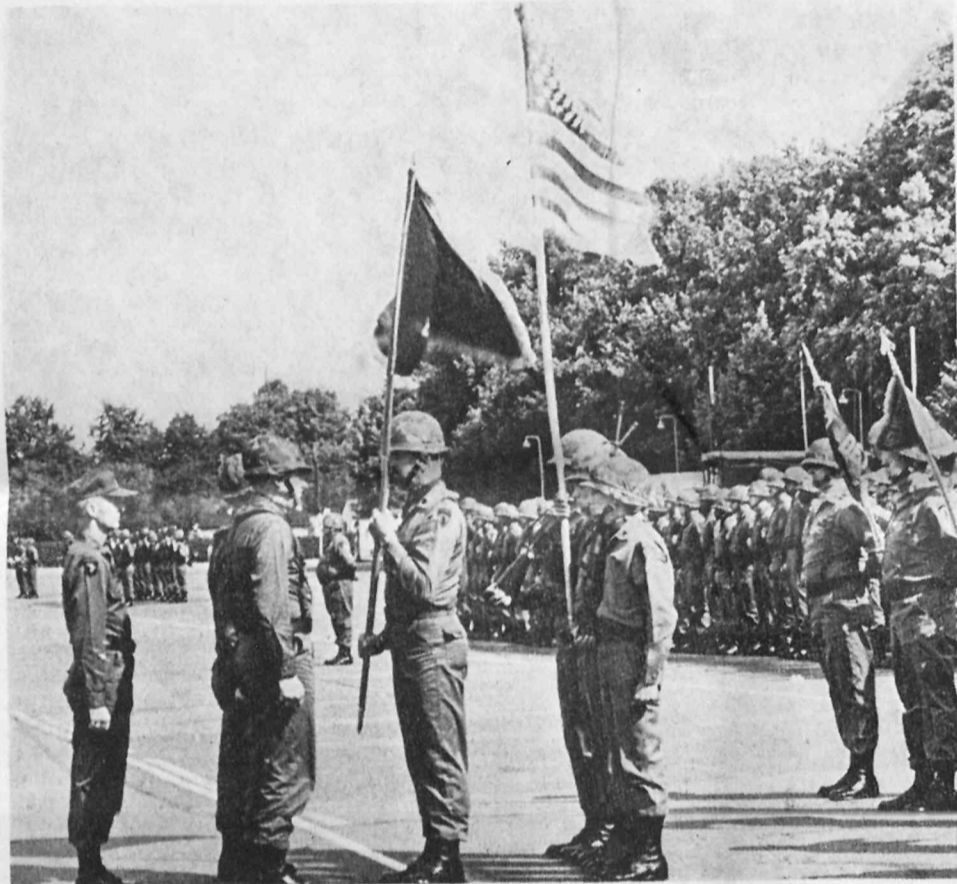
Another area that was cited by the assistance team was the support that

the Berlin club system gives to the ADAPCP, by addressing the alcohol issue and taking appropriate action. "Also, they train their bartending personnel and Masters in Arms as to what policies exist and what actions should be taken," explained Fitzpatrick.

CDAAC also offers a walk-in service on Monday and Tuesday nights from 6 to 9 p.m. Anyone who has a problem, wants to know if they do or just wants information, may walk-in and talk to a counselor.

"CDAAC offers a wide range of services," said Fitzpatrick, "and can adapt to fit any program."

"The staff here is very enthusiastic, professional, well-trained and motivated to provide service to the community" — another area cited by the USAREUR team.

