2nd Battalion named USAREUR winner

The 2nd Battalion has been named as the USAREUR winner in the Army Award for Maintenance Excellence in the heavy density category. The announcement was made by the USAREUR selection team to Brig. Gen. Leroy N. Suddath, Jr., Berlin Brigade commander, this past week.

Lt. Col. Jouni Keravuori, battalion commander, announced the results of the competition Wednesday.

"When you realize the number of battalions in Europe you can easily see the significance of this award in being declared the best maintenance unit in Europe," said Keravuori.

"The award the battalion has earned is the result of the hard work and dedication of not just the vehicle mechanics but also of the specialists in supply, communications, NBC and weapons. Everyone should be congratulated for it's an award that reflects the leadership of the NCOs and officers. But most importantly, it comes from the long hours of all who worked with vehicles, crew served weapons, supplies and communication equipment.

"We are playing in the big league now against tough competition," the battalion commander added. "But I'm sure that the people judging this competi-

tion will see the quality of our program."

As USAREUR's representative, the battalion will compete with as many as 13 other entries worldwide. The packet that will be submitted in early 1983 will emphasize categories such as readiness training, management, cost, innovation and awards. The message the battalion will convey will simply be that the Guardians employ an effective maintenance program which makes it "Ready to fight and win."

Announcement of the Army-wide winners will be made in March with the awards to be presented in April at the American Defense Preparedness Association's convention, the sponsor of the competition. Sp4 Howard Hawk observed, "We have the best maintenance program in Europe. Everyone does their job no matter what their rank is."

Sp4 Charles Murphy added that the maintenance section deserves the award since it works together.

Combat arms are often at center stage. Therefore, there is often a tendency to overlook the support personnel — the mechanics, armorers, clerks, and vehicle operators. Capt Richard Kane, the battalion S-4 officer and the author of the packet declared that the award is "a great accomplishment and a deserved recognition. It was through their efforts and good leadership that this award was achieved."

Operation Santa Claus gets underway

Operation Santa Claus, sponsored by Army Community Services, began Wednesday and will provide about 180 needy military families here with food and gift baskets this Christmas.

The Toy and Food Drive for the operation is on and boxes for donations will be placed in the Berlin commissary, the Main Exchange, the barracks and Toyland.

Among the many items that can be donated are turkey, ham, canned vegetables, stuffing mix, instant potatoes, and other items needed to make a Christmas meal or toys.

Private associations or individuals may make voluntary donations of money, gifts or food to help provide dinner and presents to fill the Christmas baskets. The Warrant Officer's Association made the first cash donation on Monday. They donated a wheelbarrow full of dollar bills.

It's up to the first sergeants and pla-

toon sergeants to compile and submit names of personnel who they feel are needy, however any suggestions to ACS are accepted. Some of the criteria used to decide the recipients will be the soldier's rank, the number of dependents, or if the soldier has severe financial problems.

The names of the soldiers and each family member as well as the home address and phone number must be submitted to ACS.

According to Ann Lewis, an ACS volunteer, "Operation Santa Claus is a terrific opportunity for all of us in the military community here to pull together and really do something to help those who are less fortunate, and to make sure they have a Merry Christmas."

ACS needs volunteers to help wrap gifts and prepare the food baskets. The actual delivery will be on Dec. 23. In conjunction with Operation Santa Claus, ACS will hold an Open House

on Dec. 18 and 19. Santa will be on hand to greet the children and give out gifts.

"Christmas is for children," said SSgt. Bernie Connors, ACS NCOIC.

"This is a chance for the Berlin community, soldiers and private organizations to make a brighter Christmas here. This is our way of saying Merry Christmas."

Suddath answers your questions

On Nov. 11 Brig. Gen. Leroy N. Suddath, Jr., community commander, was the guest on AFN's 'Answer Line' fielding questions from members of the community who phoned in.

In order to fully respond to all of the questions from the community the Observer will be carrying Suddath's answers in installments. Following is the second installment of those questions and answers.

Why can't we have payday activities in Berlin? Every payday it seems like the commanders find some reason to cancel the half-day activities.

Payday activities are defined in a recent letter sent to all commanders. The mornings will be devoted to inspections determined by the commander, while the afternoons will be free to conduct personal business. Exceptions to this may be mission essential personnel. However, every effort will be put forth to ensure that our soldiers are looked after in a concerned and caring way.

