

# PacMan technology aids brigade training

If you've been doing any reading at all you know that PacMan technology has come to military training. The Battle Simulation Center at the Supply and Service Division Compound has a new training aid to prove it. It even has a toggle control just like the one on your Atari game at home.

This new training aid is called the Berlin Surrogate Travel System. It basically consists of two TV monitors, a video disk player (a Pioneer, just like the one you can get from Sears), a computer (Apple) and a toggle control box. The system allows you to view photographs at whatever speed you choose as though you were following a route down a street, flying through the air, or walking through a building room to room.

It all works this way. You sit down in front of two TVs, pick up the toggle

control, or joystick, and punch up a display on TV 1. This display tells you all of the routes available to view or the buildings you may want to tour as well as instructions on how to control the system.

Say you choose Route 5 — Hohenzollerndamm and Clayallee. Push a button, immediately on screen 1 is a schematic of the route available including an arrow showing where you are. On screen 2 is a scene looking north up Clayallee from "Girl Watchers' Corner." Push the joystick forward and off you go down Clayallee. Monitor 1 shows you statistics such as how far it is to and from certain points and monitor 2 shows you the real scene approximately every 25 feet.

At Clayallee and Argentinische Allee you decide you want to see the same scene from the air. Punch a button, push the toggle and you're mov-

ing down Clayallee 500 feet in the air. With the toggle you can go forward, backward, stop or start.

So maybe you're tired of flying down Clayallee and you feel you're fully familiarized with that route in case you have to make the trip by convoy or on foot. Maybe you need to be familiarized with the Wannsee residence, or the generals' houses or even the Europa Center for some possible future mission. Just select one of the above and you can tour it step by step.

According to Roger Tierney, the military exercise planner at the Battle Simulation Center, the Surrogate Travel System was procured through DARPA, the Defense Advanced Research Projects Agency. It's a Department of Defense agency that specializes in high-tech hardware and planning.

Says Tierney, "Through DARPA we were able to provide what we feel is an innovative, modern training system to aid conventional training here. One video disk has about 54,000 pictures on it and if we had all the maps with the detail of one video disk it would probably fill a whole room.

"Plus," Tierney adds, "with the Apple you have the capability of selectivity. You can see exactly what you want, in the sequence you want.

Sometimes called "movie maps," the Surrogate Travel System will be used to train soldiers on certain routes and buildings throughout the city. In the future, Tierney says, it is expected to be expanded to include more detailed, comprehensive projects. Eventually a commander could conceivably familiarize himself with any detailed part of his area of operation from the comfort of his office.

### German Red Cross provides ambulances

## USAH stages casualty exercise

Medical personnel from the U.S. Army Hospital Berlin, aided by several ambulances supplied by the German Red Cross, staged a mass casualty exercise Tuesday.

This was the first time the German Red Cross has been involved in an exercise of this type, according to 1st Lt. Gordon A. Lewis, adjutant for the U.S. Army Hospital. Lewis stated that initially the joint exercise called for helicopters from Berlin's aviation detachment to make two flights to transport the simulated wounded from the site at McNair Barrack's Defenders Field to Roosevelt Barracks. Ambulances would be on hand then to shuttle patients to the hospital. However, early morning fog canceled the use of the helicopters.

The exercise did begin on schedule, despite the loss of the air transportation, with a 3:45 a.m. readiness test for 95 percent of the hospital staff.

The hospital personnel, augmented by 36 members of the Berlin Brigade Band dressed in NBC protective suits stood by throughout the hospital in anticipation of incoming wounded.

At Defenders Field the scene was chaotic with make-believe wounded and bleeding soldiers, played by members of the Berlin Brigade Drill Team, scattered around the field.

The first of the German ambulances, a specially equipped mobile Intensive Care Unit, arrived on the scene at 6:08 a.m., moments before members of the Crisis Management Team from the hospital.

## Suddath states policy on drugs, alcohol

Brig. Gen. Leroy N. Suddath, Jr., community commander, released a policy letter concerning alcohol and drug abuse in September. In conjunction with the recent Alcohol and Drug Awareness Week, the Observer is running the letter. A copy of the letter is posted on all unit bulletin boards.

"There is no place in the Berlin Brigade for the abuse of alcohol or drugs. I consider the abuse of alcohol or other drugs to be counterproductive to the high degree of mental, physical, and psychological preparedness required of each soldier and civilian

employee. It is my policy to prevent the abuse of alcohol and other drugs in the Berlin Brigade and to rehabilitate those individuals who have become involved in abuse.