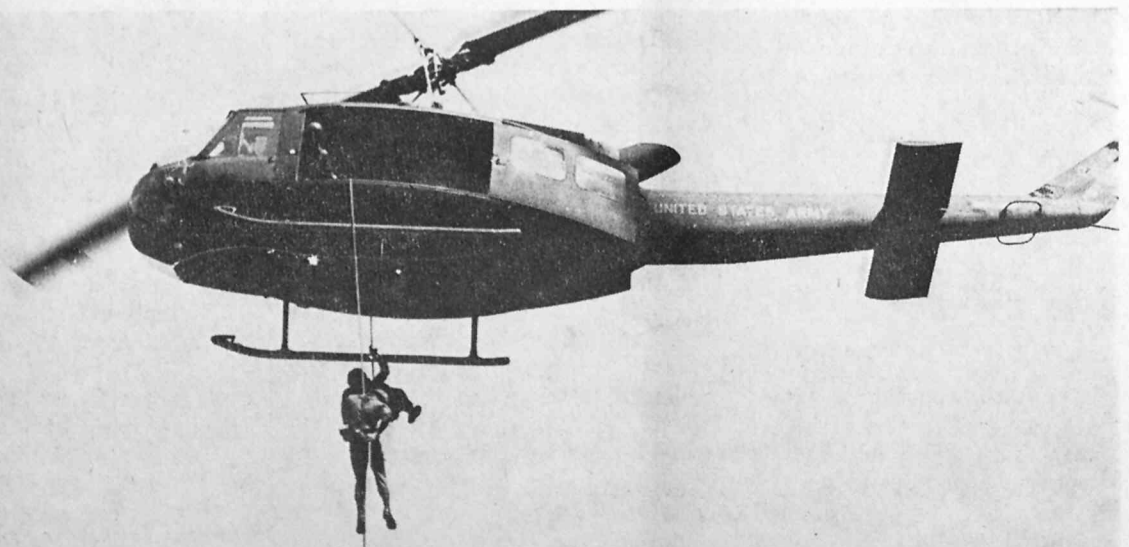

# Enjoy city of Paris for less than expected

Only one cliché in the world may still be true: If you have not been to Paris, you have not been to Europe!

Paris is still the city that rewards its visitors with sheer beauty, a quality reflected in its buildings, its parks, its museums and in its entertainment, from eating to night clubbing.

And, contrary to all the nasty rumors you have ever heard, Paris is not an expensive city.

One of the best ways to get to know Paris is to take one of the city's sightseeing tours. Since Paris offers so much variety, a tour by bus gives you a useful overview of the place so that you can choose a specific area you might want to explore on your own. Many tours are available in English.

After the packaged tour, start walking. Paris covers far less area than you might expect, which makes it easy to become acquainted with the city on your own power. Before you leave for France, pick up a small dictionary or phrase book and learn some simple sentences: French is the local language, not English. Parisians respond in a friendly fashion to the