Why isn't Fall Cleanup delayed until all the leaves are off the trees?

Predicting the completion cycle for falling leaves is far from an exact science. Experience has shown that the majority of leaves have fallen by the first week in November. The time frame for Fall Cleanup is not extended into the Thanksgiving season or beyond for climatic reasons. This fall was unusually long due to the warm summer. This situation was known and considered during the inspection process.

We are two active duty married personnel who are presently in a one-bedroom apartment. The government takes BAQ from both of us for the apartment. Why is that?

AR 210-50, Paragraph 3-9 states that when government quarters are assigned to married service members, neither member is entitled to BAQ.

A married military couple has professional equipment related to their MOS and their military housing is too

small to keep all of it. Can the Army provide some place to keep it?

Government quarters are assigned according to grade, family size and composition. All quarters in the command are deemed adequate. Each housing unit is assigned a storage area to secure personal property.

Why aren't family member's skills and education better used, instead of for food service and secretarial work?

U.S. family members receive priority for all DM-paying positions that require outside recruitment and for which they qualify based on their skills and education. The caller might be under the assumption that we only recruit for positions such as food service workers and secretaries, since during the past months we repeatedly advertised these jobs in order to update our applicant supply file in these job categories.

Parking around the Sundgauer Housing area is sometimes a problem because of narrow streets. I have a problem getting out because of parking in the streets.

There does exist an inconvenience for drivers because of the large volume of parked cars, residences and certain narrow streets. Elimination of these parking spaces would be the answer at the cost of compounding the inconvenience to residents and causing greater parking problems elsewhere. Presently the streets can be safely negotiated with caution, and no change is therefore anticipated.

Residents of the Sundgauer Housing area are strongly encouraged to make maximum use of the adequate number of parking spaces next to the various apartment buildings within the housing area and to stay off the public streets as much as possible. Parking violators should be reported to the MP desk by calling 819-3402 or 819-3512.

Could you address the security measures in Berlin for military and families?

The security measures are too extensive to list and generally not available

for publication for obvious reasons.

Military Police are assigned specific housing areas to patrol. West Berlin Police routinely patrol U.S. housing areas and when dictated by the circumstances, increase their uniformed and plain-clothes presence markedly.

Servicemen and their families have been provided information about security, most recently, in a written packet provided to local area coordinators and senior occupants. The greatest security resource must be each family member as he or she sees suspicious activity, people loitering, or cars cruising, and reports that observation to military police.

Servicemen and their families should also realize that security efforts in this community are on-going and should not be interpreted as an indication of a growing threat against the U.S. Forces in Berlin.

A common sense approach in exercising very basic security precautions at home, at work or while in transit will go a long way.

Can the general explain the promotion policy to E-4 in Field Station? A

lot of people have over two years in grade and no one seems to know what the policy is?

The authority for E-3 to E-4 promotions has been consolidated at the Field Station Berlin level as per authority in AR 600-200. This method is used to give each soldier in FSB, regardless of unit of assignment an equal chance of promotion.

On a monthly basis, the unit commanders give the FSB commander a list of personnel in their units recommended for promotion. These lists from all assigned and attached units, are consolidated and put in order of merit, by first listing all personnel who are fully eligible for promotion (no waivers needed), in order of time in grade. Then all the personnel in need of waivers are listed in order of time in grade and placed below the list of fully eligible service members.

Using the formula stipulated by Department of the Army, the number of promotions authorized are then applied to the order of merit list for the month, with the first criterion being time in grade.

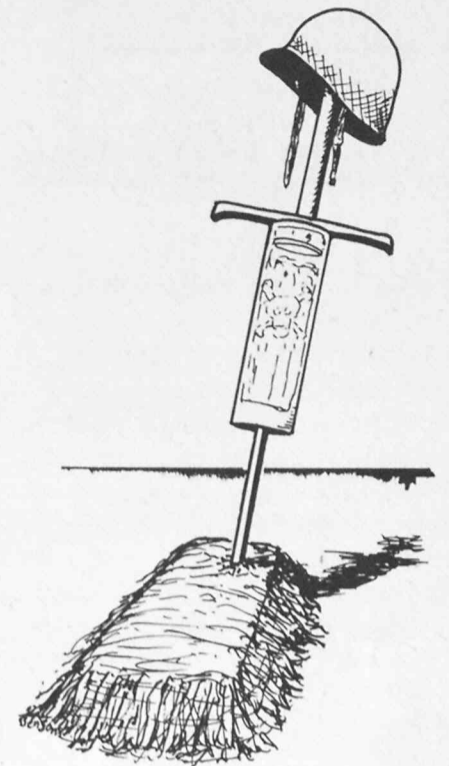

Safe driving

With winter weather already here, the Provost Marshal's (PM) office has some advice on bad weather driving.

