4th Bn. on the move in Bonnland

The village of Bonnland, where the soldiers of the 4th Battalion have just finished 12 days of training, was first mentioned in history around 780 A. D., about the same time the Vikings began their savage raids into England and Ireland.

Tucked away in the hills of northern Bavaria, the castles around Bonnland were besieged in 1525 by the Frankonian hordes, rebuilt in 1558 and after three centuries, converted to a military training area in 1893. In 1938 the area was sealed off by Nazis.

Today the Greifenstein castle is undergoing renovation and a stones-throw down the hill from it the original Bonnland is once again being used as a military training area.

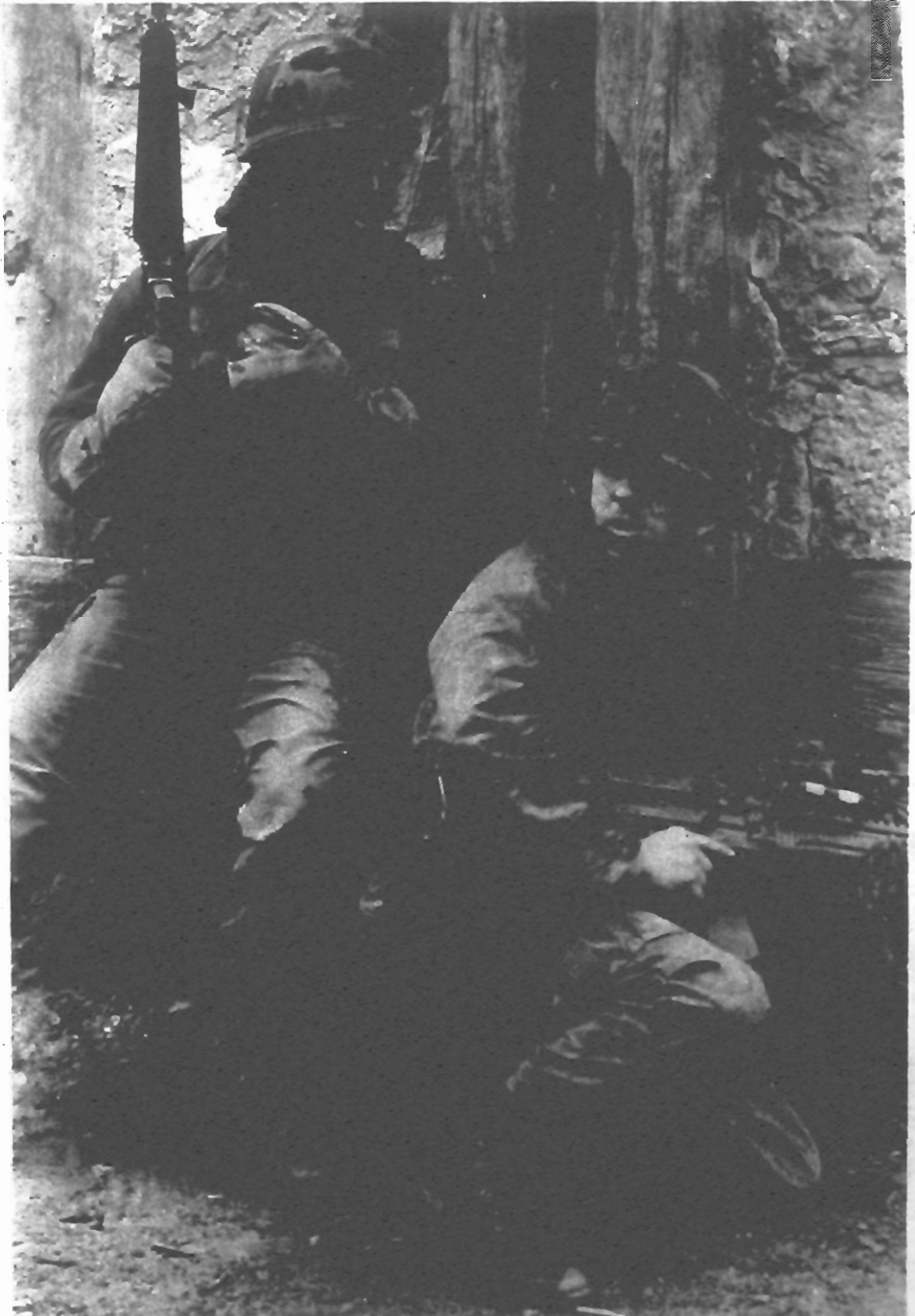
"You can never be sure of what you are going to find here," said SFC Alexander Smith of Company C. "Some of these buildings may have an attic or a basement, some may not."

