

Berlin's Field Station wins Travis Trophy

Field Station, Berlin, has won a new trophy to show they're the best in their field. They've just been named 1982 Travis Trophy winners by the National Security Agency (NSA).

The Travis Trophy is presented annually by NSA for the most outstanding unit contribution in support of the U.S. communications by a Field Station.

FSB was the Army's nomination for the award, but faced competition from Navy and Air Force organizations.

Col. Louis D. Kirk, FSB commander, was invited to attend the ceremony on May 5 at Fort Meade, Maryland and accepted the award for his unit from Lt. Gen. Lincoln D. Faurer, director, NSA.

It didn't take long for the good news to reach FSB. In fact, Kirk called from the states to tell his organization they had just won the coveted award.

The Travis Trophy was first presented by Sir Edward Travis, K.C. M.G., to the U.S. Army Security

Agency and the U.S. Naval Communications Supplementary Activity in 1945 as an award for competitive games. In 1964, the NSA director designated it as an award to the communication agency which has made the most significant contribution in operations management, administration, or suggestions.

According to Lt. Col. Creed Morgan, Field Station's deputy commander, FSB is the only unit to win the award twice, winning first in 1974.

"The award is a result of a total Field Station effort," Morgan said. "It belongs to every member of the station." Then he added that the outstanding support and the entire Berlin community were also a factor in their recognition.

Kirk returned to Berlin this week with a plaque announcing the award. The trophy is being shipped from the states.

Ceremony honors airlift

To commemorate the Berlin Airlift, the valiant efforts of its heroes, and the resulting end of the Berlin Blockade, the 33rd annual Airlift Memorial Ceremony was held at the Platz der Luftbrücke Memorial, Tempelhof Central Airport, Wednesday.

The traditional ceremony is held each year on the anniversary of the end of the Blockade, May 12, 1949.

The Allied commandants and Air Force commanders laid wreaths at the memorial to honor those who lost their lives in the airlift. Berlin's governing mayor and other city and district officials also participated in the wreath laying. British, French and U.S. Air Force honor guards took part in the ceremony, and both German and British bands played.

An Airlift Scholarship Award Ceremony followed the commemoration. Held at the Columbia House, the three Allied commanders each awarded two Berliners scholarships from the memorial fund. The Scholarship recipients will study in Great Britain, France, or the United States for one year.

The memorial fund was originally established to strengthen Berlin's link to the western world and to express Berliner's sympathy for those who died during the Airlift.

Since the fund started in 1959, 170 Berliners have received these scholarships which have allowed them to become acquainted with the political and cultural systems of the Allied nations and their institutions.

Allies prepare for tomorrow's parade

For the past several weeks, Allied soldiers have been gearing up for tomorrow's Allied Forces Day Parade.

Around the city, British, French, and U.S. soldiers have been getting vehicles primed and shiny, perfecting their marching skills, and squaring away their uniforms and equipment for the annual demonstrations of Allied commitment to Berlin.

More than 3,000 soldiers, 100 bands, 70 tanks, and 300 plus vehicles will parade down 17 Juni Strasse and Allied parachute teams will put on free-fall demonstrations.

