Alternatives available to drug, alcohol abusers.

The stories are told in every generation.

Baseball fans chuckle when they recall the exploits of Ol' Alex or Babe or Mickey, staggering onto the playing field so drunk they could hardly see the ball—then striking out the side or walloping a 500 foot home run.

You can count on it, though—if you stagger into your civil service job so drunk you can't make out the letters on the keys of your typewriter, no one will be laughing. And if it becomes a habit, your job may soon belong to someone else.

But help is available. The same type of professional counseling soldiers receive

who are drug or alcohol abusers is also offered to civilians eligible for military health benefits. And, for Department of the Army civilians, as for servicemembers, it may be mandatory.

According to Craig G. Eifert, AD-APCP civilian coordinator, a supervisor may direct an employee to go to Eifert for a screening interview, if the supervisor has noted a declining job performance he suspects is drug or alcohol related.

But Eifert said those who feel they have an abuse problem should not hesitate to see him before they are referred by their supervisor. "Often, by the time the abuse has come to the attention of the supervisor, the individual is in deep trouble already, and many adverse actions have

42nd supports ARTEP

"Mission accomplished" were the words of SFC Robert Brocious, platoon sergeant of 42nd Engineer's Company's 1st Platoon, after successfully leading his platoon and soldiers of 2nd Platoon in a combined arms counterassault as members of the reserve forces during last week's 5th Battalion, 502nd Infantry ARTEP.

The 42nd Engineers were fulfilling one of their primary missions by participating in the 5th Battalion ARTEP: the mission of supporting the Berlin Brigade infantry battalions. They lived up to their engineer motto, "Essayons," which, translated from the French, means "let us try," and the Combat Support Battalion motto, "Serves the Select."

In the past, only one engineer platoon was called upon to support infantry battalion ARTEPs. This time a majority of the 42nd's assets were involved. According to Capt. Paul Harwig, the 42nd Engineer's company commander, "Nearly every section took part in making the ARTEP a successful one, including all three line platoons, headquarters platoon, and the maintenance and heavy equipment sections."

Before the ARTEP began, key 42nd personnel attended briefings and planning sessions. These NCOs and officers identified roles and organized the effort.

"Heavy junk" operators and their earthmoving machines received a thorough workout as the heavy equipment section was used to prepare 5th Battalion defenses at Doughboy City. Their main

focus during that phase of the operation was construction of battle positions and emplacement of obstacles. One bulldozer supported Company A by digging a tank ditch and moving dirt to clear fields of fire.

Meanwhile, the capabilities of two engineer scoop loaders were welcomed by soldiers of Charlie Company. Vehicular barriers and tank traps were strategically placed by the loaders, which were teamed with dumptrucks to haul earth used to fill sandbags and construct bunkers. The engineer's backhoe was used to build fighting positions for Bravo Company's crew-served weapons. In the words of Maj. Bruce Boevers, 5th Battalion's S-3, "Those heavy equipment operators did an outstanding job. They saved our soldiers from a lot of backbreaking work and made the defenses more effective. Our soldiers were able to witness an excellent demonstration of antiarmor capabilities not seen before."

Engineer NCOs from third platoon provided expert instruction to infantry soldiers on such topics as minefields, road cratering, basic demolitions, booby traps, and wire obstacles. Two of the platoon's squads performed the role of enemy sappers during OPFOR assaults against 5th Battalion defenses. They executed obstacle recons, used scaling ladders and wire cutters to bypass obstacles, provided supporting weapons fire, and performed building assault and clearance operations. Again the bulldozer was called upon, this time by the attacking forces to clear assault routes through minefields and other obstacles.

already been initiated," Eifert said. "If the individual volunteers to go and gives me written permission to speak to his or her supervisor, adverse actions can be suspended in many cases for 90 days, based on successful completion of the program."

There are three rehabilitation programs, or "tracks" in ADAPCP. Track I is a basic alcohol and drug awareness class, Eifert said. Participants include first time offenders, and those accused of relatively minor offenses. Group members discuss the effects of drugs and alcohol on the body, view pertinent films, and look at alternatives to drug or alcohol abuse. The purpose of Track I, according to Eifert, is to "motivate

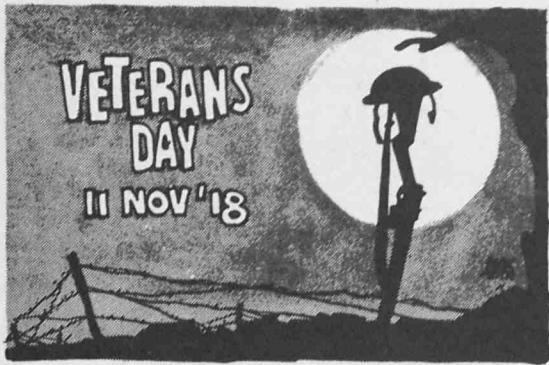
people to try a different lifestyle (that does not include drug or alcohol abuse)."

