Why redesignation? — a look at the system

This week we will give you an overview and some history on the new "Regimental System" and why the Army has adopted it.

Over the last 40 years, the Army has employed different approaches to manning and sustaining the Army. For the most part, the World War II combat arms soldiers served in one regiment for the duration. Many who came ashore in North Africa in 1942 were still soldiering under the same regimental colors on the Elbe River in May of 1945.

The veterans of that conflict look back with immense pride at their shared experiences and their total commitment to their units and to their comrades in arms.

That type of commitment has never been totally recaptured in the conflicts since World War II. In the Korean "police action," soldiers accumulated points determined by their exposure to hostile fire; those with a prescribed minimum were eligible to return home.

In the years between Korea and Vietnam, the Army with some notable exceptions like Overseas Unit Replacement System experiment, reverted to an individual replacement system to sustain units.

With the advent of large scale involvement in Vietnam, the Active Army expanded rapidly and formed units for deployment to satisfy ground force requirements.

Because a one year tour policy remained in effect after the introduction of units, the Army resorted to the use of an "infusion" technique which was essentially the distribution of soldiers with varying rotation dates into units to preclude instantaneous disestablishment of the units one year after arrival in country.

While there were some good reasons for sustaining the force this way, the potential for developing the enduring commitment and relationships so characteristic of World War II experience was severely diminished.

The post-Vietnam era has seen a series of new dimensions for manning the Army. The draft went out; the volunteer Army came in. The focus was on resources, efficiencies and the costs of maintaining adequate manpower in uniform. In this resource-driven environment, it was only natural that the Army would again resort to a manning system which would distribute soldiers efficiently in accordance with priorities.

This individual replacement system has, and will con-

tinue, to serve the Army well; it is flexible and efficient. It eases management and puts soldiers where the Army needs them, quickly and fairly. However, it does take a toll. The constant flow of personnel into and out of units — especially combat arms units — makes it very difficult to foster cohesion and group solidarity in the small, combat arms units which are the cutting edge of the Army.

A related, inescapable side effect stems from soldiers constantly changing allegiance as they move from one unit to another. Certainly proud soldiers identify with and pledge their service — and their lives if need be — to the nation and to the Army.

But while lofty ideals and patriotism give men direction, it is not realistic to expect these abstractions to motivate men on a daily basis. People want to belong to a respected and distinctive association of peers. They must be bound by a lasting sense of community which fits between the fundamental bonds of the primary group and the commitments to the Army at large. Again, these are realities well understood by the veterans of Normandy and Okinawa. Their successors feel this also, but not as much. The constant movement of soldiers in the Army has cost us something — something to do with identity and allegiance.

The leaders in the Army thought that now, when the Army is being sustained by successes in recruiting and retention and facing the challenges of modernization and reorganization, the time was right to develop an initiative which will allow soldiers to affiliate with a legendary regiment and benefit from recurring assignments to its battalions.

The regiments although not tactical units, should be a living entity to which the soldier looks for the duration of his or her career. It must be a link between soldiers in the ranks today and those who have made history under its colors in the past.

The regiment will be a community, a community of soldiers and a community of units. Soldiers should be assigned to units in the regiment and allowed to remain with it for some time.

When overseas assignments must be satisfied, they should be met by moving regimental units, not by moving disoriented individuals through an impersonal system headed for host of unknowns.

When soldiers must serve in non-regimental assignments, they must know that when they return to "troops" they will serve with their regiment. To accomplish these objectives, regiments will have to be groupings of battalions.

These regiments consist of paired battalions in the United States and overseas so that the unit replacement system — at company level now, possibly battalion level in the future, can operate within this new regimental framework.

Next week we will look at "affiliation" and what it will mean to you.

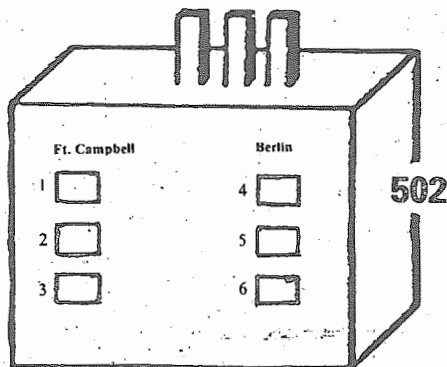

When she says 'no,' she means NO

Breathing heavily, he crept through the alleyway behind the Greasyspoon Diner on Main Street. He pulled a knife from his jacket, stepped into a shadow of the foggy night and waited. Soon he heard the tap of high heels on concrete.

