TCA open house — the place to be tomorrow

Tomorrow and Sunday, Tempelhof Central Airport open its gates to the public.

With static displays, aerial demonstrations and lots of music, the people at TCA have lots of plans to amuse, entertain and amaze everyone.

Visitors will be treated to static displays of aircraft such as, a KC-10 "Extender," a C-5 Galaxy, C-130 Hercules, C-140, C-14 and others. The Aviation Detachment will display its UH-1H helicopters, a UV-20 and a U-21, both fixed wing craft.

The British and French will also provide aircraft for the large display.

Again this year, the Air Force will demonstrate a LAPES maneuver. Standing for Low Altitude Parachute Extrac-

tion System, the display will have C-130 Hercules transports unload cargo without landing. The aircraft will fly over the target zone at heights as low as seven feet, deploy large parachutes which will drag out the cargo through the rear door and drop it to the ground.

Flight Lieutenant David R. Turner of the Royal Air Force will display his acrobatic flying skills with the 35-year-old plane, the "Chipmunk." Another British flyer, Maj. Simon Gordon-Duff, will fly a Gazelle helicopter.

Soldiers from the Combat Support Company, 2nd Battalion will put on a rappelling demonstration. There will also be parachute free fall teams, model airplane and German police trampoline displays.

To round out the entertainment, there will be a stage in Hanger 1. Appearing on it will be Ebylee Davis and the Bayou Blues Band, the German rock group Cafe Senkrecht and an American group on a Department of Defense tour, "Freeman and Sweeney."

The Berlin Brigade Band, British and French military bands and the German police band will also play on the Hanger 1 stage.

There will be folk dancing from local groups and the Rinnsteinsymphoniker will also perform.

The Aer Lingus Musical Society of Irish Airways will perform both days on the stage. The group puts on a cabaret style performance.

The children will also have a lot to

look forward to. There will be rides in armored personnel carriers, a parachute jump, kiddie-car and pony rides.

The concessionaires are set up to make sure no one goes hungry. There will be wurst, hamburgers, hot dogs, tacos, corn-on-the-cob, chili, spare ribs and lots to drink.

In the interest of security, all hand-carried items will be screened. This includes, handbags, camera bags shopping bags and any other packages.

According to the 7350th Security Police Squadron, Eagle Square will be closed to parking and the Eagle Square gate will be open to thru-traffic only. The F2/K2 area, which includes the post office, auto/arts and crafts shops and PX, will also be closed for parking. Most of the open house traffic will be using gates 4 and 5 on Columbiadamm. There will be a DM 2 parking fee. ID card holders can park in lot 6.

The Security Police suggest that everyone use public transportation to the open house.

Maintenance garners 2/6 honors

It was a fitting conclusion to more than two years of maintenance excellence as Brig. Gen. Leroy N. Suddath Jr., brigade commander, presented the Berlin Brigade trophy to Lt. Col. Jouni Keravuori, 2nd Battalion commander, in a ceremony Friday at the Coliseum Theater.

In presenting the award, the brigade commander observed the outstanding program the battalion has maintained

over the past two years. Last year, the battalion was named the best in USAREUR and the 1982 all-Army winner in maintenance. In the 1983 competition, 2nd Battalion represented the brigade again and emerged as the USAREUR runner-up.

Suddath felt it was no small accomplishment to be recognized as the best in the Army one year and the USAREUR runner-up the next.

"I know there are quite a few battalions in USAREUR and to be named the second best in USAREUR is impor-

tant. It shows the exceptional program the battalion has and this recent award clearly shows the battalion has continued to maintain this excellence," remarked Suddath.

As the brigade commander further noted, the award demonstrates the readiness posture of the battalion in such maintenance activities as communication and weapons. The general applauded the long hours of work done collectively and individually by soldiers of the battalion who maintained their assigned weapons, protective masks and equipment.

Kids matinees

Due to the current lack of G-rated films, AAFES-Europe can no longer schedule only G-rated films at the Saturday matinees. To continue the Saturday Matinee Program, AAFES must schedule evening PG-rated films.

AAFES theaters in the U.S. made this change last fall. U.S. commercial theaters stopped special children's matinees many years ago. Though AAFES will be scheduling PG-rated films, new G-rated films, if received, will be scheduled.

On-hand, previously shown G-rated films will be rescheduled as long as the prints are usable and AAFES continues to have exhibition rights. The normal exhibition period is two years. Some film companies will not allow AAFES to keep films longer than that amount of time.

AAFES is attempting to obtain older G-rated films and the old family-type films made prior to 1968, when the rating system began. As AAFES is able to obtain them, the older G and family type films will be shown in lieu of the PG-rated films.

The reason AAFES lacks enough G-rated films is due to the declining production of G's. Ideally, 52 G-rated films are needed per year. In 1968, when the rating system began, 141 films were rated as G. By 1980 the number of G-rated films dropped to 14.