Track II is for those with more serious problems. Anyone caught driving while intoxicated lands automatically in Track II, where participants meet with counselors in small groups or one-on-one.

Track III is an in-patient program for those with very serious drug or alcohol dependency problems. The goal of the six-week program is total abstinence from the addicting substance, and return of the individual to the job.

Although no figures on the results of the tracks are available, they are a success a great majority of the time, according to Eifert and Flynn.

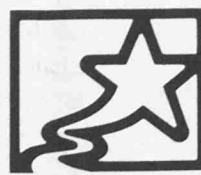

Cable system drops AFN

On Tuesday morning, the Landespostdirektion Berlin (LPD) will stop including AFN Berlin among the channels transmitted on its cable TV system here. Viewers who presently watch AFN via the LPD cable will no longer be able to do so.

The greatest impact will be in Park Manor. To ensure that Park Manor residents will continue to receive AFN, the Assistant Chief of Staff, Communications-Electronics, is making alternative arrangements.

At press time it appeared that AFN reception might be interrupted at Park Manor, for a few hours Tuesday morning. After that Park Manor residents will receive just AFN for a period of four-six weeks. Then residents will again receive all the channels on cable plus British Forces Broadcasting Service.

The continuation of AFN reception at Park Manor will apply only to US government-leased housing units there.

Viewers who presently watch AFN via the LPD cable, but who do not live in US government-leased or -controlled housing at Park Manor or elsewhere, will need antennas to receive AFN.

Banking news

The deadline for receipts of the complete scholarship and/or GSL application, with all required materials, at National Headquarters, AER, is **March 1, 1985**. An application for GSL loan **only** may be submitted after March 1 1985 on an exception basis. PLUS loan applications may be submitted at any time; however they should be received by June 1 to assure processing for the fall semester.

Pediatrician call-in service

If you have a question concerning your child's health and are unsure of where to turn, the Berlin Meddacc has an ideal service for you.

It's the pediatrician call-in, a telephone service which runs from 8 to 10 a.m. Monday through Friday at the U.S. Army Hospital, Berlin. In order to get answers to health questions, parents simply call 819-4127 or 4128 during these times. A staff pediatrician is always available to handle the calls.

The call-in service has been in place since August 1983. "It's purpose is to improve our services to the community by cutting down the time some parents have to spend in pediatrics," said Capt. Daryl Scurry, a staff pediatrician at the hospital. "Some medical questions can be answered over the phone without requiring a trip to the hospital."

INSCOM Award

For the second consecutive year, a member of Field Station Berlin was named worldwide Intelligence and Security Command Soldier of the Year. Sp4 Louise Montgomery of Company A, FSB, won the competition Monday at Arlington Station Hall, Va. She competed against two other soldiers, one representing CONUS, the other the Far East. Last year, Sgt. Richard Kenney, also of FSB, won the same award.

DEH emergency phone line

In an effort to improve the after duty hours emergency reporting procedures, DEH has acquired automatic telephone answering equipment. The answering devices will be attached to four telephones in the Telephone Reception area. This service went into effect Nov. 5.

The customers should dial 819-6666 during non-duty hours to report emergencies; the answering system asks for the customers name, address, phone number and the nature of the emergency. The call will automatically be put through to the Standby Operator and workmen will be sent out to perform the work only after the request is determined to be a valid emergency.

DEH requests that customers speak clearly and report only emergency situations. DEH defines a real emergency as a work requirement that cannot be deferred until the next working day because of danger to life and

health, or serious damage to government property. Real emergencies may include but not be limited to leaking gas, pipe breaks, total power failures, back up sewage lines, loss of heating or hot water, and incidents that may jeopardize security.

Lock-outs are not considered an emergency when a key can be obtained from another family member.

Washer and dryer repair must be reported at 6666 during duty hours.

There is no emergency service for refrigerators and freezers. Barracks personnel should call contract firm in case of refrigeration failures. Family Housing occupants may pick up a refrigerator from the DEH guard for temporary use.

