

# Police teamwork: focus on drugs

Since late last year, camera surveillance by local Berlin Resident Agency CID, the Drug Suppression Team (DST) and the West Berlin Criminal Police, reveal Adenauerplatz as a transfer point for drugs. There have been arrests of several German

and third country nationals for drug trading in that area. These operations are part of a new-wide and continuous drug enforcement strategy. Operations of this nature will continue at Adenauerplatz and other locations in the city. U.S. Forces members should

be aware that association with known drug offenders, or observation at known drug transfer points can lead to on-the-spot searches and possible arrests.

Incidents of suspected or actual drug involvement on the part of U.S. Forces

members can ruin your family life and career. Avoid such involvement and stay out of trouble.

#### Auto care saves grief

During calendar year 1981 there were 32 responses to calls for assistance by allied travellers on the East German Autobahn and in East Berlin. Eighteen (56%) were from U.S. travellers. Nine of the 18 were a direct result of operator failure to perform periodic maintenance (i.e. frayed fan belts, improper coolant level, low battery water level, lack of fuel). In 1982, there have already been seven responses. Four of these have been for U.S. travellers. Save yourself some grief — check your car before you travel.

#### Regs. prohibit sales

Sale of cosmetics and household plastic by active duty military or family members in government quarters serving as agents for such companies, is prohibited by USAREUR Regulation 210-70. Family members of U.S. Forces personnel may solicit for various companies by appointment.

USAREUR-registered vehicles, tax free gasoline, the Army post office system and duty free customs privileges may not be used for such activities. Family members engaged in such activities must comply with local work permit, tax and custom laws.

## 3rd Battalion takes new SQT

If you're an administrative specialist, a unit supply specialist or in a job related to these fields, listen up.

The Department of the Army has developed a special Skill Qualification Test for soldiers holding one of these jobs. It's called a Common Task SQT.

It's name describes it pretty well. The SQT tests a variety of basic skills. Like other SQT's it has both hands-on and written portions.

#### Hands-on

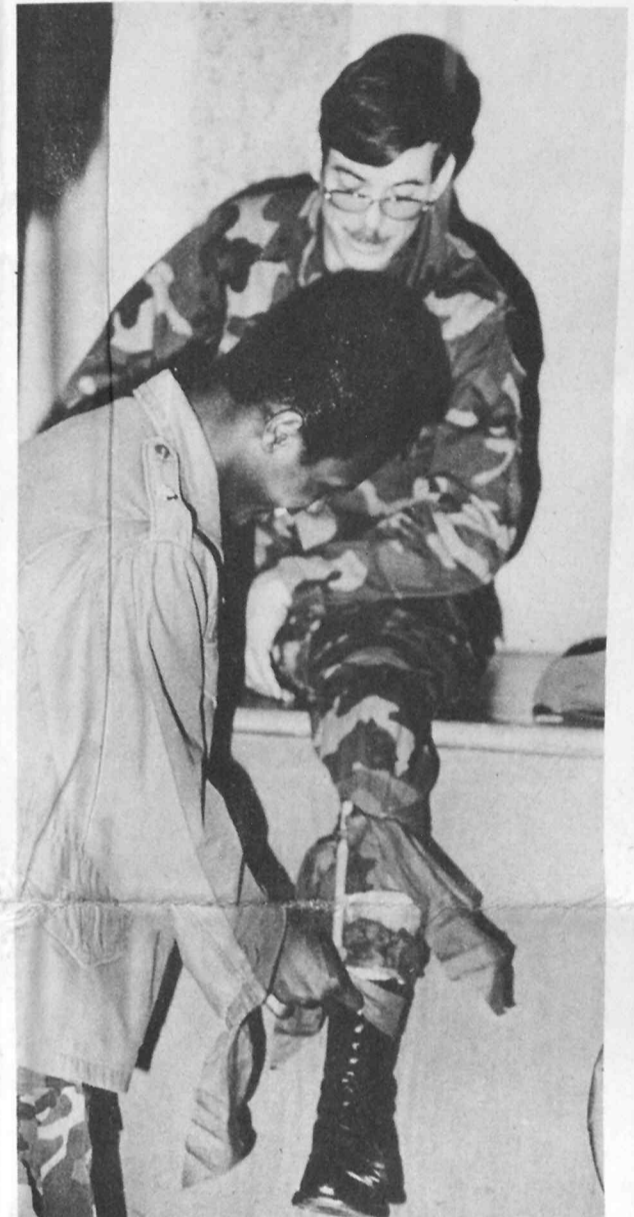
The hands-on component will consist of six tasks: cardio-pulmonary resuscitation, splinting, determining magnetic azimuth, donning protective masks, applying a tourniquet, and radio operating and calling procedures.