"I am committed to the total community approach in the prevention and early identification of alcohol and other drug abuse. Civilian employee/family member participation and use of the program is strongly encouraged.

"Commanders have the tools necessary to identify, educate, and rehabilitate offenders. They also have the tools to expeditiously discipline or separate offenders as

necessary. The Alcohol and Drug Abuse Prevention and Control Program is a command responsibility, and continued efforts must be made at all levels to ensure that the following standards are known and enforced:

- Do not abuse alcohol.**
- Do not possess, distribute or use illegal drugs.**
- Do not condone such activity in your unit.**

"Abuse by officers or noncommissioned officers clearly violates the special trust and confidence the Army places in its leaders."

# 4th Battalion, Rangers compare tactics

Company A, 4th Battalion met the Royal Irish Rangers at Doughboy City Monday to fight, not as enemies but as allies.

The 4th Battalion soldiers linked up with their British counterparts at 10 a.m. at the training site. The purpose of the get-together was to familiarize each unit with the other's MOUT (Military Operations in Urban Terrain) techniques.

A portion of the morning was used to learn each of the different techniques the two allies use. "Their tactics are basically the same as ours, but they seem a little more simplified," said Sp4 Randell Waugh, 3rd Platoon. "They seem to work as well as our own, though," he added.

After lunch, squads were integrated with one British and one American fire team. The operation orders were given and the battle began. One squad was assigned to hold a defensive position

while two other squads attempted to clear the buildings the opposition was holding.

American and British tactics were employed as the squads alternated holding defensive positions and clearing enemy-held buildings.

"I thought it was a great experience. We learned tactics that could be of use sometime in the future," said Sp4 Patrick Cooper.

The Company A soldiers also had the opportunity to learn about the

Rangers' weapons. "I enjoyed learning about their weapons and it was a good opportunity to meet new friends," said PFC James Harwood. "I love to do this type of training and hope to be able to do it more often."

The 4th Battalion soldiers clearly enjoyed the training with the Rangers, according to SSgt. Michael Noone, acting platoon sergeant. "The British are well trained and disciplined. My platoon is looking forward to the next time we train with them," he said.

### Be careful

The U.S. Army Europe (USAREUR) has issued several safety recommendations for U.S. Forces drivers following the latest bombing incidents.

Though recent attacks have all been in the Federal Republic, keeping aware of security here in Berlin is important, too. It's better to take the extra time to follow these steps and not take chances.

Drivers are encouraged to:

Ensure that all vehicles are locked or secured when not in use.

Park in a lighted area.

Before entering a vehicle, inspect the interior, undercarriage, and body to make sure no foreign objects are present.

If any foreign objects are discovered, clear the area, report it to the military police and stay away from the vehicle until qualified bomb disposal personnel declare the area safe.

Cooperate with both, the military and German police.

### AFN hours

Beginning tomorrow through Jan. 2, AFN Berlin television news will be broadcast on a holiday schedule.

AFN TV evening news will air for thirty minutes at 6 p.m. and there will be no late news show.

Berlin Midday will continue through the holiday period.

Radio news will be broadcast in local programming times between 5:30 a.m. and 9:30 a.m. There will be no local news on Dec. 24, 25 and on Jan. 1. Network programming will provide special holiday offerings on those days.