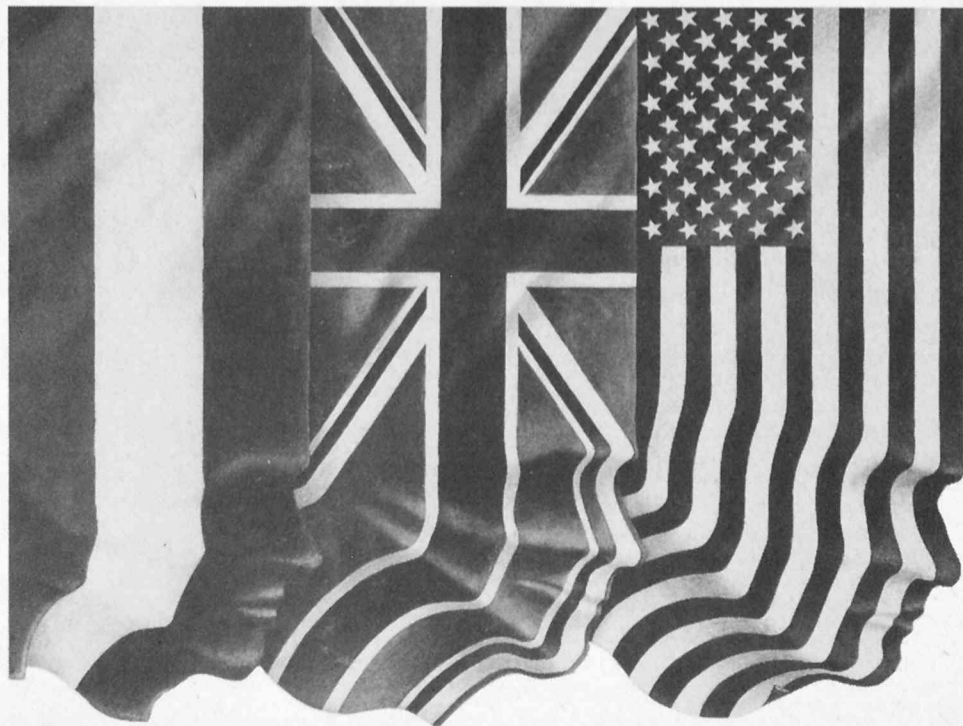
But this colorful, precision display doesn't take place without long hours of preparation.

While Berlin Brigade infantry battalions have been "pounding leather" and readying vehicles and uniforms, the units of Combat Support Battalion have been cleaning, painting, and shining their tanks, howitzers, and engineer equipment for the mechanized drive-by which will also include MP gun jeeps.

"The battalions have really been working hard," said 1st Lt. John Maynard, U.S. parade officer. "I'd say they're even looking better than they did this time last year."

The Berlin Brigade Band will be joined by bands from the 1st and 3rd

Make riding safe, fun

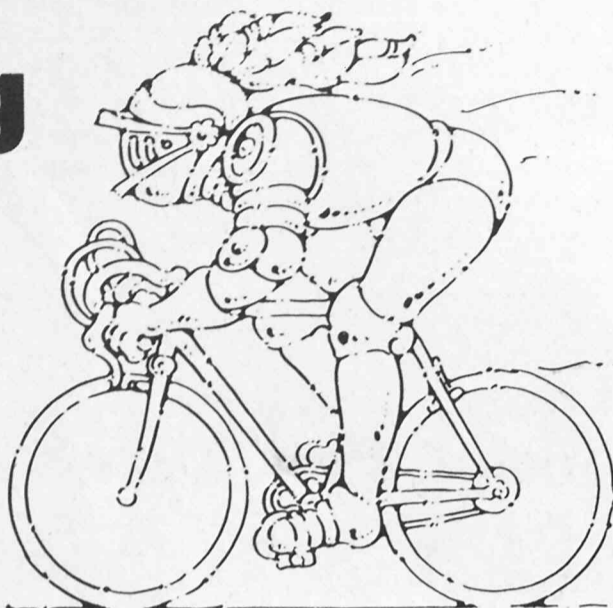
When you "hit the open road" on your bike, make sure it doesn't hit back!

Americans are rediscovering the bicycle as an exciting piece of recreational equipment as well as a fuel-saving type of transportation.

But a vastly increased number of riders have brought about a surge in bicycle-related accidents and injuries. The bicycle was identified as the consumer product most frequently involved in accidents and injuries.

The main cause for accidents were: operator negligence/bicycle misuse, 70 percent; bicycle failure, 10 percent; other's negligence, eight percent; poor maintenance, six percent; and road hazards, three percent.

If you ride a bicycle, observe the following safety tips.



- Wear protective equipment and clothing. Head and face injuries can be prevented or lessened if appropriate head gear is worn. To improve your chances of being seen, wear light-colored clothing.
- Observe all local ordinances pertaining to bicycles.
- Keep right: drive with traffic, not against it.

