

Special band concert symbolizes living harmony

The 298th U. S. Army Band was among other Allied and German police bands featured in a concert at the Deutschlandhalle Sunday.

This special concert, "Good Friends Make Music for Berlin," is an annual event sponsored by the Berlin Police Union.

Along with the 298th, were the Berlin Orchestra and Choir, and the

British massed bands of the 1st Battalion, King's Own Border Regiment, the Royal Tank Regiment and the 2nd Battalion, Royal Regiment of Fusiliers. The French 46th Infantry Regiment Band and the Hamburg Police Music Corps rounded out the program.

Each band entertained the crowd of an estimated 5,000 people with

several selections. "Jesus Christ Superstar," played by the 298th U. S. Army Band, was a real crowd-pleaser. Their rendition of the rock opera featured saxophone solos by SSgt. Herbie Hart and Sp5 Mike Carroll. The band's Chuck Mangione medley was also popular.

Other highlights included the Berlin Police Band's medley of Glenn Miller hits — always a favorite with

Berliners — and "Down by the Riverside," sung by the Berlin Police Choir.

Throughout the evening the bands joined together to play a variety of music, including the finale, "Auld Lang Syne."

This year's performance marked the 20th anniversary of the concert which has come to symbolize for Allies and Berliners the harmony in which we live and work in the city.

Teamwork highlights Allied Weapons Meet

There are a lot of things expected from the soldiers stationed in Berlin. The French, British, and American Allies are expected to shoot straight, be physically fit and most importantly, be able to work together.

A recent event which demonstrated this was the Allied Weapons Meet, held Oct. 29, at the Bernauerstrasse Range.

The meet has been held annually since 1957. It's hosted by one of the allies on a rotating basis. This year it was sponsored by the French, next year it will be the British forces' turn.

The meet involved 160 participants and a score of French soldiers who's main objective in the meet was to set targets and be available to help out in any way they could.

There were also judges, umpires, scorekeepers, ammo handlers, and a team made up one French, one Bri-

tish, and one American officer to act as a dispute committee, ready to solve any problems or questions regarding scoring or judging.

There were six events including rifle, pistol, sub-machinegun, headquarters pistol, general purpose machinegun, and the open event.

The Bernauerstrasse Range is a massive, enclosed structure housing a number of ranges to accommodate a variety of weapons. Anything from pistols to tanks may be fired at Bernauerstrasse, but on the day of the weapons meet it was used to demonstrate the marksmanship and cooperation of Berlin's Allies.

The rifle event called for 15 "players" from each team to fire their individual weapons at targets set at various distances from 50 to 200 meters, within various time limits in both day and night environments. The event lasted all day and when the points were tallied, Sp4 George E. Hall, Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 3rd Battalion, had

Berlin cafeterias offering discounts

The Army and Air Force Exchange Service cafeterias and snack bars in Berlin will offer special savings this month, twice the normal monthly discounts, according to an exchange spokesman.

Included will be 40 percent off on any amount of fried chicken and french fries today and tomorrow; 30 cents off any Danish pastry and 10-ounce coffee on Nov. 14; 60 cents off on the soup of the day and a reuben sandwich on Nov. 16 and 17; 50 cents off on a ham and cheese three-egg omelet on Nov. 30 and 40 percent off on a jumbo cheeseburger plus fries and a soda drink on Nov. 29 and 30.

The Berlin cafeteria is remaining open Nov. 26, Thanksgiving, and will serve roast turkey and all the trimmings for \$2.80. Pumpkin, mincemeat and pecan pies will also be sold.

Any vehicle in the line may pass all vehicles to its front. However, all drivers attempting to pass must clear both oncoming traffic and any other vehicles to the rear that may also be attempting to pass.

Failure of a driver to clear traffic in both directions may cause that driver to be held responsible for a resulting traffic accident.

They believed in the worth of our country's people and traditions, in the right of men to liberty and the pursuit of happiness, as well as life. They lived by their faith in those things. They kept the faith with their country and with us who follow. They set the example for those of us in uniform.

We can best pay tribute to all veterans, Wednesday, by recognizing what they have achieved, and in joining them in their resolve to keep America free.

We have no greater obligation.