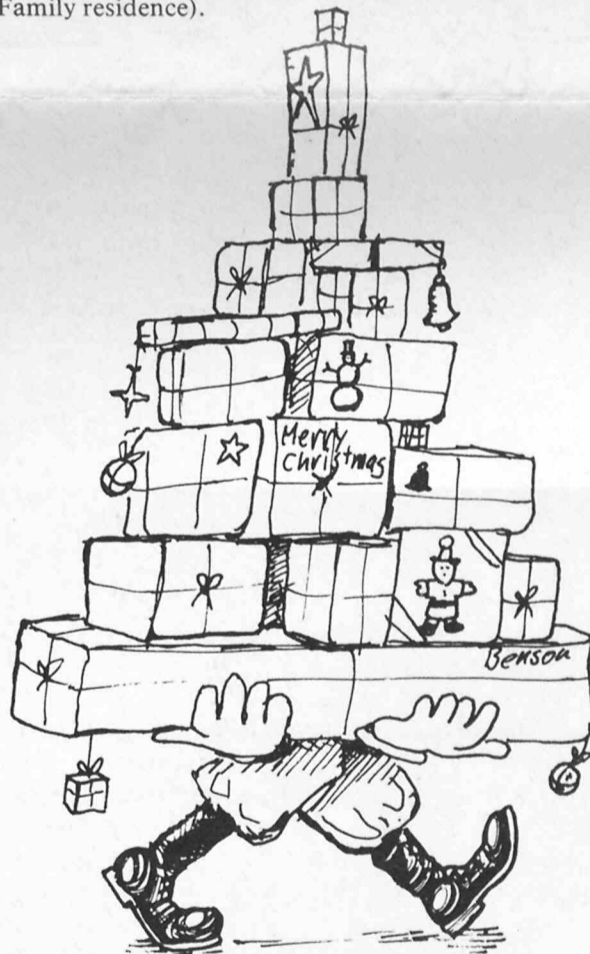

### Secure your plates

The military police have recently received an increased number of lost and stolen license plate reports.

### MEDDAC dining

Starting Monday there is a change in who is authorized to eat in the MEDDAC (hospital) dining facility.

Those people authorized are, inpatients, MEDDAC/DENTAC meal card holders (military and civilian) and their escorted family members. Also bonafide inpatient visitors, personnel with clinic appointments and personnel on official business in the hospital will be authorized to eat in the dining facility if they obtain the appropriate pass from the Adjutant's office.

### Gift rules

Christmas is the time for giving, but there are limits and even prohibitions if the recipients are not members of the U.S. Forces.

Limitations on gifts of rationed items are, tobacco products: 25 cigarettes, 10 cigars, or 60 grams (2.1 oz) of smoking tobacco.

Coffee: 500 grams (17.6 oz) of coffee or 125 grams (4.4 oz) of coffee extract.

Tea: 125 grams (4.4 oz) of tea or 50 grams (1.75 oz) of tea extract.

Spirits: 1 bottle, not to exceed 1.2 liters (quart)

No electrical appliances, office equipment, major household appliances, serially numbered items (such as firearms), furniture or other valuable items like cameras, binoculars, watches and jewelry can be given.

No items bought at the commissary may be given as gifts.

A new motor pool is being built for Battery C, 94th Field Artillery next to their existing motor pool at McNair Barracks.

The work is nearing completion with only the building's heater requiring finishing work. The new bay will have an overhead lift which will allow the battery to move their howitzers into the building to change engines and transmissions.

The existing facility currently does not have this feature, requiring heavy maintenance work to be done outside. In addition, the bay will have two new grease pits.

"The overhead lift in the building will be a lot of help to this motor pool," said SSgt. Jonah White. "It will save much wear and tear on our wrecker.

"During the winter months we used

to improvise so that we wouldn't have to pull engines," said White. "Now there will be no problems - we'll simply pull vehicles inside if we need to work on them."

White also felt the new bay would be an inspiration to the mechanics. SSgt. Kelvin Pointer, 2nd howitzer section chief and gunnery sergeant, agreed saying that the building would be very helpful to mechanics working on unit vehicles during inclement weather.

"We will be able to use the overhead lift and work on the machines instead of having to use the wrecker and work on the vehicles outside," said Pointer. "With this new building we can work on our vehicles and stay warm at the same time."

The entire maintenance section feels that better maintenance will result with the addition of the new motor pool bay.

## Children's Center will open in January

# Many Services under one roof

The Berlin community is getting a special holiday present. The Children's Center next to the Outpost Theatre was completed Wednesday and will be open on Jan. 3.

The Children's Center will offer many services to the community. There will be a day care program, a care program for school age children, and Pre-School classes will be held at the center.

"It's a whole lot of different services under one roof," said Tedi Siminowsky, child support service coordinator. "The Center for Exceptional Children will be moved in here plus we'll have a drop-in service for parents who need to go shopping, to a doctor's appointment or just out for a few hours."

The Center offers 20 children's activity rooms, a library, a music room, a dining room, and three large

play rooms as well as outdoor play and activity areas.

The drop-in service is open from 7 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Monday through Friday with extended hours from 6 p.m. to midnight on Friday.

"If we can get enough care givers we will try to open later on Wednesdays and Saturdays," added Siminowsky.

Each program will be supervised by a professional and each room will have a lead care giver in charge, said Siminowsky. The University of Southern California has agreed to give training classes to the care givers sometime next year.

The Center is looking for anyone who is interested in working with children to help out for a few hours a week. She said that family members as well as soldiers who live in the barracks could easily work at the center. "We'll have instruction for anyone working here as well as special classes for them."

# Pick a fantasy with BVG ads

They fill your head with dreams of chocolate bars, the new bookshelf you've been wanting to buy or the lottery ticket you've been meaning to get, that may put you on "Easy Street."