- Use bicycle paths where available.
- Watch for drain grates, potholes, soft shoulders, and other road surface hazards. Be careful of loose sand or gravel, particularly at corners.
- Watch for car doors opening or for cars pulling into traffic. Remember, cars have a "blind spot" on the left rear side that bicycles fit neatly into.
- Don't carry passengers or packages that interfere with vision or control.
- Never hitch a ride on a truck or other vehicle.
- Be extremely careful at intersections, especially when making a left turn. Most accidents happen at intersections.
- Use hand signals to indicate turning or stopping.
- Protect yourself at night with the required red reflectors and lights.
- Drive a safe bike. Have it inspected to ensure good mechanical condition.
- Drive your bike defensively: watch out for the other guy. (AFPS)

Crumpled and curious

Transportation reply:

The "rough ride" on the Berlin-Frankfurt passage actually occurs between Berlin and Helmstedt. It is caused by the inadequate maintenance condition of the road and rail trackage.

This single rail line is very heavily used and the GDR Reichsbahn maintenance efforts have not kept pace with the need. This results in a safe, yet bumpy ride.

Seperation changes; easier discharge

Changes in the Army's enlisted separations regulation, AR 635-200, will make it easier for commanders to discharge soldiers who are marginal performers or are otherwise unsuitable for further Army service, say Army personnel officials.

A change to the Expeditions Discharge Program now lets commanders discharge a marginal performer without the soldier's consent between the sixth and 36th month of service, explain officials in the office of the Army's Deputy Chief of Staff for Personnel. Previously, soldiers had to agree to the discharge under the governing chapter (Chapter 5) of the regulation.

In another change, commanders can now involuntarily discharge soldiers with less than six years of total service without having the discharges considered by a board of officers. This is a change in unsuitability discharges under Chapter 13 of the regulation.

These changes, say personnel officials, put into effect Defense Department policies that permit the separation of persons who have failed to adapt to military service. The changes are spelled out in an interim change (104) to the regulation dated and effective April 1, 1982.

Soldiers discharged under these provisions receive either an honorable or general discharge.

Officials say the changes give lieutenant colonels and colonels in command the authority and tools to improve their efforts in maintaining unit competency and readiness.

Lt. Gen. Maxwell R. Thurman, the Army's deputy chief of staff for personnel, pointed out that it's the Army's intention "To promote and retain those — and only those — who demonstrate the ability and fitness to perform competently."

The personnel chief said that this approach implies reenlisting those soldiers who possess the aptitude and attitude to make affirmative contributions to force competency and readiness.

"We grasp the modernization needs of the future clearly enough to understand that we cannot postpone this transformation indefinitely," stated Thurman. (ARNEWS)

Jose Garcia was a former federation president who demonstrated personal sacrifice and unselfish dedication to the organization objectives.

The Latinos Unidos En Berlin were represented by its president Sp5 David G. Gonzales, and vice-president Capt. Mario A. Cervantes, both of Headquarters and Headquarters Company, Berlin Brigade. They also received special recognition at the conference for making the largest monetary donation to FLAC to assist in the annual operating expenses.

The theme of this year's conference was "La Unidad La Fuerza" or "Strength through Unity," with such guest speakers as Congressional Medal of Honor recipient, Maj. Gen. Charles C. Rogers, deputy chief of staff, personnel, USAREUR; Tony Bonilla, president of the League of United Latin-American Citizens (LULAC); and Dr. Mari-Luci Jaramillo, a former ambassador to Honduras.

Hiring program gears up for summer

With summer vacation approaching, the Dependent Youth Summer Hire Program (DYSHP) is gearing up for another successful season of summer employment for American community youths.

Students and youths 14 to 23 years old with authorized military and civilian sponsors, assigned to Berlin are eligible for the program. Individuals can pick up an application form at the Berlin American High School, Career Center, from the Civilian Personnel Division (CPD) at Clay Headquarters, Building 4, second floor, or from the Tempelhof Central Airport office of the CPD located at Building A-2, Room 1803-13.