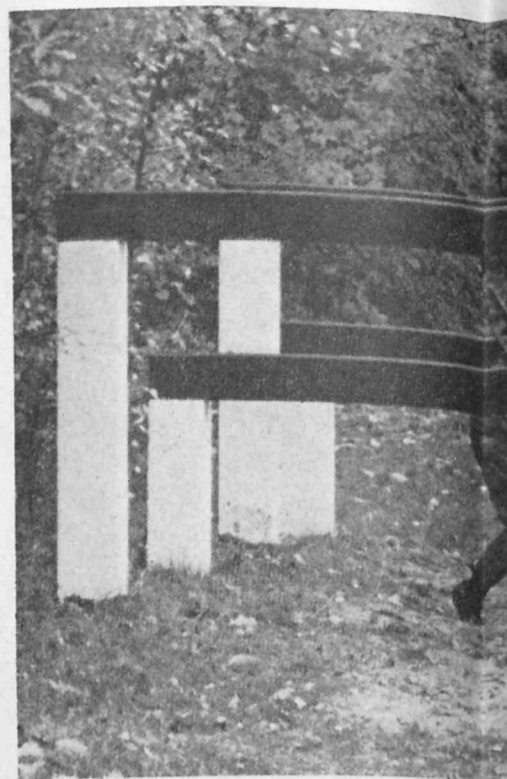

taken top honors and earned an individual award, while Sgt. Jereen Sheffield, Company C, 2nd Battalion, and British Guardsman David Cobbold, tied for second.

In the pistol event, nine members of each team were required to fire 10 rounds within four minutes at a standard target. In phase two, the pistol marksmen had to fire 10 rounds in 30 seconds at a combat silhouette. Then came the hard part. In phase three of the pistol event, the firers were given six target exposures for three seconds each, with five-second intervals. Sp4 Mark L. Collins, Company C, 4th Battalion, took first place in the pistol event, with SFC Jon Weeks, Headquarters Company, Berlin Brigade, earning a runner-up trophy.

The headquarters pistol event was held for the commander's staff officers. U. S. Army Capt. Timothy F. Fitzpatrick, Headquarters Company, Berlin Brigade, took first place with French Adjutant Michel Brasseur taking the runner-up trophy.

Fitzpatrick, the captain of the first-place-finishing C team, said, "The day was a great success, and one reason for the success was the outstanding support provided by the guys running the range, setting up targets, keeping the scores and everything. They really worked hard and saw to it that everything went off just right." Fitzpatrick's C team also took first place in the open event.

The sub-machinegun event called for the participants to fire at targets for a designated length of time. Points were tallied for each hit, and British Guardsman Alexander Smith took first place in the event with