Before you even consider taking your privately owned vehicle (POV) for a spin, insure that it is in proper working order, advises the PM.

Some of the areas you should definitely check include lights, tires, brakes, defrosters and windshield wipers. Make sure they meet all safety standards. Windows areas should be kept free from snow, ice and dirt so as not to interfere with visibility, which is a factor in many accidents.

Speed is also an important factor in accident prevention. The PM suggests you consider the existing road conditions, not just the posted speed limits.

Maintaining a greater distance between your car and those in front is important as is using the brakes with gradual, steady pressure. Never slam on the brakes as this will cause you to lose control of your vehicle.

Plan to drive during the daytime on long trips, especially when using the Berlin-Helmstedt Autobahn, and use approved safety equipment to include seat belts. Daytime driving makes it easier to see road and directional signs. Another good idea is to take blankets and hot coffee with you on a long trip to help keep you warm in case of breakdowns en route.

Community members are always encouraged to utilize available bus transportation, adds the PM, particularly during extreme weather conditions. It is convenient to most locations and can safely operate in extreme weather conditions.

The winners of the 1982 USAREUR Tournament of Plays have been announced and three people from Berlin are among them.

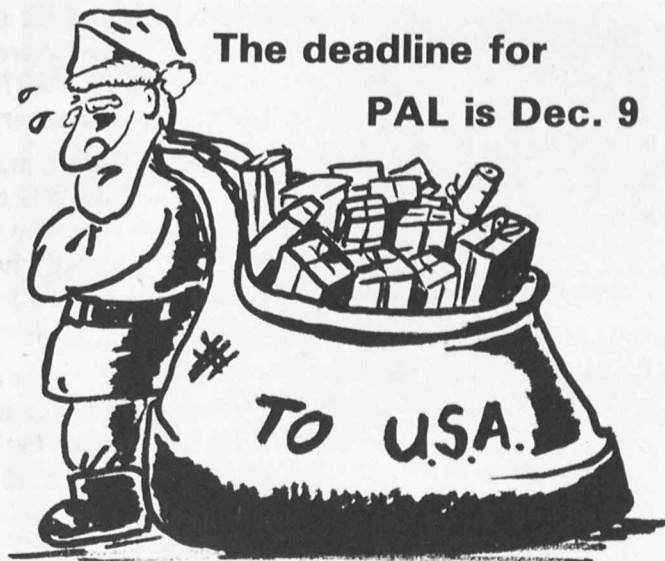
Berlin's entry was "The Imaginary Invalid" by Moliere and was presented at Andrews Barracks'