No two buildings in the village are alike. The main street is wide, but plenty crooked. The houses and barns are a hodge-podge of stone and brick masonry, English half-timber and post and beam framing, some opening into small courtyards or narrow alleys.

Last Sunday many of the battalion's soldiers took an hour off from their training and climbed a short arc of stone steps into a tall, narrow church to hear Chaplain (Maj.) Edward Saxon give a sermon. The church and its two-foot thick walls were built in 1230.

"In doing their maneuvers here our soldiers have to be very cautious and pay extreme attention to detail," said

Berlin in running for USAREUR energy award

USAREUR officials announced Berlin has been named as one of five communities having one of the best overall energy efficiency programs during 1983.

Berlin and the other four communities — Ansbach, Baumholder, Nürnberg and Zweibrücken — will go through on-site evaluations by officials of the USAREUR Energy Management Council and the top three will split \$1 million in award money.

The USAREUR energy officials will visit the communities for evaluations during January and early February. The winning communities will be announced in February.

While on-site evaluations and inspections are important, they won't mean much if you don't help.

We are running these tips to help you save energy.

•During both heating and cooling seasons close off unoccupied rooms.

When the heat is on . . .

•Dust or vacuum radiator surfaces frequently.

•Keep draperies and shades open in sunny windows; close them at night.

•For comfort in cooler indoor temperatures, use the best insulation of all — warm clothing.

Kitchen Energy Savers

•Keep range-top burners and reflectors clean.

•Match the size of the pan to the heating element.

•With electric cooking get in the habit of turning off the burners several minutes before the allotted cooking time. The burners will stay hot long enough to finish your cooking.

•Watch the clock or use a timer.

•Use pressure cookers and microwave ovens if you have them.



•When you have a choice, use the range-top rather than the oven.

Dishwashing energy savers

•Be sure your dishwasher is full.

•When buying a dishwasher, look for a model with air-power and/or overnight dry settings.

- Let your dishes air dry.
- Don't use "rinse hold" on your machine.
- Scrape dishes before loading them into the dishwasher.

Refrigerator/Freezer energy savers

•Don't keep your refrigerator or freezer too cold.

•Regularly defrost refrigerators and freezers. Frost buildup increases the amount of energy needed to keep the engine running. Never allow frost to build up more than one-quarter of an inch.

•Make sure your refrigerator door seals are tight.



Laundry Energy Savers

•Wash clothes in warm or cold water; rinse in cold.

Washing machines

- Don't use too much detergent.
- Pre-soak or use a soak cycle when washing heavily soiled garments.

Clothes dryers

•Fill clothes dryers but do not overload them.

•Keep the lint screen in the dryer clean.

•Keep the outside exhaust of the dryers clean.

•Dry your clothes in consecutive loads.

•Separate drying loads into heavy and lightweight items.

•If drying the family wash takes more than one load, leave small lightweight items until the last.

Ironing

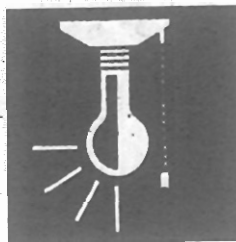
•Remove clothes that will need ironing from the dryer while they still are damp.

•You can save ironing time and energy by "pressing" sheets and pillowcases on the warm top of your dryer.