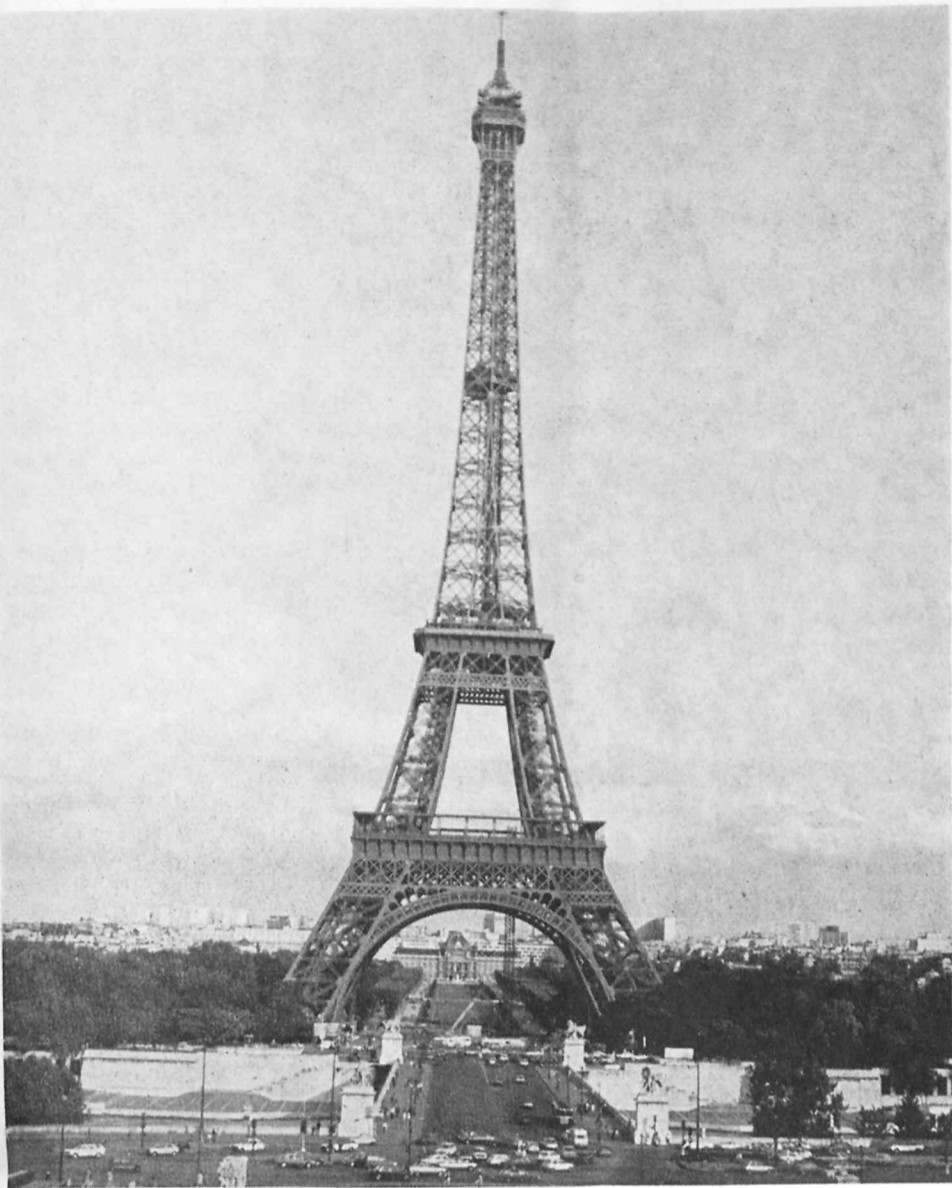
confused traveller who makes an effort to ask a simple question in their language. Finding out, before you go, how to say such things as "where is?" will pay off handsomely.

## The sights

Even if the word "museum" strikes Eiffel Tower. The view from the top, or even near the top, is phenomenal. The patterns and colors of Paris, seen from above, will probably eat up a few rolls of film if you bring your camera. For a particularly stunning effect, go up the tower at night.

Even if the word "museum" strikes terror (or boredom) in your heart, take a look at the museums of Paris. One of the most famous such establishments in the world is