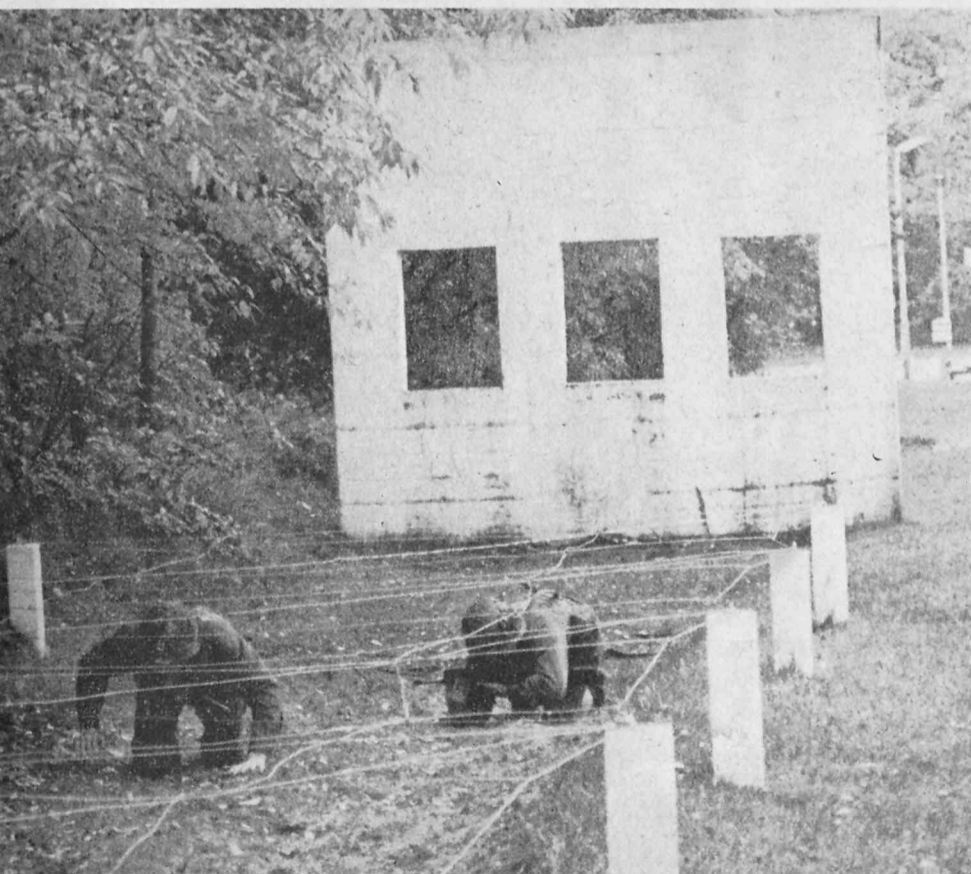

Friday's win advanced the Berlin girls to the semi-finals against Baumholder. The winner of that match was to advance and face Zweibruecken or Bitburg in the finals.

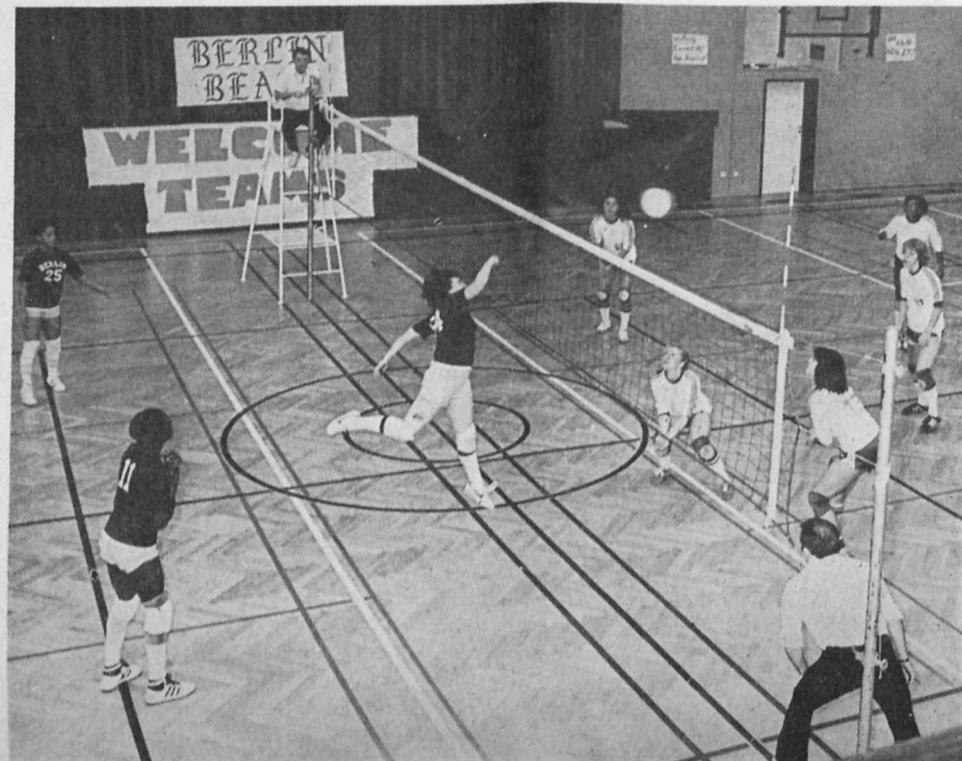

League with a perfect 10-0 record. The Eagles finished second, followed by the Hurricanes.

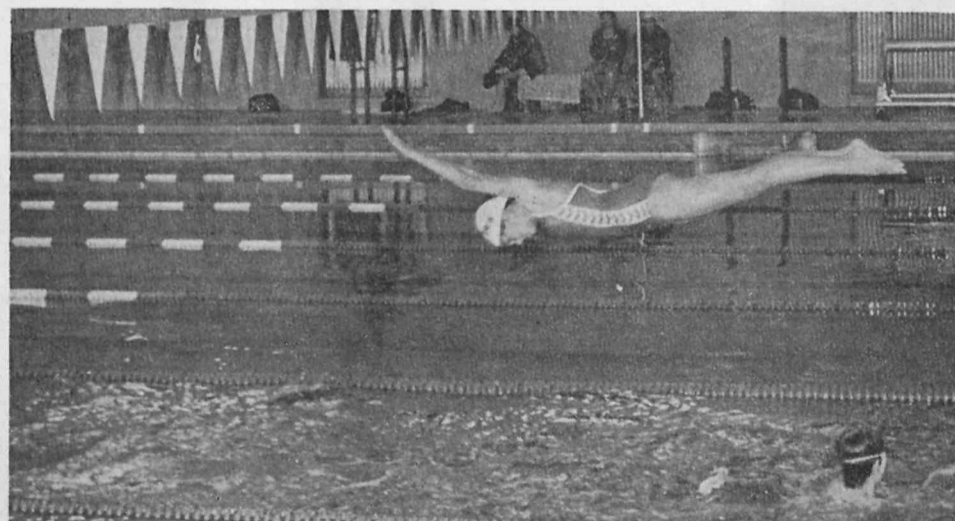
The Strikers led the "E" League soccer standings, followed by the T-men and Tornados.

