Internal theft problem for everyone

The Department of the Army has designated September as Internal Theft Prevention month.

Internal theft is one type of crime which many commanders would prefer to believe does not exist. However, an analysis of thefts of government property cases on file at the Army Crime Records Center indicate that from one third to one half of all government property thefts are perpetrated by individuals assigned to the victimized organization.

Larceny of Non Appropriated Fund property was the most common theft which occurred in the Berlin Command.

There are two distinct types of internal theft:

- Petty theft by workers. About half of the internal theft cases involve personnel in the grades of E1 to E4 and GS1 to GS5 who take small amounts of tools or supplies for their own use. This is probably because junior workers are not normally in a position to manipulate accountability procedures to cover up large losses of material.
- Large scale thefts by supervisors. Most of the large scale internal thefts perpetrated against the Army are committed by first line supervisors in the grades of E-5 to E-7 and GS-6 to GS-9. Unlike junior

workers, supervisors are in a position to manipulate the accountability system to allow large diversions of material.

The work environment is a major factor effecting an employee's decision to steal, and 'informal rules' among workers regulates the amount of internal theft. If accountability procedures are not enforced, and low work standards are accepted, then dishonest employees will take advantage of the situation and steal; and honest workers will be discouraged from reporting suspicious activity.

If high standards are demanded, few thefts occur. Mobilizing peer pressure to discourage thefts by workers is a good method of preventing theft. The attitude of fellow workers as to what is acceptable behavior to a large extent controls the amount of theft in an organization.

The organizations most victimized by internal theft are:


- Motor pool/maintenance facilities
- Wholesale supply activities
- Mess halls
- Troop units (not including mess halls or supply rooms)
- Hospitals/clinics (not including drug thefts)
- Administrative organizations
- Retail supply activities (unit supply rooms, SSSC, etc.)

The most common items stolen were:

- Tools required to perform mission
 - Consumable supplies
 - Audio-visual or office equipment
- Dollar value of losses:
- Approximately 50% of the cases

were less than \$500.

- Twenty percent were between \$500 and \$1,000.
 - Thirty percent were over \$1,000.
- Effective internal control is our first line of defense against internal thefts.



Reader questions ID for entry to Clay Headquarters

Dear Editor,

I am a contractor with Sperry Corp. working here in Berlin. I am currently required to maintain Sperry equipment in various buildings of Clay Headquarters.

Since I am a contractor and not a DOD civilian, I am issued a USAREUR Privilege and Identification Card, Form 174. Since the Army sees fit to issue a card of this type (the Air Force issues Family Member ID cards to contractors), I am puzzled at the way I am treated when I use it for entry to the various compounds in Berlin.

I have no complaint as far as entry to the exchange and the like. My complaint is with the requirements for entry to the Clay Headquarters Compound.

I am required to get an installation pass and use it in conjunction with my U.S. passport. Why can a U.S. or non U.S. family member walk into and out of the compound with only their Family Members ID Card and I and the other people with a USAREUR Privilege Card are required to go through the hassle of carrying our passports around with us.

I can get into Andrews, McNair and the Consulate without any problems, yet to go into the Clay Compound, I am required to carry the extra ID and pass.

I want to mention that I am a U.S. citizen with a current security clearance. I realize the need for increased security at headquarters, but the inequities that allow

people with no need to generally enter the compound to have such easy access, while the people like myself, who have a daily need for entry, must be subjected to the hassle of carrying passports and installation passes all the time, creates a situation that is hard to tolerate.

Headquarters Commandant answers

The AE Form 174 (Privileges and Identification Card) is not an accepted form of identification for Clay Headquarters.

The AE 174 is primarily meant to show that a person, U.S. citizen or otherwise, is authorized specific types of logistical support within a military community.

Each card is annotated with the specific type of authorized support and is primarily intended for use in AAFES installations (none of which are located on LDC HQ), not military compounds.

The reason you are required to carry your passport for entry to Clay HQ is, if a person, U.S. civilian or Local National, does not meet the criteria to be issued an accepted form of picture identity card, an installation pass (AE Form 178) is the only other means that he or she may enter a U.S. military installation without having to sign into the compound.

Each installation pass must have verifying documentation with it to prove the identity of that person, i.e. passport or Ausweis, that has been issued by a recognized government agency.

In response to your question about family member ID card holders, the DD Form 1173 is by DOD, DA, and local regulations an accepted identification card.

For U.S. Army Commands where family members or civilians are command-sponsored, covered by the Status of Forces Agreement (SOFA), or directly associated with the Armed Forces, this card has been deemed sufficient and valid proof of identification and authorizes entry to U.S. military compounds.