There were 10 in 1981, 10 again in 1982, 12 in 1983 and so far in 1984, none. To make up the difference AAFES has been repeating films on hand. They are now worn out, and AAFES no longer has enough usable copies

(prints) to show only G-rated films at the Saturday Matinee.

Therefore, AAFES must change and begin playing PG-rated films at the Saturday matinee if theaters are to continue having them.

PG means "Parental Guidance Suggested." Each PG film contains some material, such as violence, profanity, sex or nudity, which a parent may find objectionable.

All AAFES advertising carries an explanation of what makes the film a PG. This is done to assist parents in their making a decision as to whether their child should see the scheduled PG-rated film.

This service will offer special recognition of the contributions of the retired members of the armed forces.

Following the services, a visit will be paid to the grave of a retired member of the forces in the adjoining Waldfriedhof Cemetery. All retirees and survivors of deceased military, active or retired, are urged to attend this special ceremony.

The MARS Station has something special for those of you who want to call home for Mothers Day.

They will be participating in the MARS SPRINT NET this weekend. You can call your mother and relatives stateside, at no charge to you or the called party.

Normally, calls placed through the MARS station are collect calls from state to state, not overseas to state and are charged to the party being called.

However, on special holidays and occasions, the MARS SPRINT NET provides intra-U.S. calls at no cost to the customers through the MARS Network, and Mothers Day happens to be one of those special days.

Starting tonight at 4 p.m. and tomorrow and Sunday from 2 through 11 p.m., you can book free calls stateside. So, at no cost to you, you can give your mom a call this weekend.

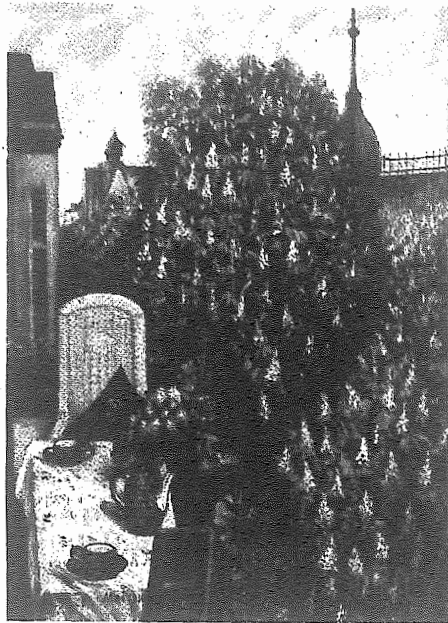
Marathon transport

concert news

There are a lot of exciting things happening on the concert scene in Berlin this month. And a lot of last minute additions, as well. By now, you've heard that two of the most influential folk singers of the '60s will perform again on the same stage at the Waldbühne June 13. Those singers are, of course, Bob Dylan and Joan Baez, and appearing with them at the amphitheater will be Santana.

Other concerts to look forward to include:

The German opera singer turned rock star Peter Hofmann will appear with his band and orchestra at the ICC tonight at 8 p.m. This concert is being sponsored by Sony, an unusual departure for the electronics corporation. Hofmann broke away from his operatic past last year with the release of his album "Rock Classics." It was an instant success and he's been singing rock instead of arias since.

The open-air Waldbühne officially opens its season with a Frühschoppen tomorrow at 11 a.m. The music will be provided by the Gold Washboard Hot Jazz Company from Poland, the Ferdinand Havlik Swing Big Band from the Soviet Union, the Sir Gusche Band and the Kreuzberg Stompers.

On the heels of his latest release, *Ciao Bello*, Klaus Hoffman will appear at the Hochschule der Künste Sunday and Monday at 8 p.m. His music has been compared to that of Joni Mitchell, Joan Armatrading and Paul Simon. A testament to his popularity here in Berlin is the additional concert scheduled due to very brisk ticket sales.

One of Germany's foremost rock stars, Udo


Lindenberg, stops in at the Deutschlandhalle Sunday with his Panikorchester. He promises a whole new show, complete with lights and it starts at 8 p.m.

No stranger to the American music charts, Elton John performs at the Waldbühne May 18 at 8 p.m. He's on his latest world tour promoting his LP "Too Low For Zero." A single from that album, "That's Why They Call It The Blues," has made its way up most of the world's music charts already. Elton has calmed down since his appearance on the music scene in 1975 with "Captain Fantastic and the Brown Dirt Cowboys." For years, even if you couldn't remember the words to his songs, you certainly couldn't forget his flamboyant clothing and wigs, not to mention his unusual collection of eyeglasses.

Following Elton John, on May 19 at Olympic Stadium will be the Concert For Europe, surely the cheapest form of entertainment this season at DM 5 a ticket. The all-day concert features Chris de Burgh, Al Stewart, Marius Müller-Westernhagen, Wolfgang Ambros and other European artists.