The 100 fully painted buses of the BVG (Berlin transit system), in addition to getting you to work on time, can capture your imagination or remind you of something you've been wanting to do or to buy with their advertising.

Advertising and the transit system go back a long way. When the first mass transit system started in Berlin, the mobile advertising era was launched, according to Norbert Marquardt, deputy director of the VVR (Advertising Department of the BVG). "In fact, after the war, there were streetcars used solely for advertising," said Marquardt. "They would travel up and down the streets, but didn't take on passengers."

Although there have been many changes and improvements in the transit system itself, the practice of hand painting the advertising on the streetcars is still used on today's modern buses, and even a few times on the underground.

The painting is done in the VVR's headquarters on Alboinstrasse, where they have a paint shop that can accommodate up to 10 buses at one time. The painters follow the design the advertiser wants with a few exceptions. "The buses must always appear to be buses," said Marquardt.

"We must leave some areas of the bus yellow (the normal color of the vehicles), especially around the destination sign, so that people will know it is a city bus. Also, we can't paint the top of the bus. It must remain light-colored, so that the bus does not become unbearably hot in the summer."

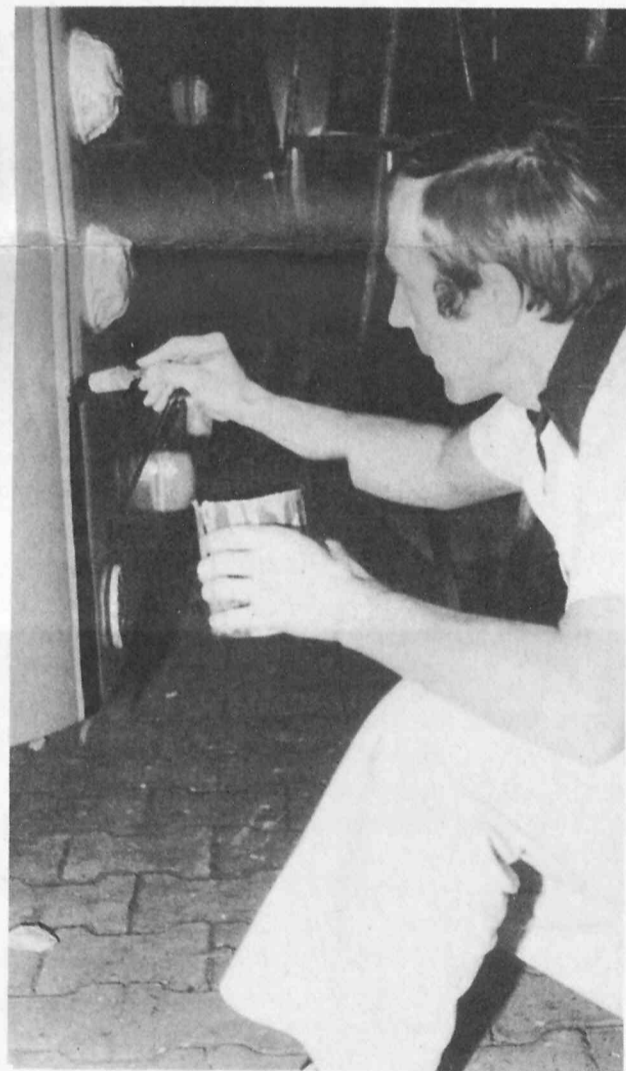
Depending on the design, the painting can take anywhere from a week to more than a month to complete. No more than two painters are assigned to work on one bus. According to Berndt Nolte, master painter, hand painting the ads results in a better product. "It's much easier to control a brush than spray paint," he said.

"We guarantee our customers that the painted ad will last two years," said Marquardt. "When you give a guarantee like that, you have to be sure you have a good product."