If at any time you feel that you have received undue attention or harassment while entering Clay Headquarters by either the Guard Battalion personnel or U.S. Guards, please bring it to the attention of the Headquarters Commandant Division, and we will take the appropriate measures to insure that professional and courteous security is maintained.


Limit enforced

Squad and platoon level

3rd Bn. trains on basics

In full field gear, carrying their weapons, the squad of SSgt. Edward Gauler moved tactically onto Range 12, after completing a grueling 12-kilometer road march.

Once in the foxholes, the soldiers listened for the commands of their squad leader, with their loaded weapons waiting for the call to fire.

Gauler and his squad are members of the 3rd Battalion, who along with the rest of the battalion, are training in the Wildflecken, West Germany training area. The Berlin-based unit has been in the "zone" since Aug. 26. The line soldiers have set up their tents in one of the many bivouac sites located on the post, battling weather that shifts from warm and dusty to drizzling and cold from one day to the next.

The battalion is spending its time in the training area concentrating on the basics — squad and platoon level training, according to a battalion spokesman. Which is exactly what Gauler and his men, 3rd squad, 3rd platoon of Company B, were doing. The squad level training ended earlier this week with the platoon level exercises scheduled to begin today.

"The squad force-march, live-fire is a test of marksmanship and endurance," said Gauler. He explained the squad was expected to march the 12-kilometers at a fast pace and then be prepared to engage targets upon arrival at the range. Gauler added that teamwork and communication were important aspects of the training.

According to 1st Sgt. John E. Lee, Company B first sergeant, the force-march, live-fire is a training highlight. "It's not a test as much as an end result of training." Lee says the exercise focuses on the mental and physical toughness as well as other infantry skills of the squad members. "The final result (of this type training) is pride and cohesion," stated Lee.

In addition to squad level training, some soldiers were on the ranges qualify-

ing with the .50-caliber machine gun. Explained Sp4 John Miller, "The .50-caliber is such a high-velocity, long-range weapon, that it doesn't make sense to set the target up any farther down-range than 10 meters (to zero)."

After zeroing the guns, the firers had eight shot groups to go through before moving from the 10-meter range over to the bunker, where they fired at targets much farther down range. "Finding the right position is the hardest part of firing the .50-caliber," remarked Sgt. Cesar Ricio.

For TOW and Dragon fires, Wildflecken offered a rare opportunity for those who qualified. In both cases, a competition was held on simulators to determine the best gunners in the battalion. Those selected were honored by firing the weapons with live ammunition, an opportunity not available in Berlin.

The Dragon firers were taken through the steps by SSgt. William Wolfe, a qualified Dragon instructor and a squad leader in Company A. According to Wolfe, firing the missile amounts to eye coordination on the target. "You have to keep the crosshairs on the target, which is a hard thing to do," remarked Wolfe. The missile, which is wire-guided, can get back on target even in a strong wind if the crosshairs are on the target, added Wolfe.

For SSgt. Gilbert Guzman, Combat Support Company, who has fired the weapon before, the thrill of firing a live round is watching it hit the target. SSgt. Rudolph C. Lane, also of CSC, was a first time firer. Lane fired in the conventional unsupported position and felt it was the easiest way to fire the missile. "I wasn't quite sure, what was going to happen," he said. "I've heard people talk about the blast and heat, so I wasn't sure what to expect.

"All I did was keep the crosshairs on the target and when I saw the blast in the silhouette, I knew I'd hit." Sp4 Robert Miller, Alpha Company, felt firing his first live round was a great experience. And Sp4 Richard Luzietti, another first-timer, admitted to being a little scared,

but said it felt great to actually fire it.

On the TOW range, Sp4 Don Taylor, CSC, was much more stoic. Taylor, who had only fired the TOW loaded with an inert round, had an opportunity to fire a live round last year but gave it to a fellow soldier who had never fired before. This field exercise he had the opportunity again and took it. Taylor claimed there was no big thrill involved, saying, "It's no different (than the simulator)."

At the squad level, the training culminated this Labor Day weekend with the Squad Assault Course. Explained SSgt. Richard Smith, 1st squad leader, 3rd platoon, Bravo Company, "This course is a big challenge for a squad leader. He has to deploy his people and they have to be paying attention to his commands. The squad leader has to be thinking of how best to utilize his squad."

The assault course is 800 meters by 200 meters and is used for fire and maneuver exercises. All 3rd Battalion squads are being evaluated on how well they move through the course, which has dense foliage and open fields, and how well they engage the preset targets, to decide the best squad.

