

'84 AER campaign kicks off

The ultimate goal of the Army Emergency Relief (AER) is to take care of Army people. They have been taking care of their own since 1942 and this year is no different.

This year's campaign, which kicked off yesterday, is being headed by CSM Dennis D. Duncan, Berlin Brigade command sergeant major. Non-commissioned officers from each unit are being designated as AER project officers.

"Why should I want to donate my money to AER? What can it do for me?" These are commonly asked questions at donation time.

Financial problems can happen to any soldier. This makes AER's mission extremely important. An emergency can happen at home and if the soldier doesn't have the money to return home, then AER can help.

Other aid can come in terms of money for food or rent. AER will help with medical bills and personal needs when a soldier doesn't receive his paycheck or when it's lost.

In 1983, AER provided 62,189 Army people with

\$21,232,683 in aid for financial emergencies and educational aid.

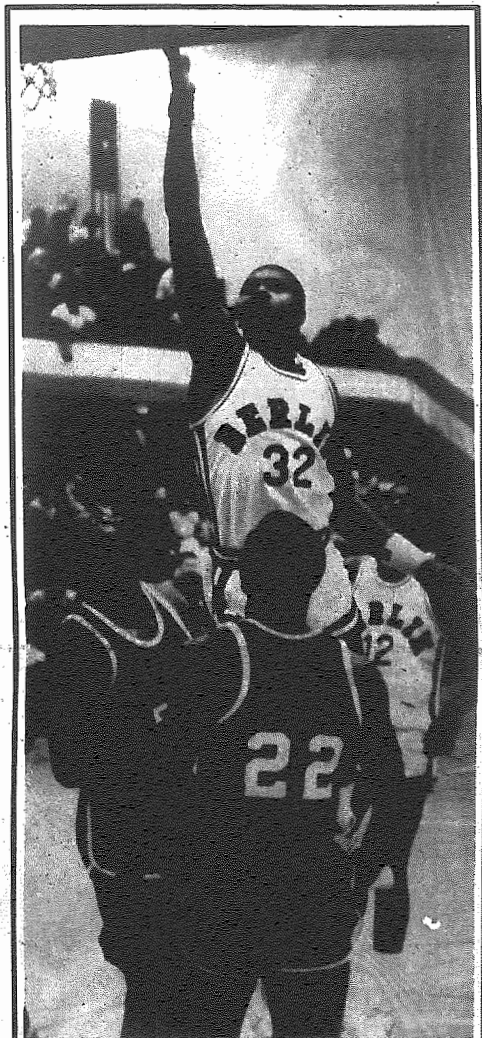
Last year the Berlin community contributed \$43,275 to help support AER, but \$56,532 in aid was provided to members of the Berlin command.

AER also helps dependent children afford college by providing educational scholarships. Spouses or orphans of deceased Army personnel who suffer an emergency may also benefit from AER. AER can also provide assistance to retired members of the Army.

The goal of this year's AER campaign is to raise \$40,000 within the Berlin community. Contributions are on a voluntary basis. Anyone may contribute, but only active duty personnel will be asked to donate. Contributions can be given by check, cash or an allotment.

Many soldiers say that contributing by starting an allotment is easier. It lessens the financial impact by spreading the donation over a period of 12 months.

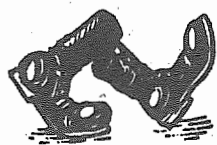

during "March Kessel." See next weeks Observer for more on this Allied FTX. (Photo by Roger Lund)



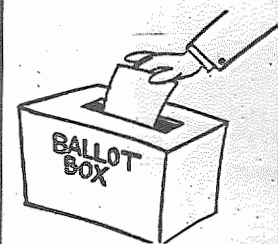

editorial

Some people wonder why we place so much emphasis on voting. Usually, those are the same people who complain about eroding benefits and how the military is not getting an even break.

But many will not bother to cast their ballot. They come up with excuses, it's too much trouble, it's a waste of time and effort, besides no matter who they vote for someone else always seems to be elected. Then there are those individuals who just don't care.

There are those individuals, however, who go to the polls and vote no matter what the issue. They could be voting for the candidate of their choice, for (or against) a public proposal, on a question of financial expenditure, a new town mayor, or something as simple as a new class president. These people feel it is their patriotic duty to vote.

Voting is a formal expression of opinion or choice made by an individual or group of people. It is believed by many scholars and historians that voting practices were first begun hundreds of years ago. Ancient Athens had a system of elections in which all male citizens could vote.

Voting has come a long way through the years, and with the changes which have occurred people might tend to think it would be an easy matter for everyone to vote. However, this is not true.