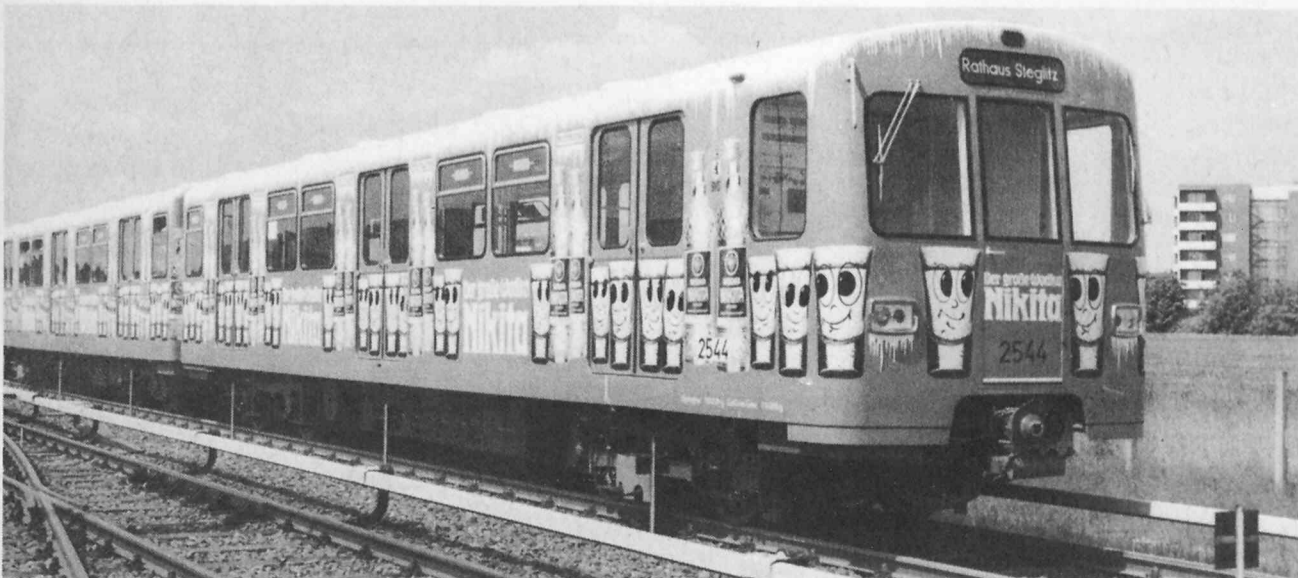


**NO PASSENGERS**—After the war, the German transit system used some streetcars solely for advertising. This passenger-less strassenbahn carries a hand-

The casualties wore tags depicting their simulated injuries which ranged from minor fractures to extensive burns and chemical contamination. The wounded were given emergency medical care and prepared for transportation to the hospital.

The most severely injured were transported first while the intensive care vehicle treated those casualties who supposedly would not have survived the trip to the hospital.

SFC Richard Smith, one of the emergency medical technicians on the scene at Defenders Field, said, "The German Red Cross workers jumped right in and started treating patients right along side of us." Smith added that if it hadn't been for the Red Cross ambulances, the fatality rate would have been at least "50 percent higher."

Once the patients arrived at the hospital they were again screened and sent immediately to the appropriate section of the hospital. The hospital had been divided into four areas of treatment.

From the Triage resuscitation area patients were sent to either the minimal treatment area, where fractures were set and lesser immediate treatment was provided, or to the delayed treatment

area where their injuries were considered serious, but not immediate.

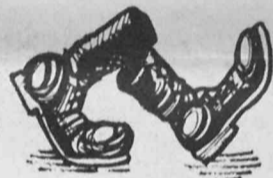
The staff in the immediate treatment area treated patients whose injuries were considered extensive or severe but treatable. The expectant treatment area was where patients were sent whose injuries were so extensive that treatment could not have brought about recovery.

From the 19 simulated casualties, only one arrived at the hospital and was sent to the expectant area.

"The major point of the exercise" according to SSgt. Steven Hendrickson, hospital administration NCO, "was to identify areas of concern that may come up in an actual emergency."

And that point was achieved, as the hospital staff discovered the "immeasurable" asset that can be provided by the German Red Cross emergency personnel and equipment.

According to SFC Paul Felton, S-3 NCO at the hospital "The enlisted people here at the hospital and out on the sight were very impressed. The response time, even without the siren and bluelight, was so professional. I heard nothing but positive comments from the people on the floor."

This weekend is the last before Christmas when all German department stores are open until 6 p.m., and also the last weekend to visit the various Christmas marts in town. To get that Christmas spirit, you might want to promenade down Kurfürstendamm at nights. Thousands of lightbulbs illuminate the scene and 15 decorated Christmas trees are set up between Joachimstaler Strasse and Adenauerplatz.

In Neukölln, lamp posts on a 1.9-kilometer stretch down Karl-Marx-Strasse are decorated with angels, nutcrackers, Santa Claus and Saint Nicholas, illuminating the shopping area. On Müllerstrasse in Wedding, 14 Christmas trees have been decorated with light chains.

## Your hospital informs

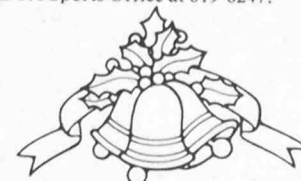

## USAB teams win against Pinder