the Louvre, which hosts the Mona Lisa and other well-known paintings as well as sculpture, antiquities and other types of art works. Once you see the original version of a painting you have, up to now, seen only in a textbook, you will understand the fuss surrounding Rembrandt and other artists. It is indeed a mind-widening experience.

Fischer is also innovative. When he worked for the Army and Air Force Exchange Service he opened a service station and established the

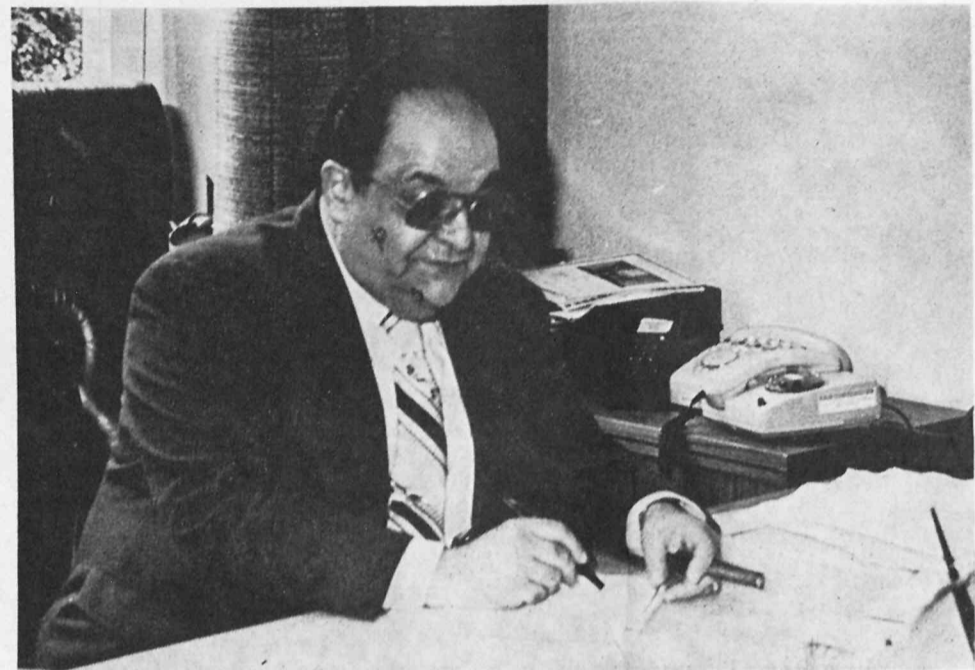
Army's first towing station in Berlin. He says that he enjoys his job in supply and services. He is in charge of all military supplies except for ammunition and medical.