To start with, elections have always been limited to those who had the right to vote. During the 19th century, the

right to vote for popularly elected governmental institutions in some countries was limited by such things as sex, race, religion and age, as well as other factors.

You might think such things only happen in other countries, but even in the United States the right to vote was limited to white males who could meet

certain property qualifications. However, this was later changed to include most white adult male citizens, and in 1920 with the ratification of the 19th Amendment to the Constitution, women were given the right to vote.

Many blacks were effectively denied the right to vote until the Civil Rights Acts of the 1960s. Inequities such as this

took place within the United States despite the ratification in 1870 of the 15th Amendment which guaranteed the vote to all citizens, regardless of their race.

For most Americans, casting their ballots on election day simply means going to the local polls and voting. However, for those of us here, it's not so easy.

The absentee ballot is the only means available for us. The service member, family member and civilian must complete and mail a Federal Post Card Application to apply for an absentee ballot, wait for its receipt, mark the ballot and mail it back to the place where the person is registered.

With this being a presidential election year, we will once again see a campaign for voter registration and balloting. The unit voting officers have already received guidance on how to support the campaign and supplies of absentee-ballot forms are on hand.

Soldiers wanting to vote in the primaries left or general elections should contact their Unit Voting Assistance Officer for information on state absentee voting procedure and to obtain a Federal Post Card Registration and Absentee Ballot Request (standard Form 76). Voting officers will make cards available to family members upon request.

As one of the voting slogans says: Your vote is your voice — use it!

As of March 1, the Commissary started to automatically issue a Collection Action (Form 139) from a service member's pay on checks returned to them due to insufficient funds.

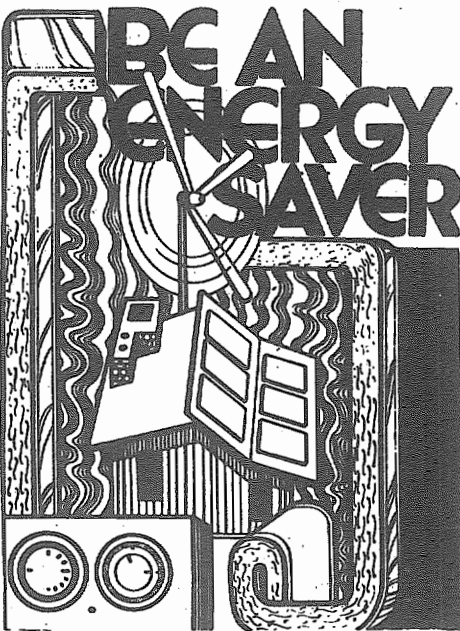
This action will be taken without prior notice being given to the service member by either the Commissary or finance.

St. Patrick: Ireland's saint wasn't Irish

Everyone with Irish ancestry, and some with none but who just love a holiday, will be wearing green Saturday evening celebrating one of Ireland's most loved saints, Patrick.

It is ironic that Patrick was chosen as Ireland's patron saint considering he wasn't Irish. In fact, Patrick was born in what is now Scotland near the end of the third century. His father was a magistrate in the Roman colony near the end of the River Clyde, not too far from Glasgow. His mother was a niece of St. Martin of Tours, though no one is sure whether he was raised as a Christian or not.

The young Patrick first saw Ireland as a slave. Pirates from the Emerald Isle invaded his home, captured the 16-year-old lad and sailed for Ireland. He was sold to a farmer in county Antrim, in Northern Ireland. Legend has it, he endured his six years of slavery by praying.

The story becomes very hazy at this point. Many historians disagree as to where Patrick fled upon his escape from slavery. In "The Flowering of Ireland," Katherine Scherman assumes Patrick sailed for the continent and by some means learned Latin, was ordained a priest and appointed bishop to Ireland.

Author Grace Humphrey, in "Stories of the World's Holidays," suggests that becoming a priest and returning to Ireland to spread Christianity to the largely barbaric Druids came to Patrick in a dream after his escape and safe arrival at his parents' home. Whichever story is correct, Patrick did become a priest and did return to Ireland as her bishop.

St. Patrick has been credited with bringing Christianity to Ireland and with it the teaching of Latin. But, in fact, there were at least four ordained priests in Southern Ireland spreading the word before Patrick's return.

He did go back to the northern counties of Ireland, to convert the Druids to Christianity and to set up some of Ireland's first schools. Until that time, Irish history and folklore had been passed down verbally from one generation to the next. Patrick taught them to record their stories, in Latin as well as their native Gaelic.