According to Smith, some of the decisions a squad leader must make while going through the course are where to put the machine gun (for maximum utilization of its suppressive fire) and how to have B Team move forward while A Team provides cover and vice versa. "You have to build trust," says Smith. "They have to have trust in me and I have to have trust in them so we can get the job done."

While in Wildflecken, 3rd Battalion soldiers have been training in conventional as well as MOUT (Military Operations on Urbanized Terrain) — type skills. Explained Lt. Col. Linwood Burney, battalion commander, the MOUT related training is training to mission, being able to defend Berlin. The conventional training, though, builds up teamwork and communication skills, he says, skills that are transferable to any type combat situation.







Festwochen


The "33. Berliner Festwochen '83" offer the following concerts at the Philharmonie this week: Tonight,

The 10,000 meter United States Army Berlin Cross Country Championship has been scheduled for Oct. 3, at 2 p.m., said Morale Support Activities Division sports director Don DeHaney.

The top individual finishers, in order, will be selected to represent Berlin in the 1983 United States Army Europe Cross Country Championship in Chiemeese, Oct. 30. The exact number allowed will be announced by USAREUR Sports Office at a later date.

Registration for the run will take place at noon the day of the race at the Sports Center Gym along with a team managers meeting. Team rosters will be presented and team numbers will be assigned at this meeting.

New dress standards start soon

Starting Sept. 15, a new set of personal appearance standards for military personnel, civilian employees and family members will take effect.

As explained in the cover letter to the guidelines, personal appearance while both on and off duty is important. "As members of the United States military, service personnel are representatives of both the U.S. government and American society. This is equally true of U.S. Forces family members and civilian employees.

It must be emphasized that the impressions and attitudes of many non-Americans toward the United States are shaped to a large extent by their contact with American military personnel, civilian employees and their family members. It is of particular importance that a favorable impression be conveyed by the United States military and those associated with it."

The dress code that follows is established as a guide and is not all inclusive.

Military Personnel

It is the duty of each service member to take pride in his or her appearance at all times. Military personnel are required to comply with the grooming and dress standards that are specified in the appropriate service regulations (AR 670-1; USAREUR Suppl I to AR 670-1; AFR 35-10; and AFR 30-1).

Grooming—Specifically, military members will maintain proper haircut and grooming standards while present in Berlin. This applies whether they are on or off duty, or on leave, pass, or break.

Wear of the Uniform—All military personnel on duty will be in proper

uniform. Uniform items will not be worn with civilian clothing except those prescribed in AR 670-1. Fatigues and BDUs will not be worn in the German community other than traveling to and from work and in the performance of duty.

Wear of Civilian Clothing—Unit commanders may deny this privilege to military personnel whose conduct is prejudicial to military discipline and order. When wearing civilian clothing, military personnel will be appropriately attired for the occasion and will maintain a standard of dress indicating good taste and decorum befitting U.S. representatives in a foreign country. Specifically, the following are prohibited to be worn by military personnel at any time.

- Clothing that displays obscene, profane or lewd words or drawings.
- Clothing or jewelry advocating the use of cannabis or other illegal drugs.
- Clothing items showing language or symbols that encourage participation in or further the aims of any organization, movement or group that unlawfully advocates or practices acts of force or violence to prevent others from exercising their rights under the laws of the United States or any State, or that seeks to overthrow the government of the United States, or its subdivision by unlawful means.

Civilian Employees and Family Members

The prohibited civilian clothing described for military personnel above is also prohibited from being worn in public by civilian employees or family members in any U.S. military installation or facility in Berlin.

Dress Standards for Admittance to All Military Installations and Facilities

In addition to the standards listed, the following standards apply to all persons. Failure to adhere to these standards will result in denial to enter an installation and/or facility and may result in suspension or revocation of the privilege to use facilities.

Unsanitary Dress—This is defined as bare feet or excessively dirty clothing.

Suggestive or Revealing Clothing—This is clothing which fails to cover the private areas of the body. All personnel

should dress in a manner that is not offensive to others and that is wholesome, in good taste, and suitable for public view.

Improper or Inappropriate Attire—Though some attire may be appropriate for the gymnasium, swimming pool, or other particular places, it may not be appropriate for wear before the general public in other facilities. Examples are bikini tops, swim suits, short shorts, uncovered hair curlers, gym or jogging shorts (however, gym or jogging shorts may be worn into snack bars following an athletic event or workout), and males wearing shirts which fail to cover the armpit area (e.g., tank tops and muscle shirts)."