Traveling home from her night job, the woman, alone and unaware, passed the rapist's hiding place. He grabbed her and pulled her into the alleyway. They struggled. She fell to the pavement and became his next victim.

Not necessarily 'strangers in the night'

Rape. It isn't always like that though. The word brings to mind the sinister stranger lurking in the shadows but in 75 percent of Army reported rapes, the victim and offender knew each other. They were neighbors, coworkers, relatives or, even, dates.

One third of the reported rapes, according to the Army's Crime Records Center, took place between soldiers. In almost all the cases, the pay grades of the victims and/or offenders ranged from E-1 through E-5.

Of rapes reported to military



police, over 90 percent took place on-post; of these, nearly 60 percent happened in the victim's or offender's quarters. The scene could have developed like this:

Gail and Mike, both in Charlie Company, saw each other every day. Sharing jokes and, once in a while, lunch, they became friends.

Before long, Mike invited Gail out to see a movie. Discussing the movie later that night over pizza and beer, they agreed it had been fun. They enjoyed each other's company.

It was close to midnight when Mike drove Gail home, and she invited him in for a cup of coffee to say goodnight.

Two hours later, the MP's responded to a tearful call. Gail had become another number in the statistics of reported soldier-soldier rapes.

Until the frantic phone call to police, it had sounded like a pleasant evening. What went wrong?

Mike said it wasn't his fault. He blamed Gail.

"She invited me into her apartment and I knew she wanted me to stay. When I kissed her, she enjoyed it," he said. "I wanted to have sex and she told me 'NO,' but I knew she meant 'YES.'"

Mike should have known that no one has the right to another person's body or to force her into an act against her will. A woman always has the right not to be molested. "NO" means NO.

The victim's legacy

Rape is more than forced sex. It's an act of violence causing the woman to suffer not only physically but also emotionally and socially.

Victims face the immediate physical danger of being beaten, maimed or even killed. They also face the prospects of venereal disease and unwanted pregnancy.

Consider the emotional stress. Many women are unable to bring themselves to tell anyone about the rape. Statistics show that only about 15 percent of all rapes are reported. Many of the women who did report rape had to have professional counseling to help them cope.

Finally, social problems arise from the old idea that women ask for rape.

The victim feels guilty and wonders what she did wrong. Friends and family may be caught up in the same way of thinking and, though they want to help her, don't know how. The problems following rape can last for years, even a lifetime.

The offender's hollow defense

In the military, here are some of the most common "excuses" given by males charged with rape:

"Sure, I was rough and used force. Every woman secretly wants to be taken by force."

"She asked for it. Look at how she dressed and acted."

"After all, she'd slept with my buddy."

"It couldn't have been rape. I didn't beat her up and I didn't hold a gun to her head."

"It was her fault. She should have never invited me to her room to listen to music."

These remarks are a common response to the crime of rape. They're alike in another way: each of them came from a soldier who's a convicted rapist.

Surepay

Soldiers Army-wide will undergo training in financial management between July 1 and Oct. 1, as the Army plans for the eventual mandatory conversion to the "Surepay" System, according to finance officials.

Training, primarily in checkbook maintenance, will take place during this time frame. Training Circular 21-7, Personal Financial Readiness, will form the basis for this training.

The Army pay system will be converted so that soldiers' net pay will be sent directly to a financial organization for deposit in a checking or savings account.

Surepay will increase readiness, officials say, by eliminating time-consuming financial arrangements during periods of mobilization.

East-block travel

All military and civilian personnel, to include family members, who are members of the U.S. Forces must receive USAREUR approval to travel to or through communist countries on leave or in a duty status.

Applications may be initiated at AG Customer Services and must be done 45 days prior to travel.

Restrictions and requirements by country are listed in USAREUR Regulation 550-80. It is the individual's responsibility to comply with all requirements.

Within three days of return from such a trip, all individuals must also report to the Security Branch, ODC-SI.

Security at Clay

New security provisions have been initiated at Clay Headquarters. They include the following procedures:

100 percent ID card and Installation Pass check to include:

- Face to picture comparison
 - Expiration date
 - Serviceability of document
 - Where applicable, Pass to Ausweis comparison
- Random vehicle inspection to include:
- Visual inspection of passenger area
 - Engine compartment
 - Storage compartment
 - Underbody mirror check

Random hand carried purse, briefcase, bag or package inspection.

During periods of normal operations LS and U.S. guards will not be required to physically handle ID documents but just to visually examine documents at a distance not to exceed 60 cm (2 feet).

During periods of increased security, ID documents

will be physically inspected by security personnel as an additional check of authenticity.