One of the truly impressive sights of Paris is Notre Dame, a cathedral whose construction started in the twelfth century. Its frame stems from its stained-glass windows, statues, and carvings.

Napoleon's tomb is also found in Paris, along with a related Army Museum, which houses armor and weapons from the world's earliest fighting days right up through World War II. It also features flags and other articles of military history.

### Night life

The Parisian traveller does not face any requirement to spend time in a nightclub, since other forms of entertainment are readily available.

One of the most popular of these is a simple cup of coffee at a sidewalk cafe on the main street of Paris, the Champs Elysees. As you soak up the sights and sounds of the city

by watching the passing parade of visitors and citizens, you will get an uncomplicated evening of pleasure from this simple activity.

Then again, you may want to be able to say that you saw the Folies Bergere or the Lido when you were in Paris: they offer entertainment commonly regarded as typically French, but nightclubs alone do not make up the basic texture of Paris.

Nearly everywhere in Paris, you will spot inexpensive restaurants catering to the average person's average budget, not to the average banker's. Words fail to convey the flavor of eating in Paris: rather than merely read this article, ask ITT about its next tour to the French capital. 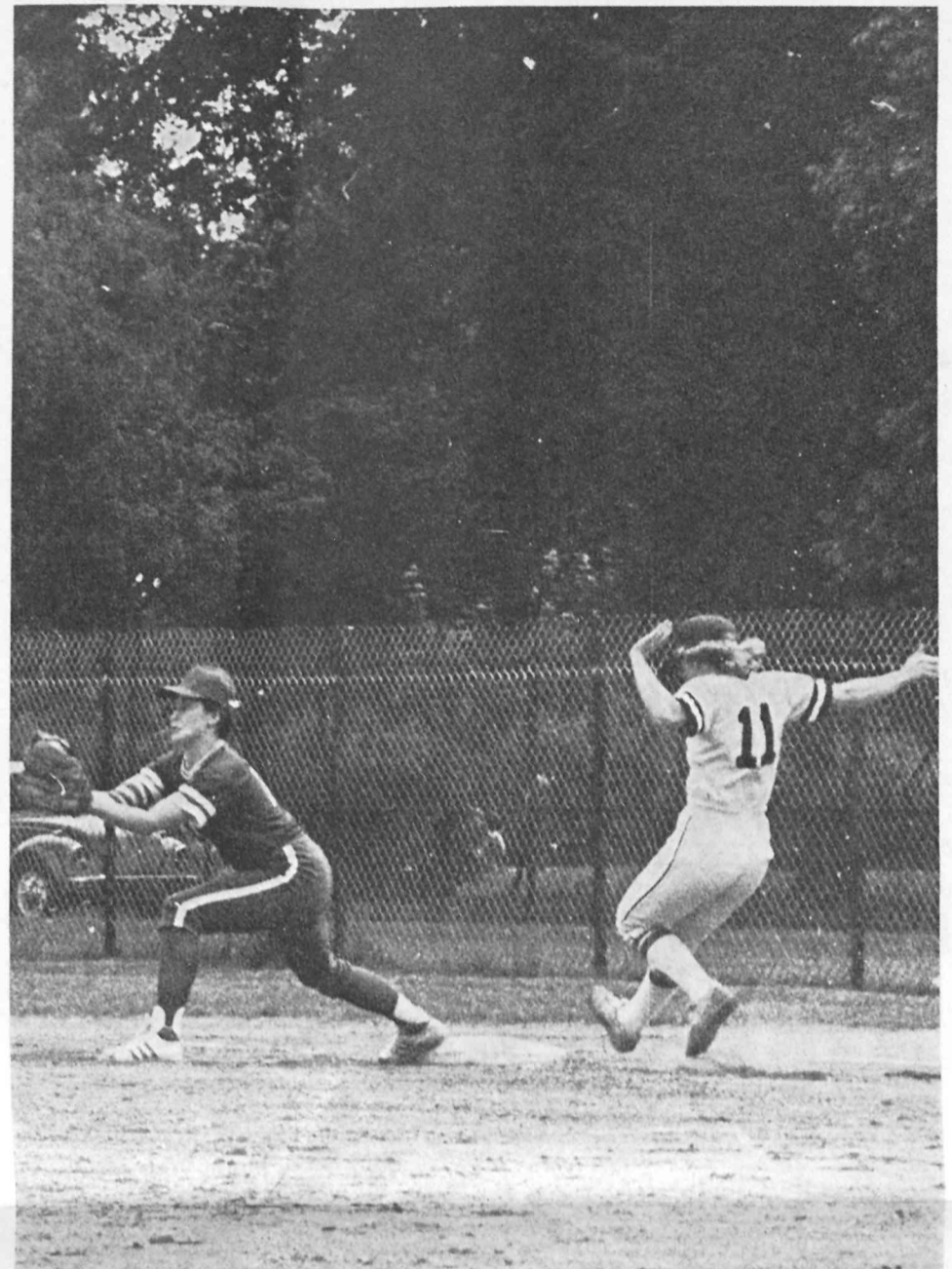