The written portion of the test contains questions about other common knowledge soldier tasks, such as camouflaging equipment, identifying terrain features on a map, and detecting a blood agent.

#### Battalion trains

3rd Battalion soldiers began training for this SQT on Monday morning.

The six hands-on stations were set up at the McNair Coliseum theatre. After a brief introduction, to the test, soldiers began practicing. There was an evaluator at each station to explain the correct procedures for completing the task and to point out any minor, but important steps that could lead to 'no-go's if they were forgotten. He also watches and told him if his procedures were correct. If they were not, he redid the task until he could do it correctly.

Besides the training class offered by 3rd Battalion, other soldiers are taking measures to make sure they pass.

"I've studied a lot," said Sp4 Tanya Jones, Headquarters Company Berlin Brigade unit supply clerk. "I don't exactly know what's going to be on the test, but anything that I study will be helpful. I'll be prepared for my SQT."

**WHEREAS**, the foundation of America's greatness is the strength of its families; and


**WHEREAS**, the family is established on the marriage relationship between father and mother; and

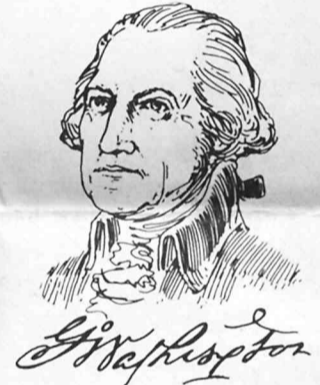
The soldiers, on a wall patrol detail,

Be prepared to find slick driving conditions and maintain a safe interval when driving.



## Crime prevention tips just for you

### A loss to you is a Profit for a Thief:

The Berlin Provost Marshal wants you to safeguard your property from theft. Crime prevention is important and you can help yourself and your community by taking the time to again evaluate your security awareness of conditions that may invite potential criminal activity. The following information may be helpful in your reevaluation:

### Security of Property:

Property left unattended and unsecured is a prime target for the thief, whether at your residence, in your vehicle, or while shopping.

### Marking of Property:

Utilize an electrostatic engraving tool to etch your social security number on high value items as a means of positive identification and an aid in recovery by military police. Maintain a list of these high value items by make, model number, serial number or *social security number*, approximate cost, and date of purchase.

### Reporting Crimes or Suspicious Activity:

Report criminal activity or any

suspicious activity to the Military Police Desk Sergeant at 819-3512. For emergencies, call 819-98, Crime Stop Line. These telephones are monitored 24 hours a day. Fire Dept. Ambulance, and Military Police can be notified of any serious situations by calling "98".

### Quarters Check:

Notify the Military Police Desk Sergeant 24 hours prior to departing your quarters for any extended period of time. MP patrols will make frequent checks of your quarters during your absence.

### Vehicle Security:

When leaving your vehicle, insure it is locked and the windows are fully rolled up. Never leave packages or other valuables in plain view — lock them in the trunk!

### Storage Areas:

Check storage areas frequently to insure that your property is secure and that locks are operative and have not been tampered with.

The utilization of these measures during the entire year will help to reduce loss of property and make your community a safe place to live.

# Maintenance keeps them rolling

Maintenance may well be the single most important aspect of combat effectiveness. This may seem to be a strong statement, but statistics show that a fighting force with a low maintenance recoverability has a hard time advancing or moving against the enemy.

Maintenance is the responsibility of every soldier that operates a vehicle. The responsibility extends to the men who turn the wrenches, build the parts and supply the support of the vehicle's operators. In Berlin two of these men are SFC Benno Friedeck and SSgt. Fredrick Smith, of the maintenance division.

These men are responsible for inspecting each of Berlin's units prior to their departure for one of the Major Training Areas (MTA's) in West Germany. Every vehicle leaving the city is put through a long and tedious inspection that helps the commander of the departing unit to determine what needs to be done to his vehicles to put them at their very best before the machine is loaded on the train or traverses the autobahn.