•Save energy needed for ironing by hanging clothes in the bathroom while you're bathing or showering.

Bathroom energy savers

- Take showers rather than tub baths.



Lighting energy savers

•Turn off lights in any room not being used.

•To reduce overall lighting in non-working spaces, remove one bulb out of three in multiple light fixtures and replace it with a burned-out bulb for safety.

•Use long-life incandescent lamps only in hard-to-reach places.

•Use one large bulb instead of several small ones in areas where bright light is needed.

- Use low-wattage night-light bulbs.
- Keep all lamps and lighting fixtures clean.



Appliance energy savers

•Don't leave your appliances running when they're not in use.

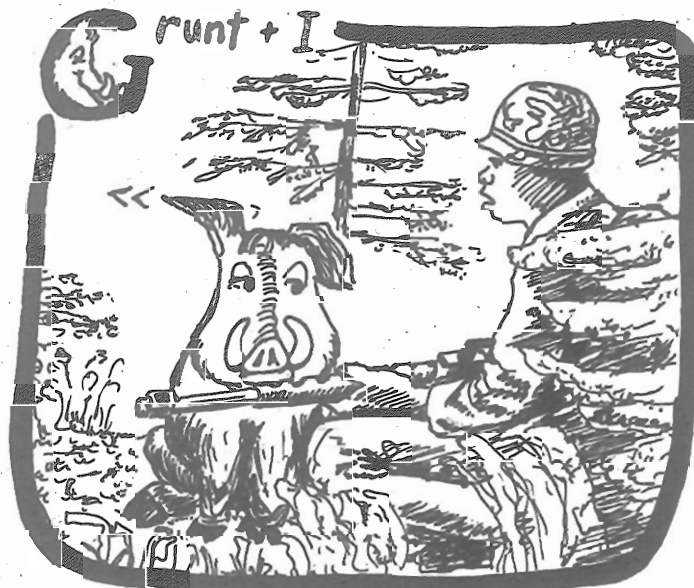
•Keep appliances in good working order.

•When buying appliances, read labels carefully.

•Before buying new appliances with special features, find out how much energy they use compared with other, perhaps less convenient models.

•Use appliances wisely.

•Don't use energy-consuming appliances if you have an alternative.

Mail problems

Personnel experiencing billing difficulties with creditors in the United States due to mail delays as a result of inclement weather in the states may obtain a letter of support by contacting the Postal Officer at 819-6020.

Individuals having mail sent to their quarters through the Deutsche Bundespost should advise their correspondents to avoid including APO N. Y. 09742 in the address. Otherwise this mail will be sent to the APO causing a delay of one or two days.

The APO maintains an appointment system on a year-round basis. Those patrons or combination of patrons with five or more packages to mail may arrange an appointment to mail prior to operating hours at the Truman Plaza APO by calling 819-6780.

Turn in batteries

German environmental authorities are conducting a campaign to stop small batteries (flashlight, calculator, walkman, etc.) from being thrown away as ordinary trash.

The batteries contain lead and/or mercury and are extraordinarily toxic and destructive to the environment.

All used batteries should be turned in to the Merchandise Repair Pick Up Point, Truman Plaza, for proper disposal.

No 24-hour specials

Special (24-hour) dry cleaning service will not be available during the months of January or February except to expedite dry cleaning for emergency leaves, PCSs, etc.

The goal of the Dry Cleaning Branch is to reduce the regular service in-plant time to three days or less. The Dry Cleaning Branch apologizes for the temporary inconvenience, but feel that a faster return time will benefit the majority of patrons.

The Berlin Brigade Drill Team is looking for members.

Be a member of the premier ceremonial unit in USAREUR. You'll perform before thousands of people throughout Europe each year.

To be a member of the team takes leadership, motivation and self-discipline plus a willingness to spend many off-duty hours on the road.

To apply, you need to be in grade E-1 through E-5, have a minimum GT score of 100 or higher and an SQT score of 60 or higher. You must have 14 months or more left on your overseas tour, be at least 5 feet 11 inches and present a trim military appearance.