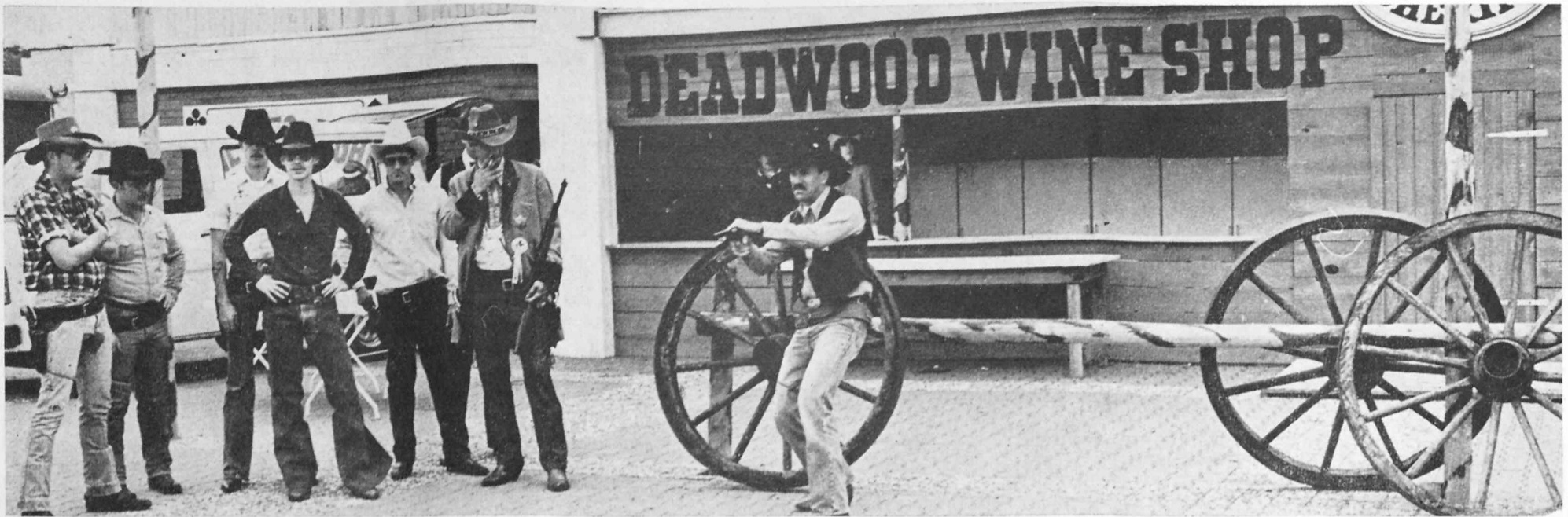

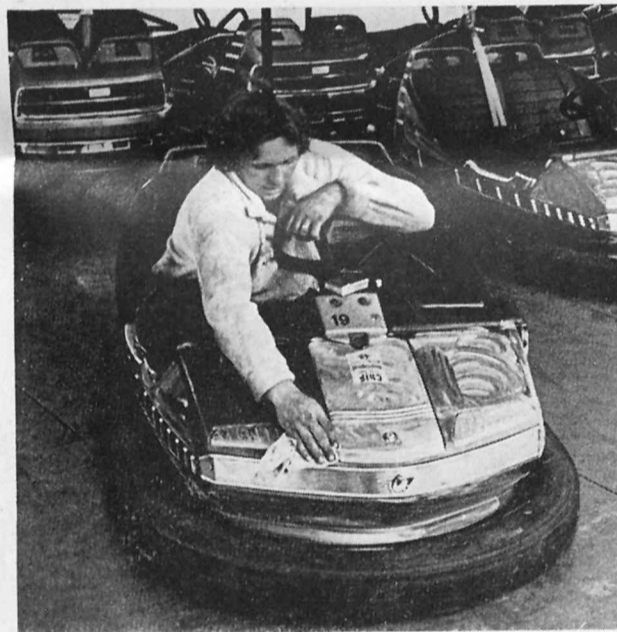

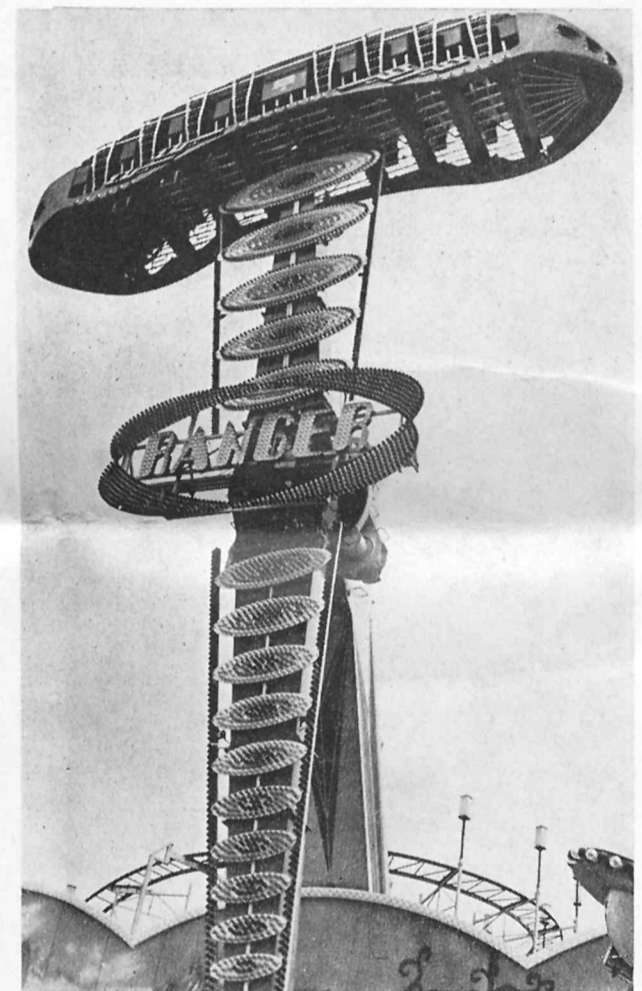