Elevators will not be fixed during non-duty hours. The on-duty electrician will switch off the power and the contract firm will be sent out on the next working day.

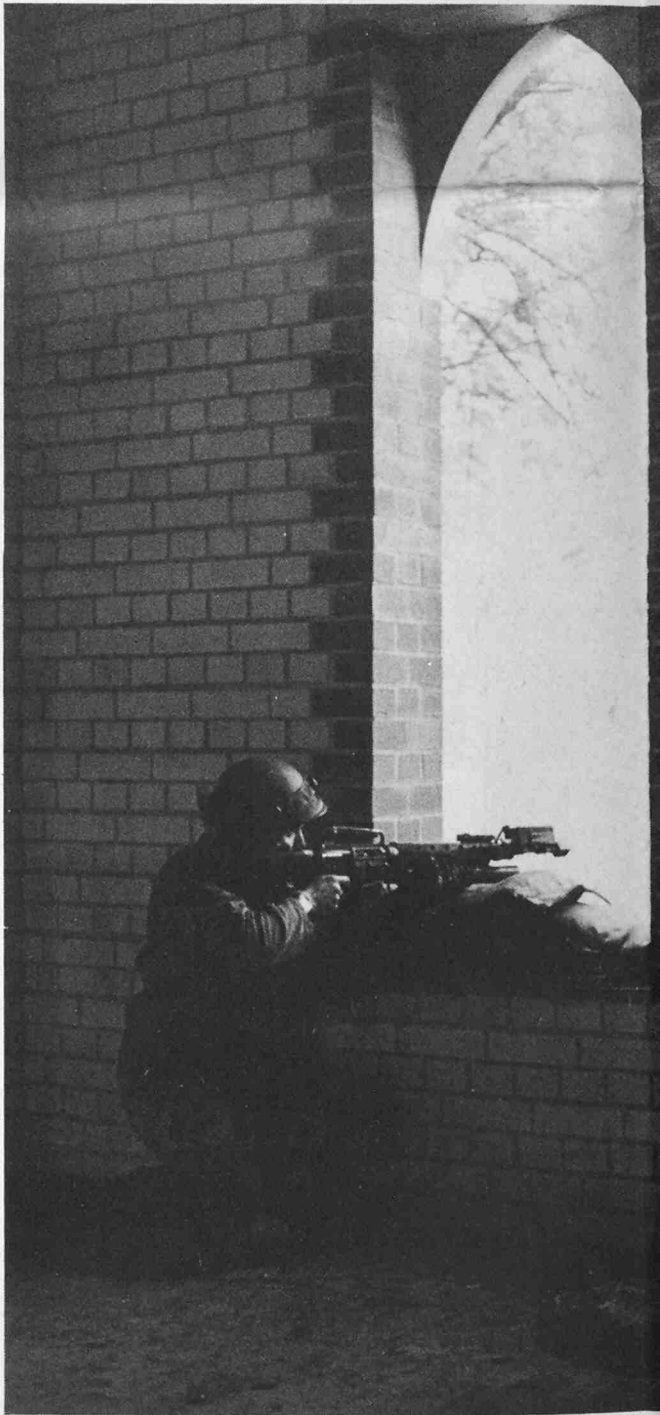

"On A Clear Day You Can See Forever" is an American Feature Film, presented in the original English version by