The practice of physical inspection by security forces will be implemented under the direction and on order of the Headquarters Commandant. Personnel refusing to comply with this policy will be denied access to the Headquarters.

PCS funds

John Nemetz, area manager of the Community Banking Facilities has this advice if you're leaving soon.

Most banks in the states will not accept large cashier's checks or bank drafts for immediate payment. He recommends taking a small amount of cash, a bank draft to be deposited to an account at your new bank and the rest in travelers checks.

The one percent cost of travelers checks is also refundable within certain limits if you see your finance officer at your new duty station.

Headgear info

G-1 Division reminds all Army personnel that appropriate headgear will be worn while in uniform when outdoors, except females wearing Army mess or evening dress uniforms.

Headgear is not required to be worn if it would interfere with the safe operation of military vehicles. The wearing to military headgear will not be required while in a privately owned or commercial vehicle.

Personnel on duty with, or units tennant on, installations of other armed services will adhere to the uniform change over dates established by the other service.

Headgear will not be worn indoors unless under arms or directed by the commander.

Check news

What is a two party check? Did you know that your name could be put on the Community Dishonored Check List even though you do not have a checking account? That's what happened to PFC Tom J.

Tom accepted a check for \$50 written to him from his friend Fred. Tom didn't have a checking account so he took the check to the PX and cashed it. Two weeks later Tom received a notification from AAFES saying the check had 'bounced'. He must now make restitution within the 20 day grace period and pay a \$15 service charge.

In accordance with AR 210-60, Tom also received a letter from the Check Control Office regarding the dishonored check stating that he could be suspended from being able to cash checks for six months to three years depending upon the severity of the case. Tom thought this was unfair and that Fred should make restitution since Fred had written the check.

After the 20 day grace period Tom received another letter from the Check Control Office stating that his check cashing privileges were suspended for six months, his ID Card must be over stamped, his name would be placed on the Community Dishonored Check List and he must attend the Checkbook Maintenance Course before the end of his suspension in order to have his privileges reinstated.

The above case describes what can happen to you when you cash a two party check and it is returned dishonored. If you must cash a personal check written to you, avoid cashing it at a government check cashing facility other than the bank. Take it to the bank from where it was written whenever possible. This is in order to make sure there are enough funds in the account to cover the check.

Remember, the receiver of the cash must make restitution and pay any service charges if a two party check is dishonored.

Don't lose your driver's license

Have you checked the expiration date on your driver's license lately? If so, you may have wondered if your home state automatically extends the driver's license expiration date for service members on active duty.

Some do and some don't.

The following states automatically extend driver's licenses for people on active duty. The extension applies only to the service member and for the period of active duty service plus the number of days shown following discharge (except for limits and exceptions as noted):

- Arizona — 90 days
- California — 30 days

- Colorado — 90 days; but total extension after expiration does not exceed three years.

- Indiana — 30 days; but total extension after expiration does not exceed four years.

- Iowa — 180 days; similar extension for dependents, not to exceed five years.

- Louisiana — 60 days; applies only to licenses issued prior to August 27, 1979.

- Maine — 30 days
- Maryland — 30 days
- Massachusetts — 60 days
- Minnesota — 90 days

- Montana — 30 days
- Nebraska — 60 days; extension applies to spouses also.

- North Dakota — 30 days
- Ohio — 180 days
- Oklahoma — 60 days; extension applies only to personnel on active duty outside the continental U.S.

- Pennsylvania — 45 days
- South Dakota — 30 days
- Tennessee — 60 days
- Texas — 90 days
- Utah — 90 days
- Vermont — 30 days; but total extension after expiration does not exceed four years.

- Virginia — 180 days; but total extension after expiration does not exceed four years.
- Washington — 90 days
- West Virginia — 180 days

Seven other states and the District of Columbia also grant an extension, but you must apply for it through the state's licensing authority:

- Arkansas — extension good only for first tour of duty.
- Georgia — extension good for four years.
- Idaho — extension good only for one year.
- Illinois — extension good for period of service plus 45 days.
- New York — application must be made within 60 days of entry into service; good for period of service plus 180 days.
- Rhode Island — you just obtain a special license which is good for period of service plus 180 days.

- Wyoming — extension good only for three years.

- District of Columbia — extension good for only six years.

It is important to note that these extensions apply to the way your home state (state of residence) regards the validity of your driver's license.

Below is information for when you return to the U.S.