The DYSHP is divided into two phases. Phase one begins June 14 and lasts through July 16. Phase two starts July 19 through August 20.

Filling positions with the DYSHP will be selected by a drawing held May 28 at the CPD. From the drawing, two lists will be compiled. One list for applicants 14 and 15 years old, and one for applicants 16 to 23. Applications received by the CPD's after the drawing will be placed on the appropriate list in the order they are received. The program will offer a salary of DM 8 per hour.

Applications may be submitted by the sponsor if the applicant is expected to be in Berlin and wants to be involved in the program.

Youth participating in the program will not be authorized overtime, weekend or holiday hours, and although no annual leave will be credited, DYSHP employees will earn sick leave at a rate of one hour for every 20 hours of employment.

Spring . . . cleaning it up

Berlin Brigade soldiers traded their weapons and training for trash bags, shovels, and a walk in the woods recently during a two-day cleanup campaign.

In support of German-American friendship, approximately 1,000 soldiers fell out in the Grunewald on May 5 and 6 to do a little spring cleaning.

According to Capt. Doug Boyd, G-3 training support officer, 5,000 trash bags were issued to the soldiers who covered about 28 square kilometers in the forest. They picked up trash scattered throughout the Grunewald and also repaired roads that had been damaged by Army vehicles during training exercises. "The emphasis initially was on policing U.S. trash and maneuver damage because of recent

increased training in the Grunewald," Boyd said. "But the soldiers ended up doing much more."

Boyd inspected the cleanup areas on horseback with a Berlin forestmeister. Both reported the soldiers had done an "outstanding job."

After each battalion had cleaned its area of responsibility, the soldiers were rewarded for their hard work with a "battalion bash" (a barbecue).

The Berliners read about the cleanup in local newspapers and watched the soldiers in action on German television. One lady even wrote Boyd a letter expressing her appreciation to Berlin Brigade soldiers saying, "I am sure very many Berliners appreciate their help . . . My son and I want to write a thank you to you and the soldiers."

Armored Divisions to lead the infantry battalions.

Approximately 750 French soldiers from the 46th Infantry Regiment, the Gendarmerie, and the 11th Regiment of Chasseurs will also participate in the parade. Their drive-by will include tanks, a light armored car platoon, and a motorcycle platoon.

They'll be led by the 46th Infantry Regiment Band. Sili Besse, band leader, said they had a great deal of work to do in preparation. "We got 11 new men just several days ago," he said. "They had never seen our music, but we'll be ready."

The British units will bring a lot of color and tradition to the parade. It will be a new experience for one British unit. The 2nd Battalion, The Royal Irish Rangers are participating for the first time and according to Capt. Ian McSherry, unit public affairs officer, they've been preparing since April when the battalion had drill competition between the platoons. Since then they've drilled at company and battalion-level and have been having "barracks dress" (parade uniform) inspections.

Their hackles and bonnets (hats), piper green trousers, and their bag pipers will distinguish them from the other British units, which include the 1st Battalion, Kings Own Border Regiment, and 2nd Battalion, The Royal Regiment of Fusiliers. They'll each be led by their respective bands.

The Chieftan tanks of D Squadron 4th/7th Royal Dragoon Guards as well as scout cars, landrovers, and vehicles of other British elements round out the mechanized element.

An Allied Air Force contingent will also march to the music of the Royal Air Force Band.

Spectators should arrive by 2 p.m. Bands will be entertaining spectators before the start of the parade.

Bus transportation will be provided from all of the major housing areas and the Truman Plaza bus terminal.

Buses will depart Andrews via the Sundgauer housing area at 1 p.m., the Düppel housing area and the Truman Plaza bus terminal at 1:15 p.m., and Park Manor Estates at 1:30 p.m.

The buses will be on hand following the parade to return spectators to their respective housing areas.