"Some of the soldiers that operate the vehicles being inspected think of us as mean, rotten NCO's that have nothing better to do than harass vehicle drivers and crewmen," said Smith. "But most of them realize the im-

portance of keeping these vehicles in the best possible condition. The Berlin Brigade has a reputation to live up to," he added.

Conducting pre-MTA inspections isn't the only thing the men from the maintenance division have to do to keep them busy. Road side checks, which are conducted year-round, fill up any breaks in their schedule.

In the road-side checks, tactical vehicles are pulled off the road at random and given a brief inspection of the safety features and lights. Drivers are also inspected, by being asked questions pertaining to the safe and efficient operation of their vehicle. The driver's Vehicle Operators License and dispatch are also inspected to insure that the operator has passed a road test for that particular vehicle, and to insure that if there are any restrictions on the license, such as the wearing of glasses, they are being observed.

"We aren't just a couple of guys out to burn everyone we can," Friedeck explained. "We are really concerned for the safety of these soldiers as well as the people that they have to share the road with."

So, as the men of the Berlin Brigade take to the streets in their vehicles, the rest of us can rest a little easier knowing that the maintenance division are doing their part to keep roadways a safer place to be.

SFC Jerry Tavares, first sergeant of Co A, 4th Battalion, was the first NCO in the Berlin Brigade to attend the new first sergeants' course at Fort Bliss, TX.

Tavares and 16 other senior non-commissioned officers from Europe were part of the first class to graduate from this eight-week course.

From October until December of last year, Tavares was gaining administrative insight into the wide-ranging responsibilities of being a first sergeant.

The course included instruction on everything from individual soldier counseling and group briefings to the Manual For Courts-Martial.

"I believe that this particular course will be a prerequisite for attendance at the Sergeants Major Academy in the future," stated Tavares. "Everything a first sergeant should know was covered there."

The facilitators of the course were all promotable E-8s. The students were

E-8s preparing to take jobs as first sergeants, E-7s on the promotion list, or E-7s who have held the first sergeant position for less than 90 days.

Tavares, a promotable E-7 and 18 year Army veteran, has been first sergeant of Co A, 4th Battalion since July of 1980. He was selected to attend this course because of his abilities to perform in this capacity.

During his tour as first sergeant, Company A has won three "Company of the Quarter" awards, including last quarter's.

Tavares' last duty assignment was as a senior drill sergeant with the 10th Battalion, 2nd Training Brigade where he molded new soldiers to meet the rigid standards of today's Army.

As an advocate of a good physical fitness program, Tavares participates in sports during much of his free time.

Tavares, a family man, and his wife Celene are the proud parents of five children ranging in ages from three to 16 years.

# Don't let stage fright keep you from theater

Your problem is simple. You want to be on stage but you suffer from stage fright merely at the thought of an audience.

The solution is equally simple. The MSAD Theater Center will welcome you as part of its backstage production crew, enabling you to indulge your taste for theater in and out-of-the-spotlight activity. You can put your talents to work in lighting, make-up, set construction, and other theatrical specialties.

The Theater Center is well-designed for this work. It has a staff of experts and a broad range of tools, material, and technical equipment.

Backstage activity in which you can get involved includes many artistic tasks. You can paint background sets from landscapes to apartment walls or construct props by fashioning various material into Roman columns, African masks, or other items crucial to the atmosphere and setting of a play.

A second area for artistic involvement is lighting. This aspect of a play is vital to the proper emphasis of scenes, characters, and lines. Theater lights include more than the obvious roving spotlights: far more important than these giants are the scores of other lights that set the atmosphere of the play. You can help the play's director in communicating his ideas when you work on the production's lighting. Hanging individual lights, adjusting the angle of their beams, and controlling them from the lighting booth are critical elements of the mood and message of the show.

Make-up is a third area of backstage theatrical work. You may already know enough to start making up actors

and actresses in theatrical guise, aging them, highlighting their special characteristics or styling their hair. Even if you have no experience in make-up, the Theater Center will train you to develop your talents.