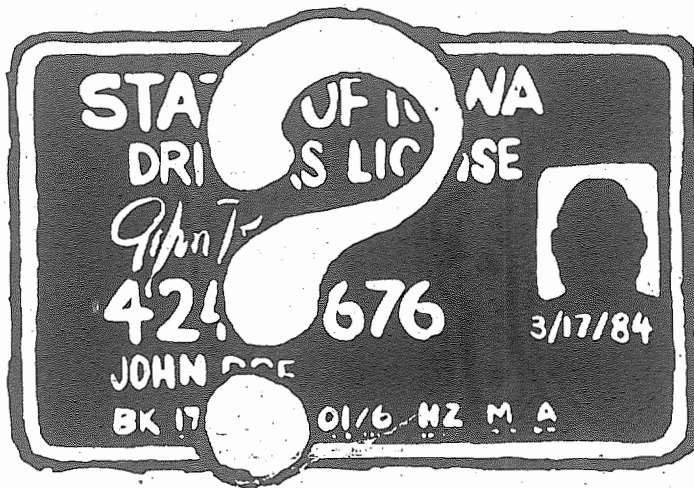
While all states generally honor valid out-of-state driver's licenses, the state where you are stationed (host state) may, under certain circumstances or after a certain period of time, require you to obtain a license in that state. Check this out with a local driver licensing authority.

If you take up residency in a new state, that state will require you to obtain a local driver's license.

If you are a resident of a state that does not grant an extension, you must maintain an unexpired driver's license at all times in order to drive legally.

The following states do not grant driver's license extensions: Alabama, Alaska, Connecticut, Delaware, Florida, Hawaii, Kansas, Kentucky, Michigan, Mississippi, Missouri, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Mexico, North Carolina, Oregon, South Carolina and Wisconsin.

Many states permit active duty military personnel to renew their driver's license by mail. Details of renewal requirements such as fees, tests, photos, etc., vary in each state. It is wise to contact the motor vehicle division of your state at least a couple of months before your license expires.

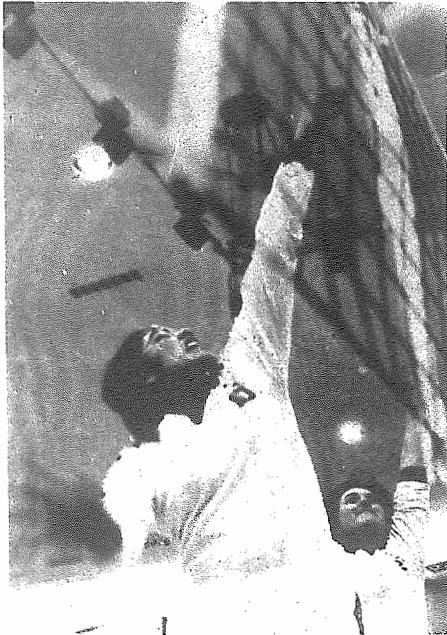

15. BSC then closed ranks and won the next two games 15-1 and 15-13.

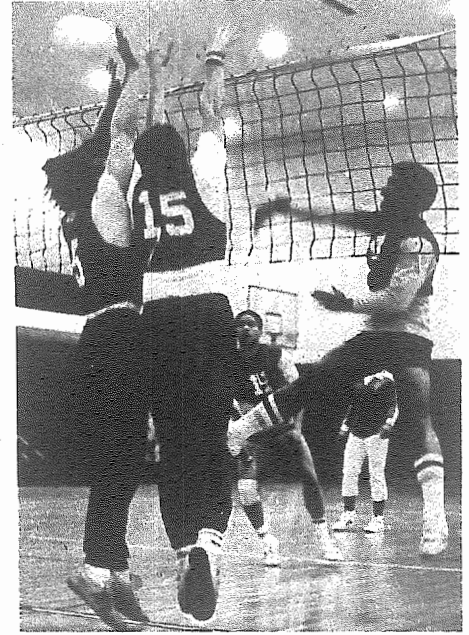
On Saturday both teams proved to be victorious.

Germany offers variety to sportsmen

Hunters and fisherman need not complain about the lack of opportunities to pursue their respective pastimes here in Germany. There is plenty of both game and fish, but like many other things the rules and procedures are sometimes different.

Although Germany is only the size of Oregon, it boasts a large game population of roe deer, hare, rabbits and pheasants. Even unusual species such as chamois, fallow deer, mouflon, wild boar and red deer are available.

U.S. Forces members assigned to Germany as well as their dependants 16 years of age and older are eligible to obtain the resident hunting license which costs DM130 a year, including liability insurance.

The hunting license is valid from the date of issue until the following March 31. Before applying for the first time however, hunters must pass a hunting test given by a certified Rod and Gun Club instructor, or the hunting and fishing coordinator serving the military community.