Berlin's next opponent turned out to be

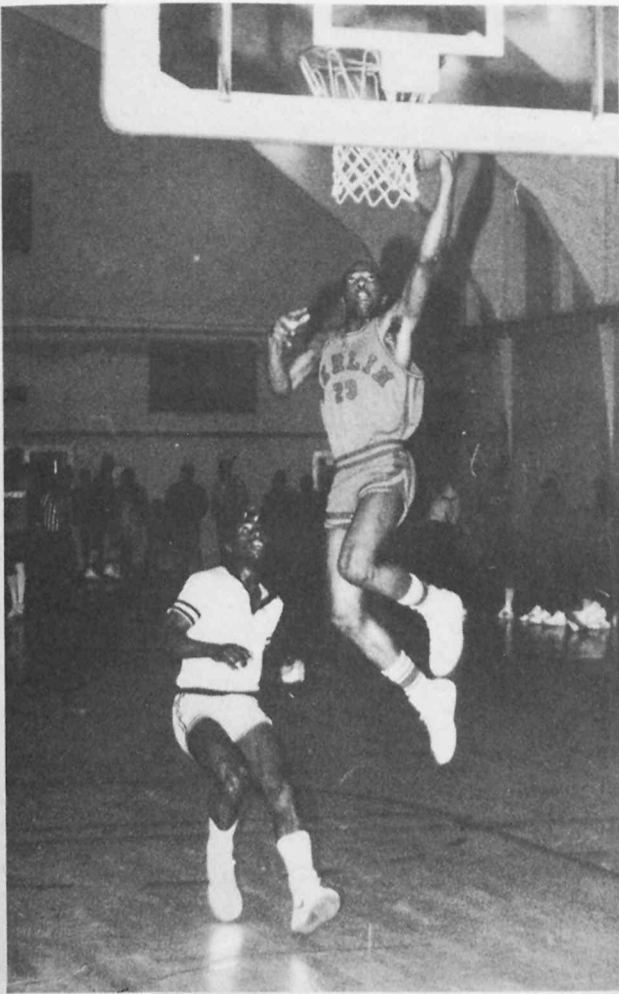

4th Bn. soldiers test NBC skills

The soldiers of 4th Battalion have spent this week at Rose Range evaluating their NBC proficiency.

Each company upon arriving at the site was broken down into platoons and sent to one of the four stations to start.

The main station was the individual proficiency/gas chamber where each individual was tested on nine different tasks and then sent to the gas chamber. Before entering the chamber, the soldiers trained fitting their protective masks and on the different MOPP levels. To check the fit of their mask, they did calisthenics to increase their breathing rate before entering.

"My station is putting on and wearing the protective mask," said Sp4 Kurt Kogelschal, 43rd Chemical Detachment, an evaluator. "The main requirement for this station is to be able to put the mask on properly and within 15 seconds. Being proficient at this task could save your life."

"There's no doubt that the NBC training is needed," said 1st Lt. Rodney M. Poole, battalion NBC officer. "Although the results have been good so far, I question whether or not the soldiers can sustain the proficiency they develop during these exercises."

One of the stations the soldiers seemed to need more training in was mask to mouth resuscitation. "The reason this task is so important is that the medics cannot be everywhere on the battlefield. So each soldier should learn the means possible to save the life of a fellow soldier," said Sp4 Rigoberto Fernandez, station tester.

Other training conducted at the site included basic first aid, communications and a display of Soviet weapons.

"We've been fortunate in getting evaluator assistance from the 43rd Chemical Detachment," added Poole, "these personnel along with our battalion NBC specialists have made this the most professional group of trainers I've worked with on these exercises."

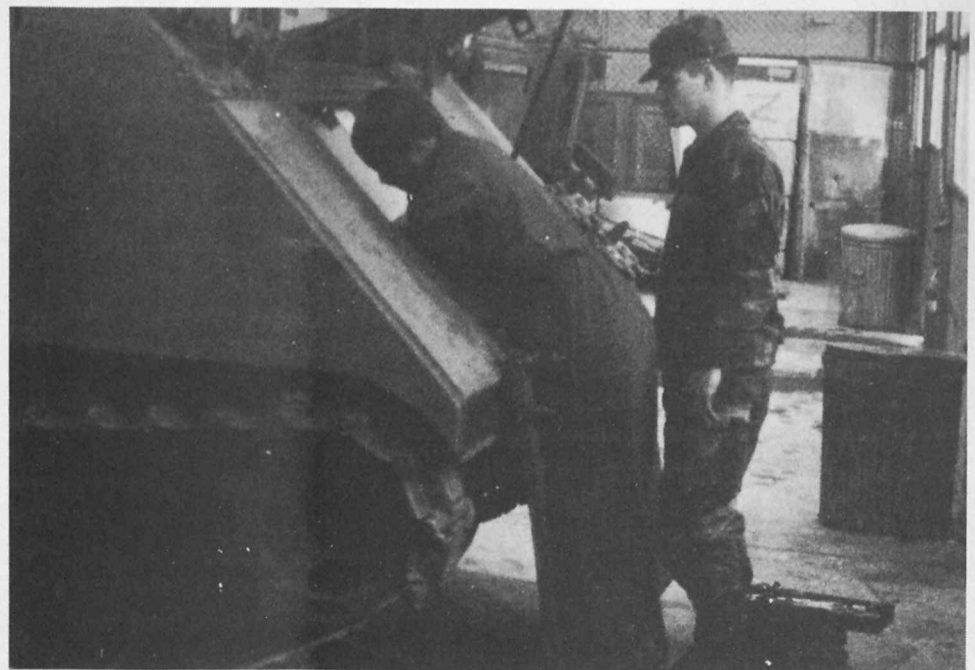