Patrick set up a home church near the ancient capital of Ireland, in county Armagh. But he spent little time

there, preferring to go from place to place spreading his message and setting up schools.

Patrick has also been credited with driving the snakes from Ireland. Before his birth and thanks to the Ice Age, snakes as well as other reptiles were driven south to the continent. Before the reptiles could return, the thaw covered Ireland's land bridges to England with water, leaving Ireland reptile-free.

For whatever reasons, real or imagined, Patrick was so beloved by the Irish that upon his death they decided to set aside a day to recall his memory. But even in this there was disagreement. Some insisted Patrick died on March 8 while others claimed it was March 9. They compromised by adding the days together and arrived at March 17, the day it is still celebrated.

It has become traditional to celebrate St. Patrick's Day with parades of Irishmen, wearing green and carrying shamrocks, marching down the streets. And, although not strictly traditional, those same Irishmen can usually be found later at their favorite pub enjoying their favorite beverage.

The Irish pubs in Berlin naturally are expecting some inspired partying tomorrow evening in honor of Ireland's patron saint. A partial list of entertainment you can expect, just to get you started:

● Celtic Cottage, 13 Markelstrasse off Schloss Strasse near Karstadt — the group Slainte will play beginning at 9:30 p.m.

● Go-In, 17 Bleibtreustrasse — entertainment provided by Christian Teschendorff, Irish Homicanes, Reinhard Siegel, Brigitte Rubach and Torsten starting at 9 p.m.

● Irish Harp, 15 Giesebrechtstrasse near U-Bahnhof Adenauer Platz — the group Anna Liffey plays beginning at 9 p.m.

● Irish Pub, in the Europacenter — the Wedding Skiffle Orchestra plays at 9 p.m.

● Harnack House — Original Irish music with the group Shanahan Irish Band from 7:30-11 p.m. in the Fiddler's Green.

● Starlight Grove — the Hi-Lite Recreation Center is sponsoring a "Leapin' Leprechauns" party with three country and western bands — Western Union, Stateline and Head Over Heels from 8 p.m. to 2 a.m. Admission is \$5 or DM 14.



'Here Comes Di-Di'

Premieres at Outpost

The Outpost Theater will be transformed this weekend from a movie house to a house of fun.

Well-known German comedian, Dieter Hallervorden, brings his wholesome, family-oriented brand of zany humor to the stage of the Outpost tonight, tomorrow and Sunday. Di-Di, as he is better known, has alternately been described as Germany's Red Skelton and Berlin's Three Stooges and Jerry Lewis rolled into one.

Here Comes Di-Di is the comedian's first show in English and will be presented each evening at 7:30 p.m.

Di-Di is most famous for his television series Non-stop Nonsense. But you may also have caught him in one of several movies. Most recently, he appeared in Der Doppelgänger or The Double, an entry in the Berlin Film Fest.

The idea for a show for the American community here came about as a result of his television show. Di-Di had an opportunity to show videos of his program to some Americans who suggested he try a show in Las Vegas. The show that will be presented at the Outpost is the same show he will take to Las Vegas in May.

The road to Vegas has been a long one for the comedian, who physically

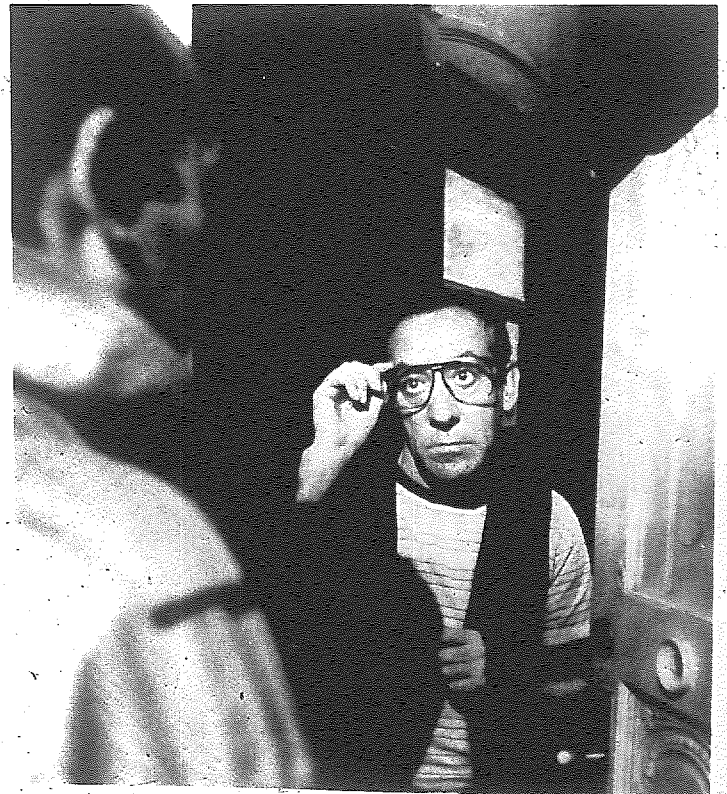
resembles Marty Feldman without the wild eyes. He began his career as a political satirist. In 1974, after 15 years as a satirist, he started his television show which he describes as a blend of slapstick, short sketches and song.