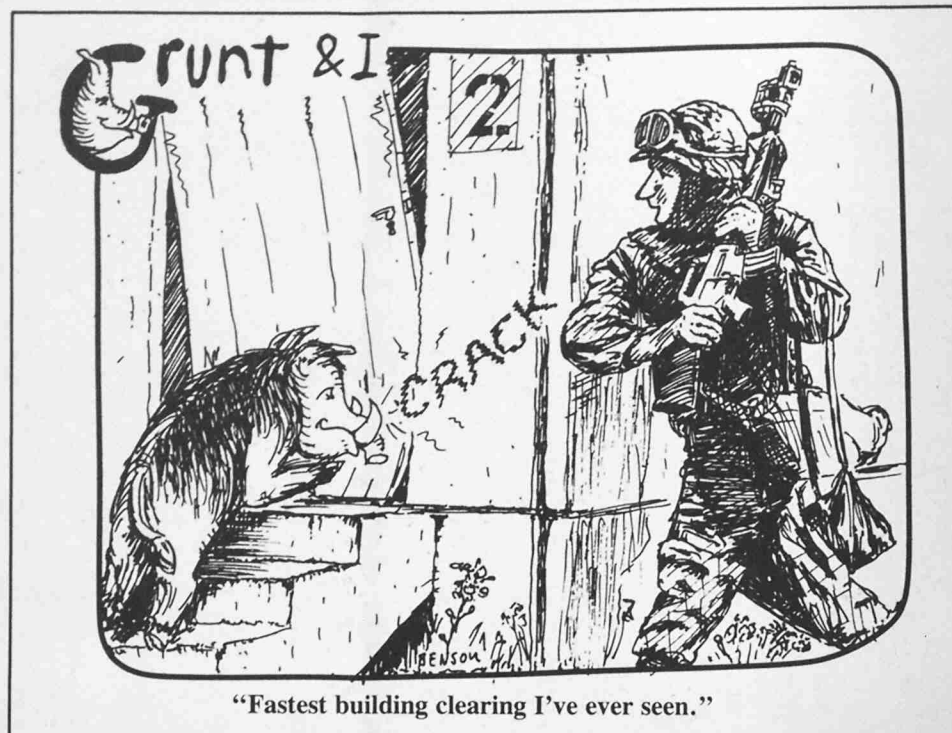

Double first place victories were brought home by Troy Johnson, Tanja Haber, Chris Minderman, Todd Walsh and Knut Asmis.