Check cashing

If you are going to be in the United States for TDY, ordinary, emergency or convalescent leave, military finance offices are authorized to cash personal checks drawn on overseas Military Banking Facilities for Army personnel.

To cash checks you must meet the following requirements:

Have a valid Armed Forces Identification Card.

Have a DD Form 1610 or DA Form 31 annotated with the following statement for extension of check cashing privileges:

"I certify that the above named individual has at least 60 days remaining time in service, that he/she is currently authorized check cashing privileges at facilities within this command and hereby authorize collection via casual payment should instruments cashed be dishonored. Paying DSSN 6334."

Checks drawn on overseas Military Banking Facilities are in amounts less than \$500.

The service member's name, rank, SSAN, duty station and servicing DSSN are annotated on the face or reverse of the check.

The Finance Office obtains a consent statement from the service member on the reverse of the check consenting to collection by casual payment for the face amount should the check be dishonored.

Smith. "Squad leaders have to think about each and every move they make. The design of the buildings and the way they are clustered together give the defending forces tremendous advantages. It's an ideal set-up for booby traps and ambushes," he said.

In addition to sharpening their combat-in-cities skills, 4th Bn. soldiers trained in night attack techniques, competed for the German Marksmanship Medal and trained along with a platoon from the 1st Battalion, Prince of Wales' Own Regiment, also from Berlin.

In qualifying for the German Marksmanship Medal, 4th Bn. soldiers got a rare chance to fire three German Army weapons including the 7.62 mm rifle; the MP-42 German machine gun and the 9mm machine pistol. On each

weapon soldiers got just two rounds to familiarize themselves before firing for scores.

Despite the near blizzard conditions that began the first day of shooting, 51 of the battalion's soldiers shot well enough to receive the medal.

Training with the British platoon also gave the battalion's soldiers additional opportunities to learn more about their allied counterparts.

"They are a pretty tactical bunch of soldiers," said Sp4 Donald E. Grimes Jr. "They know how to hump."

During the exercise, daily forced marches to the training areas were conducted to enhance physical fitness. Grimes, who served as Company A's liaison to the British, said that on many of the road marches the Brits ran.

"They were doing a lot of stuff to impress us and we were doing a lot of stuff

to impress them," said Grimes. "I think both groups had a lot of fun. It was interesting to learn how their tactics and weapons differ. Their rifles are a lot heavier than our's and they are not fully automatic. We let them use our's and they were amazed," he said.

Another unique feature of Bonnland is its obstacle course — an elaborate 12 station course that winds its way over, under, around and through a series of buildings.

"It was more fun than anything else," said SSgt. Reginald Ladson of Company A. "Most everybody wants to do it again because it was so different from anything else we've done."

Ladson said the course began with a rope climb up to the top beams of a barn. From there soldiers walked the length of the barn along a narrow beam and slid on a rope into an adjacent building where they donned protective masks.

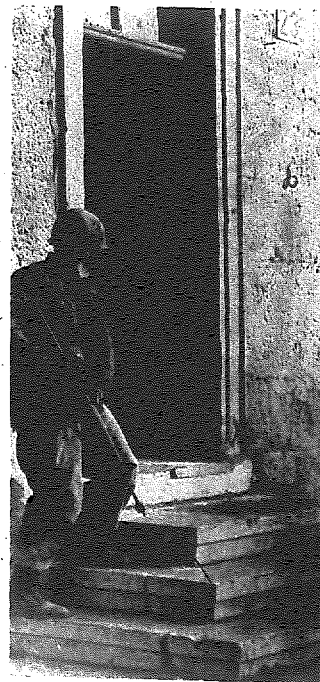
Once masked, they crawled down a corrugated metal culvert and climbed over a chest high wall before unmasking. Again they climbed a rope to get through a second story window and walked another beam before swinging by a rope over to a stack of boxes and scaling down the opposite wall.