In an interview with AFN's Rebecca Easley, Di-Di admitted he has had a few problems translating his humor into American idioms. He said he has trouble understanding American slang but he has been working with Americans and has the words and phrases memorized. "I hope to understand them better," stated Hallervorden adding it would help him create new English language routines.

For Di-Di, performing in Las Vegas is a challenge. "If I am successful, it will be the first time for a non-English speaking comedian. That's a challenge," said Hallervorden, adding it is one he welcomes.

He credits originality with his current success. "It's the basic requirement of any creative art," he insists. "Anyone who copies is second-rate...Originality is the key."

For a close look at a Vegas show, before Vegas sees it, be at the Outpost tonight, tomorrow or Sunday at 7:30 p.m. One dollar will get you in the door.

Jewish songs in English, Yiddish and German will be sung by American and German Jews and Gentiles at 5 p.m. at the Palais am Funkturm and at 8 p.m. at the Haus der Kirche, 27 Goethestrasse. 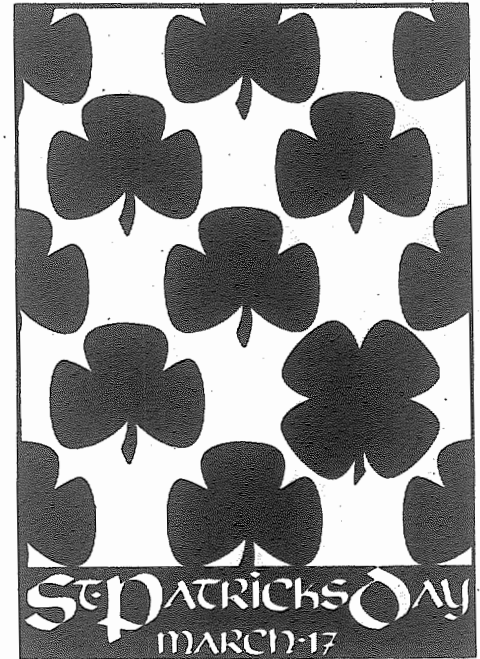

Winner advances to finals

Bears to battle Wiesbaden

The Berlin Bears Basketball team will take on the team from Wiesbaden at the Sports Center Gym here Saturday at 2 p.m. in their battle to become the number one Army basketball team in Europe.

A relatively unknown team in the larger V and VII Corps leagues, the Bears rocketed into prominence last weekend by capturing first place in the 1984 USAEUR Positional Basketball Tournament.

But the Bears dropped their first bid to win the semifinals at Wiesbaden by losing to that team 84-69 on

Wednesday. In the best of three series that means the Bears must win on Saturday at 2 p.m. and again must win in Sunday's game, also at 2 p.m. to advance to the final round against the VII Corps champions.

In regular season play however, the Bears have beaten the Wiesbaden team twice so far. And if their stunning 99-66 rout of the 7th Army Training Command in last Sunday's winner-take-all positional is any indication of the talent and depth they possess, Wiesbaden's troubles may just be starting.

In the first two games of the positionals, the Bears posted respectable victories of 72-65 over the Heidelberg Celtics and 69-65 over 7th ATC.

They missed their chance at a straight sweep on Sunday however, when 7th ATC, struggling to stay alive, pulled out a last minute 59-57 victory.

The two teams looked about even in talent and ability

at that point, but unfazed by the loss, the Bears took to the courts a hour later and crushed the visitors with a smoldering 99-66 win.

It was the Basketball Bears at their very best and if any one moment captured the spirit of that game it would belong to Berlin's Glenn Jackson.

Halfway into the final quarter a guard from 7th ATC went up for a jump shot at the top of the key. Jackson, the Bear's 6' 7" heavyweight, stayed flatfooted on the court and slammed the ball out of the guard's hands with a knockout punch that could probably be heard in the parking lot outside the gym.

It was that kind of game from start to finish — devastating.