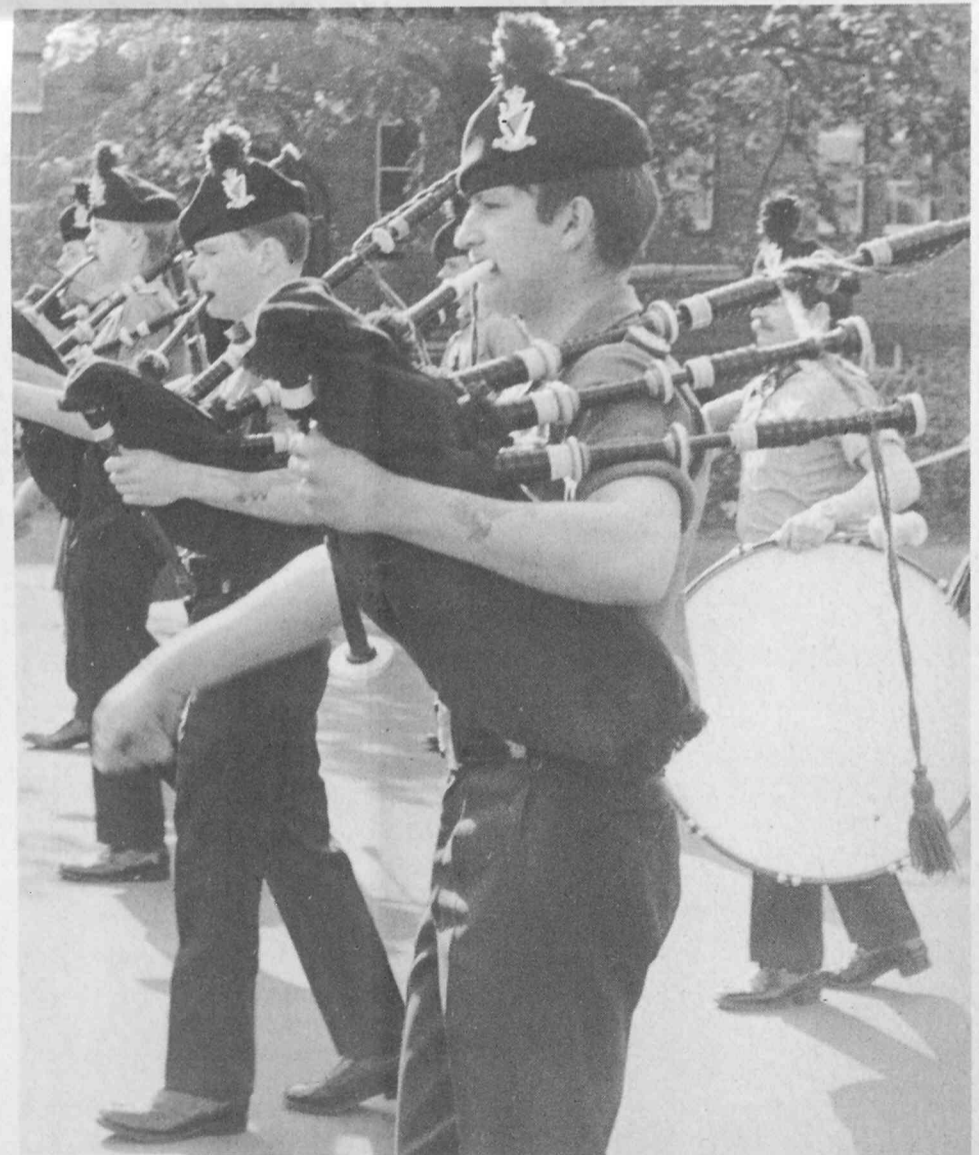

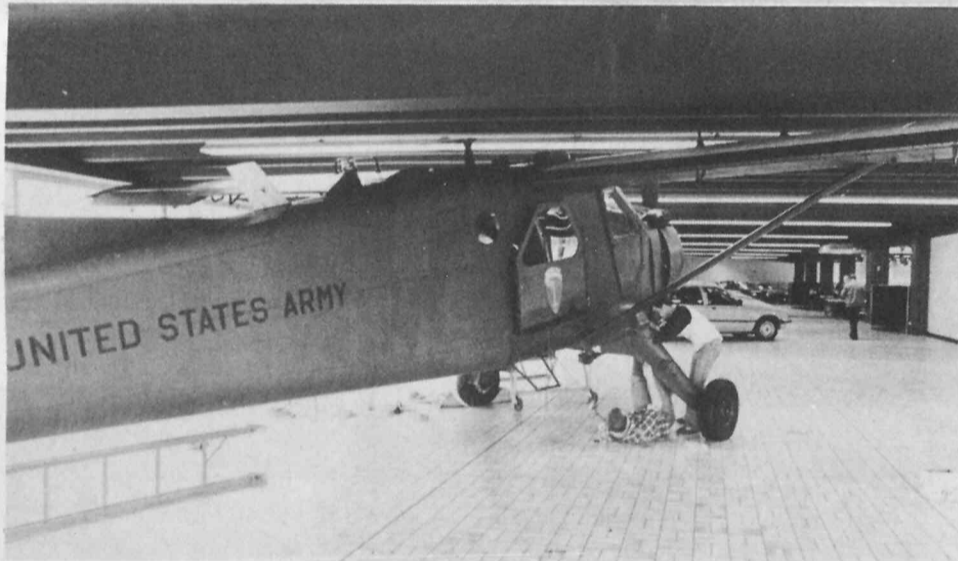

Army finds new home for old Beaver

An Army airplane has landed in a most unlikely spot — a museum display.

In a ceremony Wednesday, U.S. Army, Berlin donated a U-6A (Beaver) airplane to the new Berlin Transportation Museum. Brig. Gen. Leroy N. Suddath, Berlin Brigade commander, presented the aircraft in a brief ceremony opening a mini-display "Flugzeug und Motoren" (Aircraft and Engines) at the Autohaus Finkbeiner am Sachsendam.

This particular plane, was used in the command from 1973 to 1979 for transportation of cargo and personnel between Berlin and West Germany and for pilot training. But Beavers had been in Berlin since 1962.

When it was retired, the command sought and received authority to present the plane on permanent loan to the Transportation Museum. While

waiting for space to be displayed, the plane has been stored at the Army Aviation Detachment.

Transporting the single engine four-seater was no easy task. First the wings had to be taken off and then pulled through the streets of Berlin by a jeep. Aviation Section personnel had to reassemble the plane when it reached its destination.

During the presentation, Suddath said, "Since the airplane was operational in the skies above Berlin for so many years, it is appropriate that it remain in Berlin. It will be placed in this great new museum as a reminder of the friendship between Berliners and Americans."

The Beaver will be on display in its current location until the end of June when it will be stored until construction of the Berlin Transportation Museum is completed.

Soldiers convicted

Four court-martials were held in the command recently and there was one acquittal. The convictions are as follows:

PFC Gary L. Dever, Company C, 4th Battalion, was convicted by a General Court-Martial April 28 for communicating a threat, assault, and assault with a means likely to produce grievous bodily harm. Dever was sentenced to confinement at hard labor for one year, to forfeit all pay and allowances, to be reduced in grade to Pvt. 1, and to be discharged with a Bad Conduct Discharge.

Pvt. 1 Dewayne Johnson, Company B, 2nd Battalion, was convicted by a Special Court-Martial

April 29 for disrespect towards an officer, disobeying an officer, disrespect toward an NCO, disobeying an order of an NCO, and being disorderly in command. Johnson was sentenced to be confined at hard labor for three months, to forfeit \$367 pay per month for three months, and to be discharged with a Bad Conduct Discharge.

SFC Jerome McLaughlin, Headquarters and Headquarters Company, Berlin Brigade, was convicted by a Special Court-Martial April 29 for wrongful appropriation of government funds. McLaughlin was sentenced to be reduced in grade to E-5.