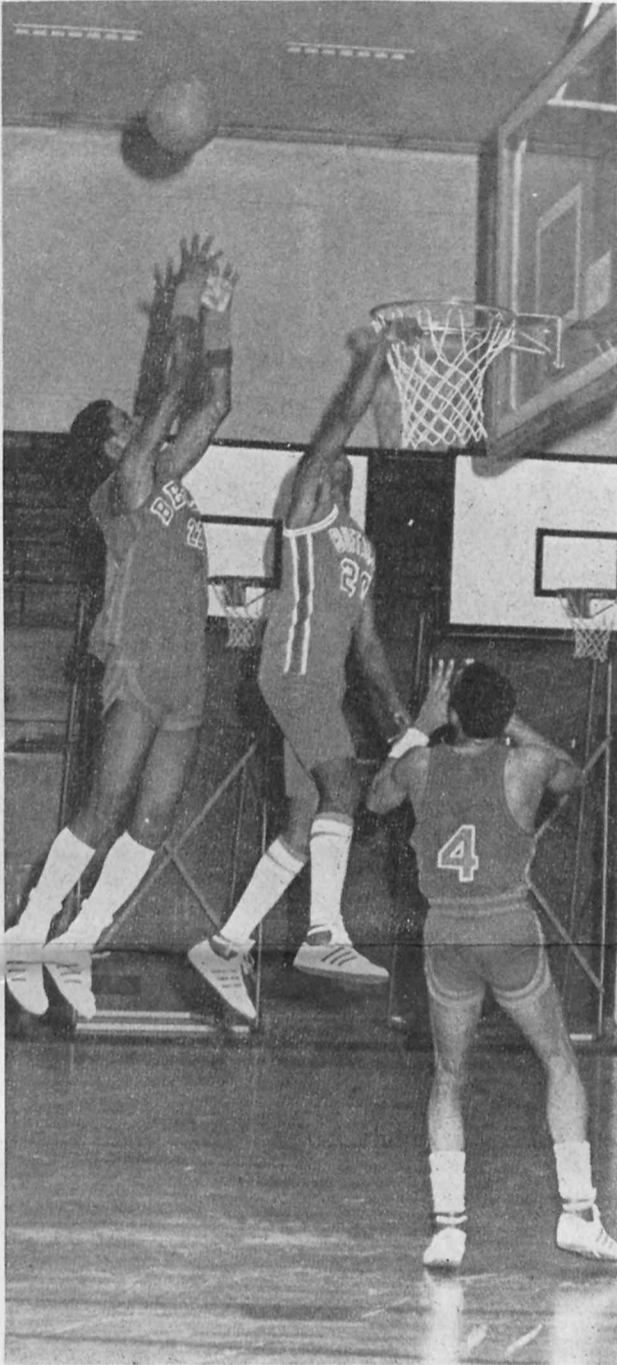

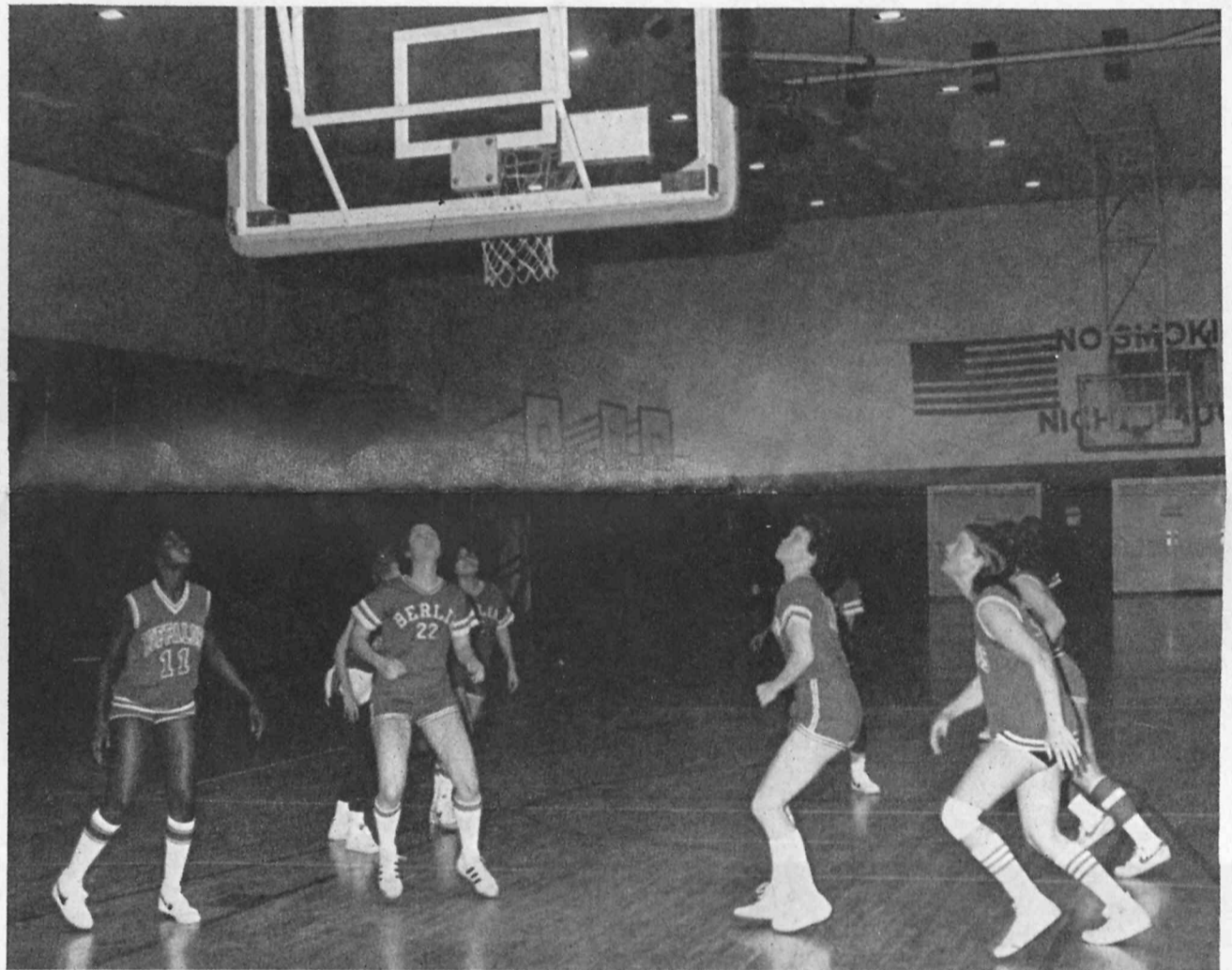
The women's game scheduled for Sunday was cancelled because of injuries to Patch team members.

Keep holidays happy, buy children safe toys

Christmas is a season for children. It's a time when little ones start thinking of all the wonderful toys Santa and their parents will leave under the tree.

If you've started shopping early for those toys, make sure the ones you choose are safe for your children to play with — before you buy them.

Here are some hints on protecting children from toy-related injuries:

A doll, stuffed animal or other similar toy should have no removable parts, such as buttons or keys, which can be swallowed if they are removed.

Remember that while a toy may be intended for one child, younger brothers and sisters may get a hold of it, so select gifts wisely.

Make sure the toy is not apt to break into small pieces and leave jagged edges.

Don't be misled by electrical toys. A "play" oven, that can bake a cake, is hot enough to seriously burn skin.

All electrical toys should carry an Underwriter's Laboratories Label and be flame retardant.

Toys which shoot projectiles should be avoided. If you do buy a "shooting" toy, make sure the projectiles are tipped with soft rubber.

Avoid all sharp, pointed objects. Look for rounded edges.

While American manufactures no longer use toxic lead paint, be sure that the paint is non-toxic when purchasing toys from a foreign toy shop or when refinishing used toys.

Avoid caps or toy guns which make loud noises or work under high pressure.

Avoid toys that have extremely long cords or are wrapped in thin plastic bag material.

Don't ruin your child's happiness at Christmas or anytime with dangerous toys. Christmas is a joyous season, so when you're shopping for those toys make sure that you are not influenced by packaging and advertising. Look for safety, too!