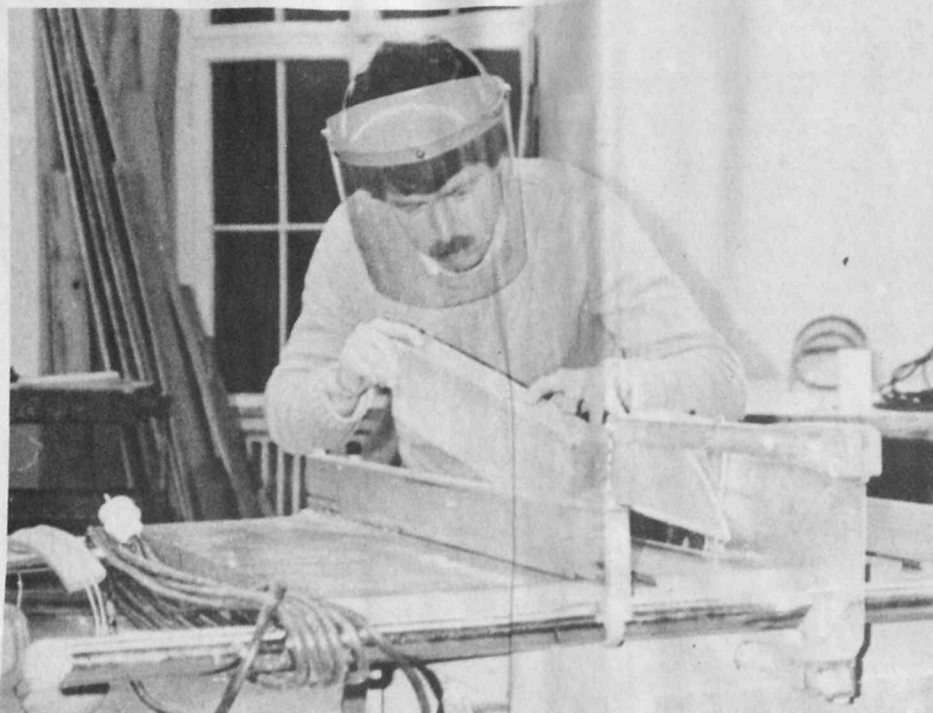
A fourth type of backstage work is stage managing. In this job, you familiarize yourself with the action and plot of the play and use this knowledge to see that all the actors and actresses appear on stage at the proper time during the performance. This, quite obviously, makes you a vital part of the show.

All these activities, from make-up to lighting, require you to gain a thorough knowledge of the play. In many respects, the director's responsibilities are even more demanding. Should you decide to direct a play, you will have to ascertain the intentions of the author (obscure though they may be) and then add your own concept of the script to the author's ideas.

With this mixture, you will have the chance to demonstrate your diplomatic and teaching skills in directing the cast who play the parts in the production. And this is only the beginning. The Theater Center will tell you more about the director's function and the long preparation it demands.

Periodic workshops in theatrical skills, from directing and lighting to make-up and acting, take place at the Theater Center under expert instruction from experienced professionals.

Take a look at the world of theater in Shakespeare's romantic comedy "Measure for Measure" (starting Feb. 19) and call the Theater Center at 3550 to find out how to express yourself backstage.

## Transformers may cause damage

Whether you live in the barracks, government housing or have economy quarters, chances are you own a transformer.

AAFES-Europe's quality assurance experts warn that improper transformer use can cause damage often expensive to repair. During 1981 AAFES fixed over 60 TVs which were damaged by improperly used transformers.

According to an AAFES-Europe quality assurance spokesman, leaving appliances plugged into a transformer and disconnecting the transformer by pulling the wall plug or using a wall

plug switch to stop the flow of electricity is where damage occurs. Damage is usually caused by the initial surge of stored power from the transformer. The safe way to use a transformer is to make sure that nothing is connected to it before turning it on. To protect stereos, TVs, irons, radios, toasters and other appliances, unplug them from the transformer, plug in the transformer and then plug the appliance into the transformer.

The AAFES spokesman also cautioned that damage caused by improper transformer use is usually not covered by warranties. (AAFES)

## BDU field jacket — not for soldiers

Beware of the unauthorized BDU field jacket.

USAREUR officials are warning service members not to buy the "new battledress uniform field jacket" advertised by commercial sources. The field jacket is not authorized for wear.

Some commercial firms have marketed a field jacket intended to match in design the BDU now authorized for wear by U.S. Army

soldiers. The jacket even bears a U.S. Government contract label and national stock number. But officials say no such contract has been granted by the U.S. Government.

An authorized BDU field jacket may be available to soldiers sometime in October or November this year. But for now, the officials caution, don't buy or wear what is currently on the market. (EURNEWS)