Quotas of game are reserved for U.S. hunters in the German states of Baden Wuerttemberg, Bavaria, Hesse, Rheinland Pfalz and Saarland as well as the federal training areas of Grafenwoehr, Hohenfels and Wildflecken.

Hunters can reserve a time and place by booking their hunt through the hunting and fishing coordinator serving the area in which they wish to hunt.

Prior to the hunt, the hunter can purchase from the hunting and fishing coordinator his game bag limit record for the game animals he will hunt. He also pays guide/basic fees to the forester or coordinator and in the case of certain animals a supplementary fee.

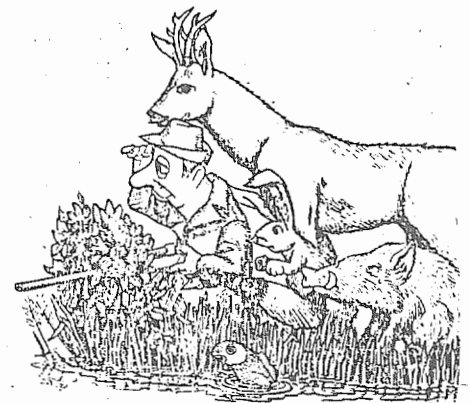
Hunting and fishing equipment can be purchased from rod and gun club sales stores. Military clothing such as field jackets, trousers, shirts, parkas and other garments are also fully acceptable.

If, however, you are a fisherman, Germany still has plenty to offer.

Some of the best trout fishing is found in the U.S. Forces recreation areas of Berchtesgaden, Chiemsee and Garmish. Abundant and inexpensive fishing is offered at the Seventh Army Training Command at Grafenwoehr.

For those who prefer deep sea fishing, inexpensive fishing trips on the Baltic and North Seas are available through the Association of American Rod and Gun Clubs in Europe. This sport can be enjoyed by the whole

family. No experience is necessary and a license or permit is not required in German coastal waters.

In the summer of 1980, Stefan Wagershausen became an overnight sensation with the release of his LP *Hallo Engel*. As with all overnight successes, he had spent a few years working night clubs and dance halls. The title cut of that album, in which a tequila-drinking messenger of God pays homage to Jim Morrison and Jimi Hendrix, made Wagershausen a hit with German audiences.

The next year he was named Artist of the Year and received the Goldene Europa for *Hallo Engel*. He followed with the release of his second album, *Fang mich auf or Catch me out*.

In 1982, Wagershausen released two albums, *Traumtanzzeit or Dream dance time* (his debut album recorded in 1974) and *Sanfter Rebell or Sedan Chair*

Rebel. In December of '82, he appeared at the Dortmunder Westfalenhalle with Randy Newman, Chris de Burgh, Sally Oldfield and Lucio Dalla.

He spent most of 1983 away from recording studios and concert dates, telling his manager he would have his peace. But he was back in the studio in January of this year finishing work on *Tabu*, released in February.

Tabu, according to music critics, heralds the emergence of a new Wagershausen with more 'back to the roots' guitar and a completely new soul element.

This German soft-rock singer and musician's *Mitten ins Herz (In the middle of the heart)* tour makes a stop in Berlin April 29 at the Hochschule der Künste.

Barclay James Harvest

The three British soft-rock musicians that make up Barclay James Harvest are back on tour after a two-year break. Although they have never made much of a dent in the stateside music charts, they are extremely popular in their native England, West Germany and here in Berlin.

In their last concert here, in the fall of '81, they performed in front of the Reichstag for a crowd of 150,000. The press hailed them as 'Trio Triumphant.' A film of that performance, entitled 'Berlin — A Concert for the

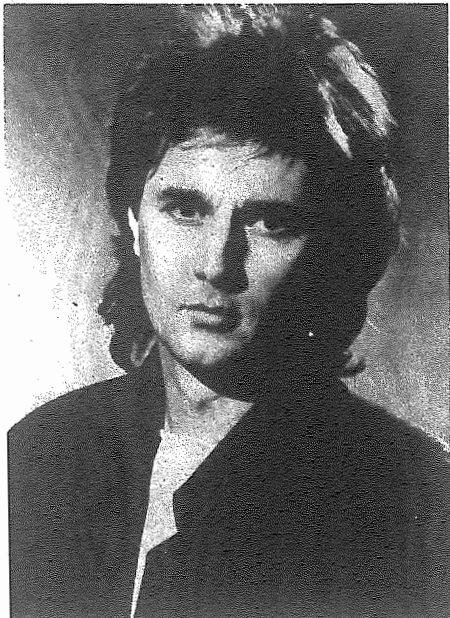
People,' premiered at the Berlin Film Fest the following year.