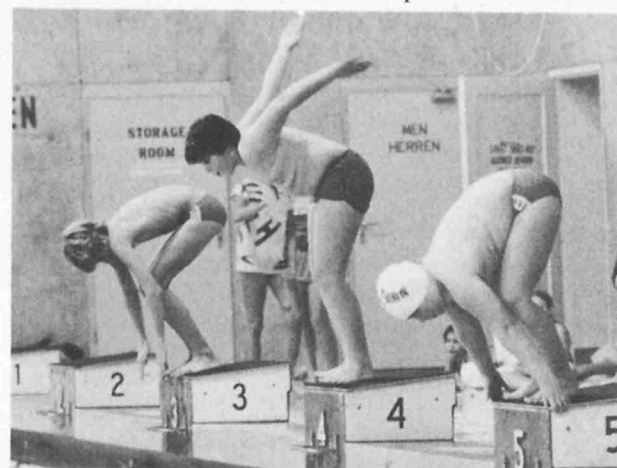

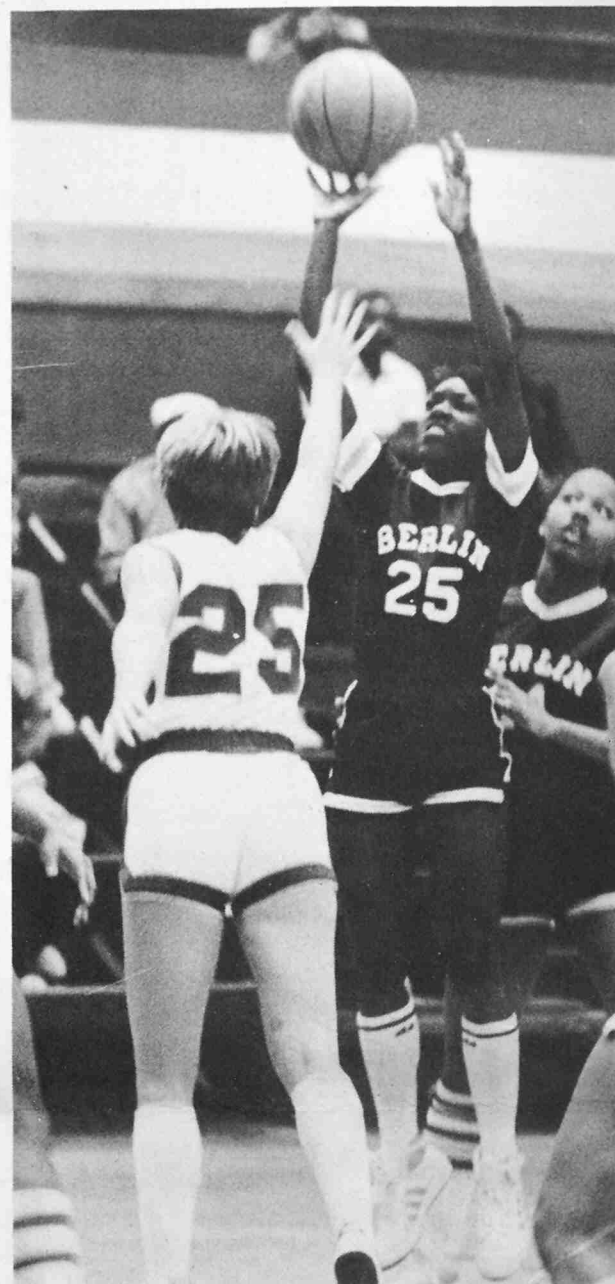

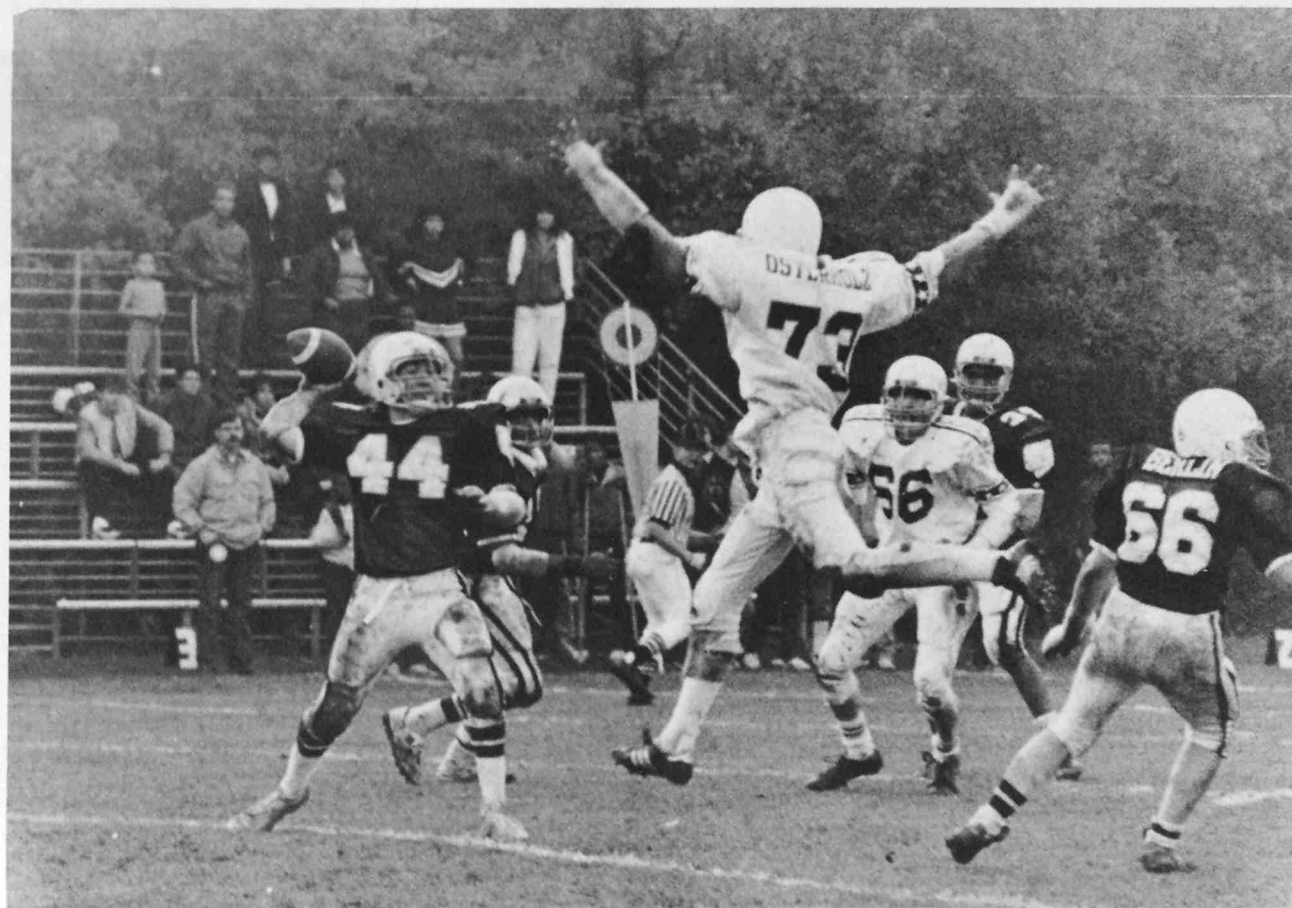