They next walked up a wall using spikes driven into the mortar joints, crawled into a top story window and descended into a chimney, emerging at the bottom into a pitch black room. From here they had to feel their way out and negotiate around numerous boxes and other debris.

"We went through it in three-man teams and it took a lot of teamwork," said Ladson.

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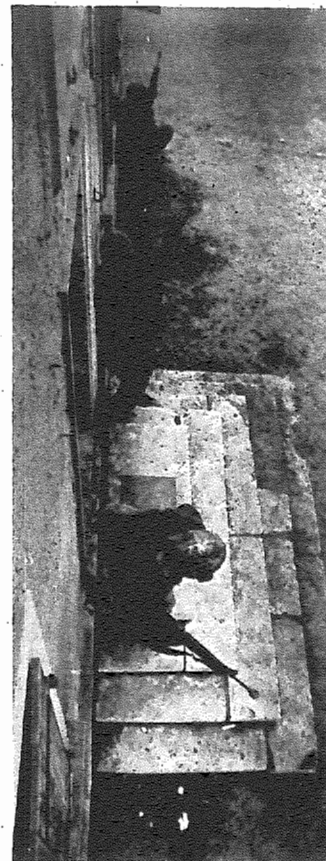
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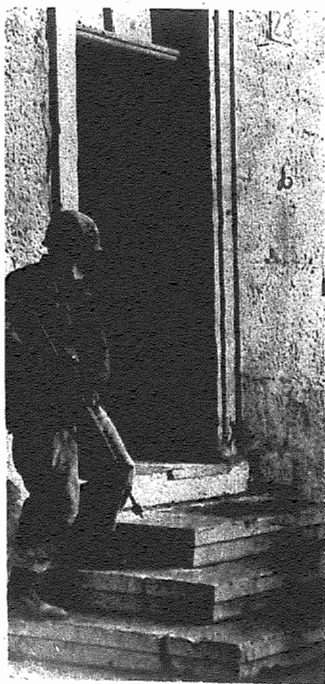

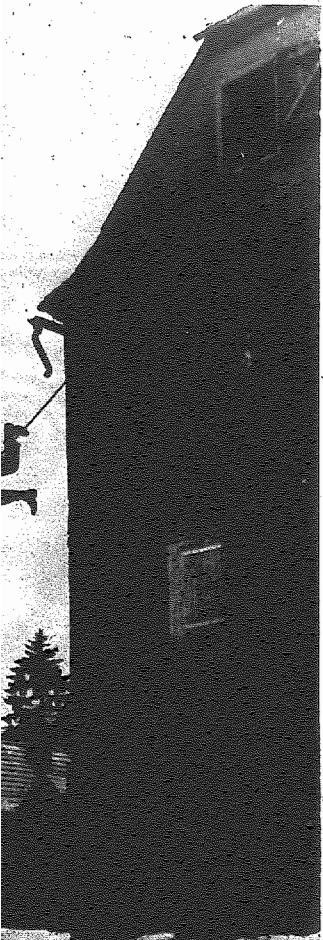

DEH offers mildew prevention tips

The Directorate of Engineering and Housing is aware of the problem some occupants in the housing areas are having with incidents of moldy mildew in their homes.

Mold is ever present in the air and flourishes on anything that can provide the simple nutrients required. It grows in places that are poorly ventilated and lighted.

To avoid mold that causes mildew you must first get rid of the substance that nourishes it, humidity. Cross ventilate your home, especially now when the air is colder outside than inside.

Cold air holds less moisture than warm air. By cross ventilating for 15 minute intervals twice a day, the moist humid air will be absorbed and carried outdoors with a minimum of heat loss.

Room temperature is not the root of the problem. Here are a few everyday examples that will help you understand that the room temperature, even when lowered to 65 degrees has nothing whatever to do with the growth of mildew as many people may believe.

Let's say you took that early morning shower, and you closed the window lest you catch cold. Then you dry off, making that nice fluffy towel all wet, as is the bath mat. The window, the walls and the mirror are steamed up, the tiles are wet and the shower curtain is bunched aside.