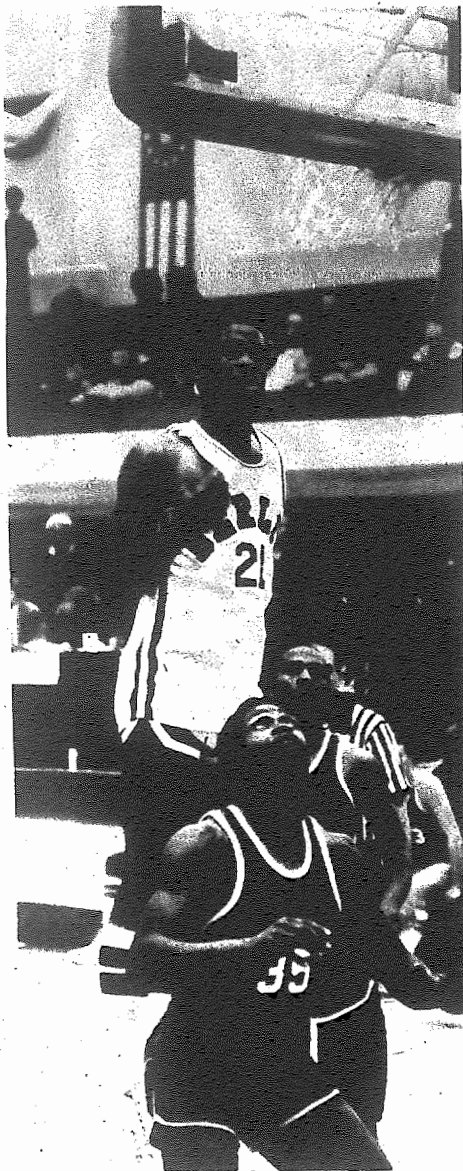
Yet one can hardly fault the 7th ATC for a lack of talent or guts. In height they were relatively short, but inside the key on either end of the court they had proven throughout the tournament to be deadly. Their lightning fast rebound and steals and sweeping layups had overwhelmed SETAF 82-67 Friday in their first game.

They lost to Berlin on Saturday but came back that evening to oust the 26th Support Group's Celtics 84-70. Given a three percent chance to steal or score they took it.

But in the final game with Berlin, the Bears closed ranks and cut that three percent chance down to zero with a mercilessly airtight zone defense and an avalanche fast break offense.

Roderick Riley led the Bear's scoring drive in that game with a blistering tournament high of 33 points. Three other Bears hit double numbers as well. Ernest Vinson pumped in 15 points and Jerry Brackett and Stanley Gordon each fired off 14 points in a strong showing of team depth.

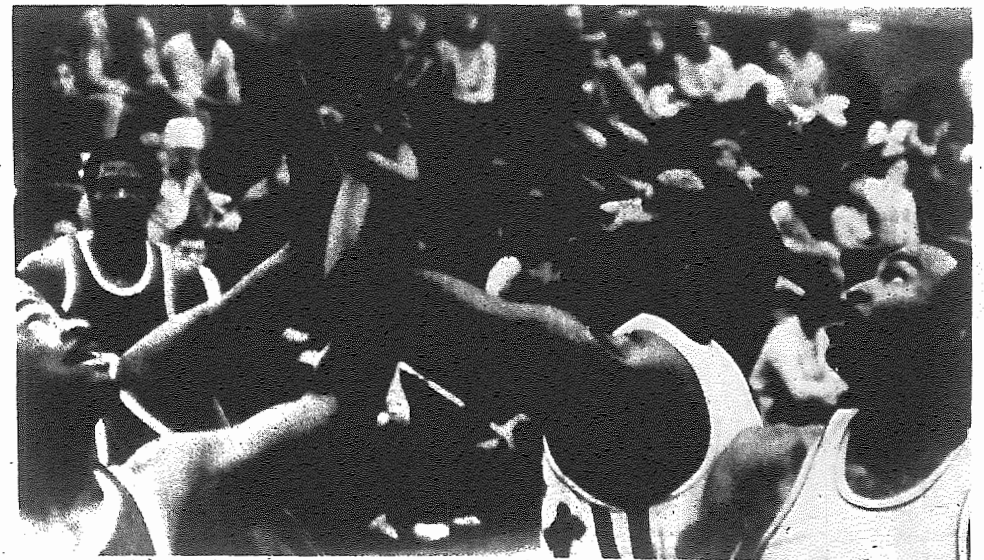
Saturday's rematch with Wiesbaden here will be a tough game for both teams. Emotions are running high and both teams have the potential for explosive playing. Both teams have strong second teams and Wiesbaden boasts of being able to play well away from home. That remains to be seen and the will get their chance Saturday, 2 p.m. at the Sports Center Gym.