You leave the bathroom amid a cloud of steam that practically follows you into the bedroom where you get dressed.

Then it's off to work and the bathroom just sits there left to its own devices.

The window is closed, and you made sure the bathroom door was closed when you left. When you get home eight hours or so later, enough time will have passed for the first hints of moldy mildew to begin.

Within 24 hours, if left unchecked, you will have the first black spots of ugly stuff in the folds of the shower curtain, in the tile grout and elsewhere.

Now what do you do? Attack immediately!

Open the window for 15 minutes to dry the area, then scrub the affected area with a solution of 1/3 cup of household detergent, 1/2 cup of bleach and four cups of warm water, rinse and wipe dry.

When you find mold on painted surfaces, let's say your living room, you allow this solution to soak in, then you scrub and rinse and wipe dry.

If a spot remains on the wall, come to the Self Help Issue Point the Von Steuben Compound with your SHIP certificate of proficiency for some paint, brushes, etc. Once you have your place nice and clean again, check often, and be sure to air daily for 10 to 15 minutes.

Don't worry, you aren't going to freeze, but the droplets that carry the beginnings of mold will be carried outdoors.

In the past, some people have tried weatherstripping their windows with

plastic sheeting to hold in the heat. Since air can't get through the window, this only aggravates the mildew problem.

Well, you may think, to compensate for the loss of heat through the open windows, the shutters must be rolled down and the drapes closed. No, wrong

again.

The molds that grow into mildew hate daylight! You remember that your scout-leader taught you that the way to find north is to look for the moss on trees. The side it grows on points north, unless sunlight hits the tree there.

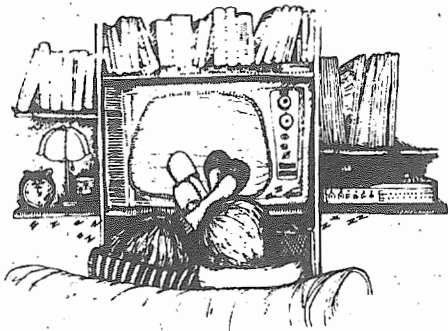

The Bears romped home clear winners over Grafenwöhr this weekend, beating their opponents 78-59 Saturday and 56-51 Sunday.

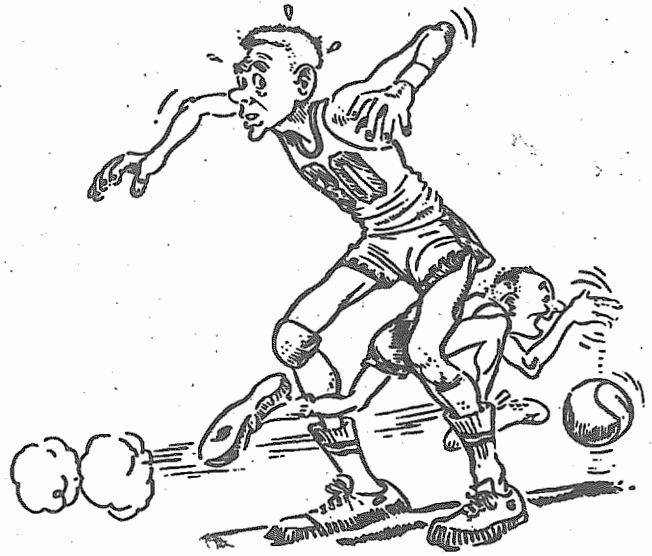

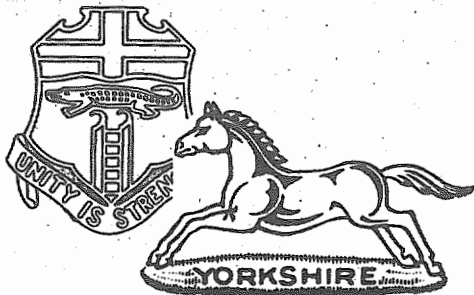
